

Deputy Sheriff Luke Taylor Dies From Wounds Received March 2nd

CLYDE — Funeral services for Callahan County Deputy Sheriff Luke Taylor, 67, were held Wednesday at 3 p. m. in the First Baptist Church, Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor, officiated. Burial was in Clyde Cemetery under the direction of Bailey Funeral Home.

Deputy Taylor died at 5:50 p. m. Monday in Clyde Nursing Home, where he was transferred after being a patient in Hendrick Memorial Hospital since March 2nd. Mr. Taylor sustained head injuries in a shooting that occurred on a tract of land north west of Baird which was leased by Selan Canada. Canada has

been indicted for "assault with intent to murder" in connection with the shooting.

The charge against Canada, 50, of Baird, will probably be re-considered in the next session of the 42nd District Grand Jury.

Mr. Taylor was born on April 12, 1904 at Burleson, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Lewis Taylor. He married Opal Marie Dunlap on December 6, 1925 in Baird. He farmed before entering law enforcement in 1951. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Clyde.

Survivors include his wife; two sons, Ray of Ventura, Calif., and Jim of Abilene; one daughter, Mrs. Betty Jones of Eastland; two brothers, Bill of Abilene and Buel of Clyde; three sisters, Mrs. Vera Tollett of Baird, Mrs. Verna Crawford of Barstow and Mrs. Jackie King of Big Spring; 11 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

These civic workshops stress the importance of maintaining our form of government and bring better understanding of our national traditions and beliefs to the more than 28,000 young men who are participating this year.

In Boys State, The American Legion provides the type of program where the young citizen has the opportunity to learn for himself that his government is just what he makes it. The boy "learns to do by doing."

The program takes an added significance since the vote has been extended to 18 year olds. Most Boys Staters are in the 16 to 17 age category.

Highlight of Boys State will be a trip to the Capitol Tuesday morning where each elected Boy State Official will be given an

opportunity to serve in his respective office for a day.

Boys State enrollment this year bring the total to 17,429 junior high school boys who have attended since 1940, when Boys State was first inaugurated in Texas.

USDA Urges Farmer To Report Fuel Shortage to USDA Co. Office

BAIRD — To help assure that farmers don't run short of fuel this season, the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) is asking farmers to:

Report any shortages to local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) Offices, and

Use fuel conserving methods

with tractors, trucks and other machine-driven equipment.

The Department since February has been monitoring the farm fuel supply situation thru its more than 2,800 ASCS County Offices. Any shortages are reported immediately through States ASCS Offices to Washington.

Any problems that arise are forwarded immediately to the Office of Oil and Gas, U. S. Department of the Interior, for solution under the voluntary allocation program.

ASCS said some suppliers have not been able to meet farm customers' needs fully. Officials said this is partly because independent and cooperative fuel producers and marketers have not been able to obtain enough supplies.

The current planting period is critical to farm production. Officials involved do follow up on shortage reports to make certain that corrective action is being taken.

USDA has been working with the Departments of Treasury and Interior to encourage farm fuel conservation practices. Farmers can conserve fuel use by keeping tractors tuned and using minimum tillage practices, for example.

USDA officials also urged farmers not to buy more fuel than they need in the near future. Officials stressed that equitable distribution is necessary if all farmers are to have enough fuel.

Public hearing will be held June 11-13 in Washington by the Treasury Department to see how the voluntary crude oil and product allocation program is working. Persons wishing to supply written testimony should contact Kenneth L. Dupuy, U. S. Department of the Interior, Washington, D. C. 20240, on or before 5 p. m. June 7.

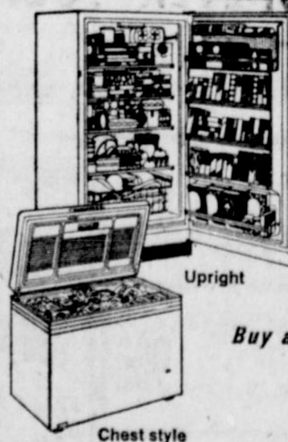

Aerial Spraying of Mesquite Proves Profitable on Local Ranches

BAIRD — Increased forage production is the ranchers principal objective, and this can be done by aerial spraying mesquite, according to A. H. Ringhoffer, Range Conservationist, SCS, Baird.

Results of grazing studies following aerial spraying, by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, over a 12 year period, indicate a 20 to 22 percent increase in the amount of forage utilized by cattle. This increase is for a 4 year period immediately following spraying.

The above studies were made on upland range sites in Shackelford and Throckmorton Counties, which are similar to local rangelands. The sites were deferred for a 3-month period immediately following spraying. This deferment permits the grasses to effectively use the additional moisture normally used by the mesquite.

Additional benefits were also obtained on the above sites that were sprayed. Reductions in labor and winter supplemental feed are the major benefits from spraying. Most ranchers felt

that time spent checking cattle in a pasture during the summer was reduced about 15 per cent in pastures where trees are dead and remained standing. Also, the average amount of protein supplement per cow annually decreased from 90 to 60 pounds per year after spraying.

Aerial spraying for control of mesquite will begin in Callahan County June 5th, according to Ringhoffer. In addition to having adequate moisture to insure at least 30 days of growth prior to spraying, aerial spraying should be delayed until the soil temperature has reached 75 degrees or higher at the time of spraying. The soil temperature should be taken at a depth of 12-14 inches on the coldest significant soil in the pasture to be sprayed.

When aerial spraying regrowth mesquite, farmers and ranchers should allow a minimum of 4 years or 5-6 feet of height before spraying, Ringhoffer stated. Additional information on aerial spraying may be obtained from the local SCS Field Office.

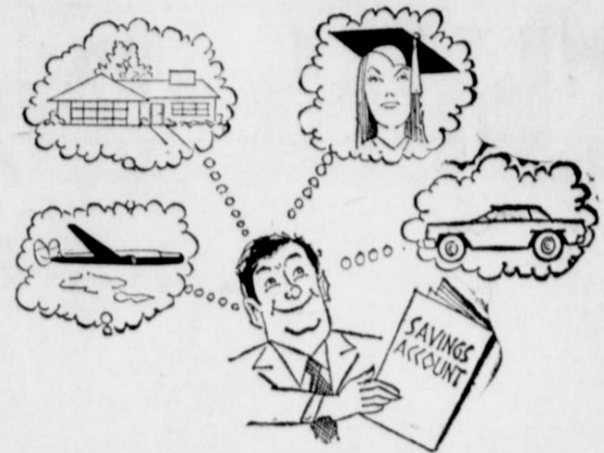

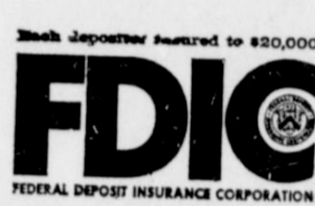
