Light week for police

Iowa Park police were kept busy during the past week, warning people against setting off fireworks within the city limits in violation of city ordinance.

Otherwise, there was little activity requiring the attention of officers. Only three arrests were included in the week's police blotter.

Officers responded at 4:40 a.m. Thursday to a reported assault at a residence in the 1000 block of Lanelle.

The complainant reported her ex-husband had knocked down a door, entered, and was assaulting her boyfriend.

Chad Brent Reed, 22, was taken into custody and charged with Class A assault and also criminal mischief. He was treated at the scene by emergency medical personnel, and then taken by private vehicle to a Wichita Falls hospital for additional treatment.

Reed was transported at 10:13 a.m. to the county jail, according to the police blotter.

Two other arrests were made during the week, both on outstanding warrants issued by Iowa Park police.

Jerry Lynn Selvidge, 33, was arrested at 9:17 a.m. Friday in the 400 block of Johnson Road. His warrant was for speeding, with a \$127 fine.

Selvidge later paid \$30 toward his fine, and was released after promising to appear in municipal court.

At 1:41 a.m. Monday in the 1600 block of Wigley Road, officers arrested Charles Edward Houston, 21.

A commitment order had been issued for Houston, for twice violating city ordinance prohibiting consuming alcohol in city parks.

Houston was transported at 3:45 a.m. to the county jail, according to the police blotter.

City council slates meeting for Monday

Several topics appear on the tentative agenda for Monday night's meeting of the city council.

The meeting, which is to get underway at 7 p.m. in council chambers, will be the first for the council since June 14.

Though regularly-scheduled meetings of the council are on the second and fourth Mondays each month, the June 28 meeting was postponed due to lack of requests, according to city authorities.

The one issue that was on the June 28 agenda that will be heard Monday is a request by Joe Voyles,

who is requesting permission to purchase city water for his residence on Burnett Ranch Road, which is outside the city limits.

Aldermen are to consider approving a proposed resolution which would authorize the mayor to execute an amendment to the lease agreement with Wichita Falls Celltelco Partnership.

The agreement covers continuation of an agreement with the firm to have antennas atop the south water tower.

An ordinance to be considered Monday concerns a request to re-

zone a 7.44 acre tract of land in the 1200 block of West Smith.

The property, which has been the location of Cornerstone Pentecostal Church of God, reportedly has been purchased by Bell Processing, for use as offices.

City Administrator Mike Price

will ask the council for permission to seek proposals for auditing services relating to the city's general fund and water and sewer fund.

Price also will discuss with the council a proposed list of streets to be slurred this year.

Hard-working couple enjoying retirement

Setting high goals, hard work and a devoted wife, Charlene, brings Doyle Parks pleasure and pride during his retirement.

Parks says all he has accomplished he must give his wife credit for. He added, "She even dressed me. I never had to go shopping, she always did my shopping and coordinated my wardrobe, so all I had to do was put my clothes on," he said.

When Doyle and Charlene Raglin married in September 1954 she put furthering her education aside and followed him and his career and raised their children, Doyle stated. Charlene was quick to say she furthered her education, she just doesn't have certificates.

Doyle and Charlene had heard about one another through the owner of the Breckenridge Dry Cleaners, Doyle Newcomb.

Doyle was in Breckenridge, visiting his parents, while on leave from the Air Force. When he took his uniforms to the cleaners Mr. Newcomb told him of Charlene and stated he needed to meet her.

It wasn't until they ran into one another at the post office that Doyle felt bold enough to ask Charlene to go to church with him.

She accepted and he then asked her to attend the evening service. After the evening service, a movie. Three dates in one day, the rest is history. They were married September 11, 1954.

Doyle's parents, Byron "B.B." and Mary Esther Parks, had moved to Breckenridge from Archer City after the company his father was employed by, Texas Pipe Line, received a contract there.

The Parks family had moved to

Iowa Park from Holliday when Doyle was nine years old.

When the family moved to Iowa Park, in 1940, they stayed with Jack and Callie Zeck while they prepared the land B.B. had purchased, at Poe and Jackson.

When the land was cleared off they moved the Cobb house onto the land. The Cobb house had been located across the street south of Faith Baptist Church.

In 1947 Doyle was a senior and his father's job moved to Archer City. Mr. Parks sold their house to Louis and Agnus Quick, now the home of Charles and Nina Quick.

