

Yesterday as I enjoyed a cup of coffee in a local catery, two huntrs, weebegone because they had pent the day in a duck blind with out a single duck for their efforts discussed past days of waterfowling and inally posed the question familiar to all nimrods, "What has become of the ducks?"

Fortunately we know the answer te that question today, and what is more important, we know what to do about it. Knowing what to do out it and getting it done is however, something else again.

Waterfowl once populated this ountry in countless millions. In their migrations they clouded the kies. They nested from the Gulf of Mexico to the frigid wastes o the Arctic. Every pothole and praiie slough, every wooded lake and reek supported its quota of pintail

Into this hunters paradise came nan with his plow, his axe, his wheel and his desire for fresh turned arth, great cities and what he ermed "progress." In his relentless drive he saw the potholes and praiie sloughs as obstacles impeding is development, and he drained hem. The marsh areas and wooded akes bred mosquitoes and vast drainage projects became a paramount issue. Soon' thousands of small lakes ran through narrow channels into the nearest stream. Market hunters had a heyday and hawked their wild produce on the streets for a few pennies.

The waterfowl held out surprisngly well. They still had great nesting grounds in the North and the vast swamps of the Southland for wintering.

Came the 1930's and even Nature ntered the process of destroying a once bountiful species. Drouth hit the country on a nationwide scale Each summer the few remaining prairie lakes dried to sunbaked mud. Newly hatched ducklings, de prived of the all important water, died each year in uncounted thousands. Year after year brought no elief, only greater thirst and few

The great Canadian prairies of the north country, last of the vast nest ing and breeding grounds, were be ing conquered by the plow and golden miles of wheat waved where once millions of waterfowl had hatched and taken to wing. The wintering grounds of the South drained lato the bayous and Gulf.

All along the flyway hunters peered from blinds and searched in vain for fowl winging southward. By 1935 the uncountable hordes had Leen reduced to a pitiful remnant, a short thirty million. The end of waterfowling was in sight.

Man too was in trouble. The vast vheatfields of the prairie states were a giant dustbowl. The underground water level was falling rapidly and the prairie lakes that had held back the life giving fluid while it found its slow way into the subsoil were no more. Scourged by winds driven by sand, soil and alka-It even man abandoned the once fertile fieldys. He and the ducks were caught in the vicious trap set and baited by his failure wisely to use the gifts of the earth that bore

Fortunately there were among us nen who had a knowledge, an understanding of these omens of disaster, and they set about the task with a great will-and a great lack of funds. They hounded government agencies, state an federal; they organized pleaded, taught and worked. Soon their efforts gained momentum. New and powerful groups arose in the field of conservation, groups with names that still mean sportsmanship, decency, conservation and wiser use of soil, water and other natural resources: Ducks Unlimited, the National Wildlife Federation, and the Wildlife Management

Backed by these organizations, and by individual sportsmen, new lakes began to appear, new laws limiting the kill. Refuges where migrating ducks might escape for a while the relentless guns of hunters began to dot the land. The rains came back at this opportune time and with them the waterfowl population increased fourfold in a decade. All man's efforts counted not so much as the rain and without it the increase would have been desparingly small. But the rains came -and once again the hunters in the dawn knew the thrill of whispering wings and flashing feathers. Through World War II the waerfowl population increased and n came 1945 and millions of reng veterans went afield with newfound mastery of shot and er. Hunting pressure increased dously; we suddenly lost one our ducks.