Doyle had not wanted to move his senior year. He stated in those

days if you transferred school you lost one year of sports eligibility.

In addition to being his senior year he was also a member of the Iowa Park Hawk football and basketball teams.

Doyle's father told him he could stay behind but he would need to be able to support himself.

The family of W.E. (Bill) Archer Jr. offered him a place in their home with their family. Doyle says he was treated as a son by Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Archer Sr.

Doyle said W.R. Bradford helped him get two jobs. One at the Hawks Nest for Carl and Jane Hoffman, just before, during and after the lunch hour. He added he had

study hall before and after lunch so he did not miss classes to work.

His other job was a janitor and assistant projectionist at the local theater for Mr. and Mrs. Joyce. It was while Doyle worked for the Joyce's that Mr. Joyce took his own life. Doyle says he was working that afternoon and he stayed with Mr. Joyce until Mr. Tanner came from the funeral home.

Doyle says despite many events, not all of them good, his senior year he was able to graduate from the W. F. George High School in 1948. He contributes that to the help of many good people in Iowa Park his senior year.

Doyle's father told him if he

planned to go to college that he would need to pay his own way because he just did not have the money to send him

In the fall of 1948, Doyle enrolled at Hardin College, now known as Midwestern State University. He majored in "knock-poker and shooting pool" for one semester.

Because he was independently trying to work his way through college at the end of his first semester, he dropped out.

He then worked at various oil field and other jobs before entering the Air Force in 1951.

When Doyle decided he wanted to enter the Air Force, he wanted to enter as an officer. When I ask why, he said that was just a goal he had set for himself.

After taking the written test he qualified for Officers Cadet School.

He enlisted out of Archer City and entered from Abilene. (His name is on the Archer County War Memorial in Archer City.) When Doyle took his physical he was declared legally blind in one eye and not fit for combat. Because of that he was retained at Lackland Air Force Base and trained to be an academic instructor.

Doyle said the first day of class he had such stage fright he could hardly stand up and say his name.

He taught basic math the first two years he was in the Air Force.

In 1953 the Air Force decided his bad eye was not relevant, and he could choose any career field he wanted. He selected jet air craft mechanic.

He separated from the Air Force Aug. 3, 1955.

He and Charlene moved to Archer City and he took a job at a

service station and she took a job as a secretary for the Archer City School District.

Charlene's previous job had been for Breckenridge Production, which lent money to farmers and ranchers for livestock and crops.

As we talked about jobs, with a twinkle in her eye, Charlene told me of her first job. She said when she was 15 years old she went to Woolworth and asked for a job. They ask her age and she replied 15. She was told they could not hire her because she was not 16. She said, "I walked across the street to Winn's. I aged a year crossing the street, and got my first job."

Charlene graduated from Breckenridge High School in 1951.

After working several low paying jobs Doyle landed a job with Texas Electric and was attending classes at Midwestern in the evening hours. In 1956 he heard about job openings at Sheppard Air Force Base.

Because he was afraid of losing his job with Texas Electric, he had one of Charlene's family members to take him an application. Doyle filled out the application and within an hour of the application being taken back to Sheppard he had an interview and was hired as an instructor at a GS-5 pay level. Doyle said at that time that was the lowest paying male position at Sheppard.

Charlene had taken a job for North Texas Federal Savings and Loan.

In 1959 the couple decided it was time to start a family so, Charlene left her job. When she left she put on her resignation, as her reason for leaving, to raise a family.

Doyle took a second job when

Carole said she and Jim really enjoy vegetables and she has given us some of their favorite recipes. She said they are particularly fond of "Barbecued Green Beans."

Tamale Beef Bake

- 1 lb. ground beef
 - 1 med. onion, chopped
 - 1 med. green pepper, chopped
 - 1 (10 3/4 oz.) can beef gravy
 - 1 - 12 oz. can whole kernel corn with sweet peppers, undrained
 - 1 Tbsp. chili powder
 - 1 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
 - 1 cup Cheddar cheese, shredded
 - 1 - 8 oz. pkg. corn muffin mix
- In 10-inch skillet, over medium

heat, brown beef and cook pepper and onion until vegetables are tender, stirring to separate meat. Spoon off fat.

Stir in gravy, corn, chili powder, and Worcestershire sauce. Heat to boiling. Reduce heat to low; cover and simmer 10 minutes. Remove from heat. Stir in cheese. Prepare corn muffin mix according to package. Spread batter over bottom and up sides of a 2-quart baking dish. Spoon beef mixture into center of dish, carefully spreading mixture to sides. Bake at 400 degrees 20 minutes or until mixture is bubbly and corn bread is golden brown.

Baked Asparagus

In cast iron skillet melt 1/2 stick butter till hot. Add asparagus. Cover almost completely with Kraft Italian blend parmesan cheese. Bake 30 minutes at 400 degrees. About the last 5-10 minutes turn on broiler to brown.

Barbecued Green Beans

- 4 slices bacon, diced
 - 1 med. onion, chopped
 - 2 - 16 oz. cans whole green beans, drained
 - 1 - 10 1/2 oz. can tomato soup, undiluted
 - 2 Tbsps. brown sugar
 - 2 Tbsps. barbecue sauce
- Fry bacon in skillet. Add chopped onion and cook until golden. Add remaining ingredients. Mix thoroughly and pour into a greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Bake at 350 degrees 30 minutes or until heated through.

Sweet Potato Casserole

- 5 cups mashed sweet potatoes
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1/3 cup butter
 - 1/4 cup milk
 - 1 tsp. vanilla
 - 1/2 tsp. cloves
 - 2 eggs
 - 1 1/2 tsp. salt
- Whip together and pour into buttered casserole dish.
- Topping:**
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
 - 1/2 cup chopped pecans
 - 1/4 cup softened butter (NOT MELTED)
 - 1/4 cup flour

Blend together with fork and spread on top of sweet potatoes. Bake at 350 degrees, uncovered, 30-45 minutes.

Strawberry Salad

- 1 large or 2 small pkgs. strawberry jello
 - 4 bananas, mashed
 - 1 1/2 cup boiling water
 - 2 cups sour cream
 - 1 No. 2 can crushed pineapple, drained
 - 2 pkgs. frozen strawberries
- Mix 1 1/2 cups boiling water to jello. Add frozen strawberries, pineapple, and bananas. Pour half mixture into bowl and put in fridge until set, keeping other half of mixture at room temperature. After first half sets, spread sour cream over. Then pour in rest of mixture and refrigerate. After mixture sets, can top with more sour cream (optional).

Chocolate Fudge

- 2 cups sugar
 - 1 small (5 oz.) can evaporated milk
 - 80 small or 10 large marshmallows (large preferred)
 - 1 stick margarine
 - 3/4 tsp. vanilla
 - 1 small pkg. (6oz.) semi-sweet chocolate chips
 - Pinch salt
 - 1 cup nuts
- Cook sugar, milk, marshmallows, vanilla, salt and butter in heavy saucepan for 6 minutes, using medium heat. Place chocolate chips in large bowl and pour hot mixture over them. Beat until well blended and creamy. Drop by teaspoonful onto waxed paper and press one nut onto each piece.

Free and reduced lunch applications available

Applications are now available for students who qualify for free and reduced-priced lunches in the Iowa Park CISD cafeterias.

A letter and application form is being sent to the parents of all students in the Iowa Park school district. Those who qualify to get free or reduced-price meals for their child must fill out the form and return it to the school.

Cost of lunches in the local school cafeterias are: high school, \$1.50; junior high, \$1.50; Bradford Elementary, \$1.35; and Kidwell Elementary, \$1.25. Breakfast is free for all students at Kidwell, but the price is 75-cents on the other campuses. Students who qualify can get meals free or at a reduced price.

If you now get food stamps or TANF for your children, they can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amounts on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals or reduced-price meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is 40-cents for lunch, and 30-cents for breakfast.

However, I'm sure that everyone participating will purchase all their soft drinks and sandwiches in Wichita Falls to take with them. That way, they'll keep their buying at home.

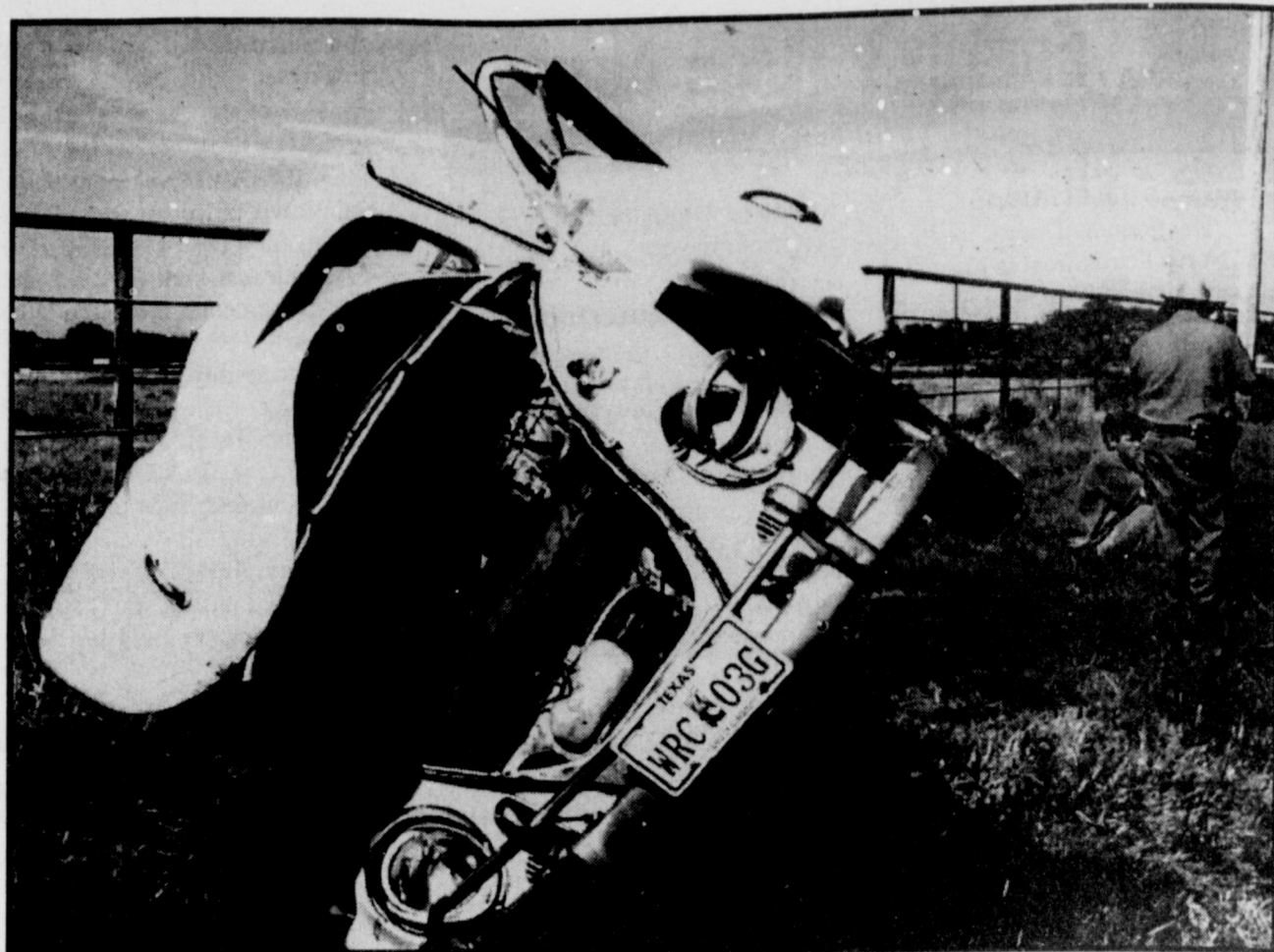
Surely none of the golfers will stop off at Graham, or anywhere near the course, to spend their money,

which is intended to benefit Wichita Falls.

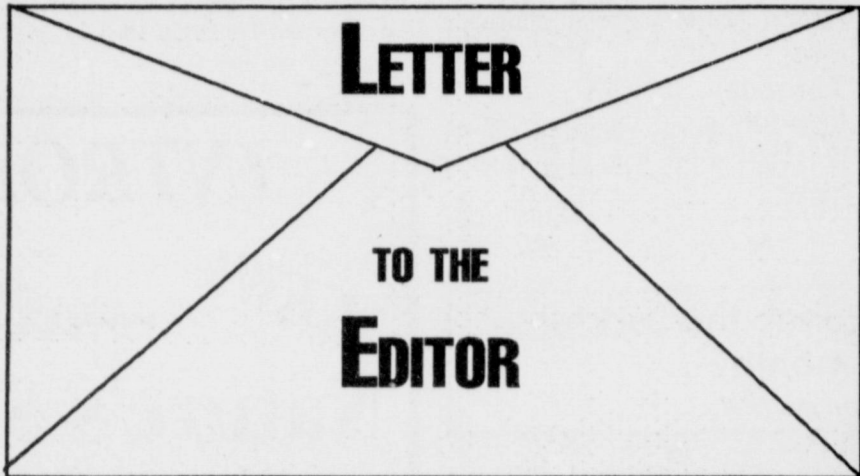
After all, that's what they tell us happens to people who are traveling to events at the MPEC. We're told folks going there from here, and points west, do their gas and food buying here enroute to their destination.

GARDENING HINTS

BY MARK TERNIG

Q. We have a beautiful garden this spring in Burkburnett. Our main concern is that our tomatoes are developing these black areas on the bottom of the fruit. What is causing this? It really destroys the look of the tomato.

A. The tomato problem you have described is termed Blossom End Rot. Many gardeners have experienced this problem recently.

The main cause of Blossom End Rot is inconsistent soil moisture levels. For example, going from wet to dry with no real stability in soil moisture.

Container grown plants are regularly hit because the containers tend to dry out very rapidly, but the problem is still fairly common in raised beds and in-ground.

Try using a mulch around your tomato plants. Using several inches of mulch will help moderate soil temperatures, reduce weed growth, and most importantly hold the soil moisture at a more consistent range.

There is also an indication that calcium deficiencies can lead to Blossom End Rot, so use a fertilizer that contains some calcium as a minor element. Most of the commonly available water-soluble plant foods contain some degree of calcium.

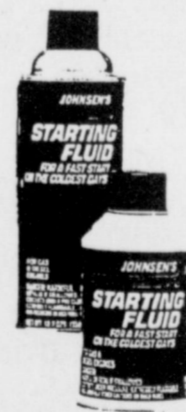

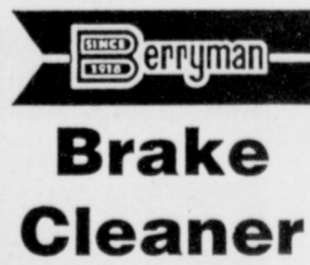

Charlene left her job. He became partners with a friend, Jack Wells, in a janitorial business.

The business was operated nights and weekends and was quite successful.

They had contracts with such places as State National Bank and Lone Star Gas, to name a few. They operated the business from 1963 until 1988. The Parks started their family and have two children, Debra Kay and Charles Byron.

Debra graduated from Iowa Park High School in 1977 and Charles in 1979.

The couple wanted their children to attend a small school so they decided to move to Iowa Park, since Doyle had lived here before.

The family moved to Iowa Park in 1963 and bought a house on Emma Drive. Later they decided that house wasn't large enough so they bought their current home on Yosemite and Poe from J. C. Roby.

They tore the house down and built their dream home. They moved into the home in December 1966.

Eighteen years after Charlene left her job with North Texas Federal Savings and Loan she received a call from them asking her to return to work. She returned to work until 1981, when she left to care for her and Doyle's aging parents.

Doyle knew when he took the job at Sheppard Air Force Base that to receive advancements he would need to take on extra duties.

Some of his extra duties included writing the study guide for student testing for his area of instruction.

During his research for this subject he learned why we have a leap year. He explained the earth rotates every 23 hours, 56 minutes and 4.9 seconds, instead of the 24 hours we think. So 24 hours times 365 times four equals one extra day. Another area he took as extra duty was learning about, and then writing the study guide for, digital computers.

One of the last large extra duty assignments he took on was writing the curriculum for the School of Health Care of Science. His expertise was not medical, but the ability to sit down with doctors, nurses and other medical professionals enabled him to develop a course of instruction from their input.

He added that all four of these courses were new to the Air Force so they were all motivated to learn and do well.

All of Doyle's extra and hard work paid off.

In 1976 he received his Bachelor of Science in Occupation of Education, just 28 years after he first enrolled in college.

In 1986 he retired as a GM-13. There is only one higher position on base. His boss held that position and Doyle asked his boss if he was going to retire so that he (Doyle) could have that position. His boss thought about it and decided he was not ready to retire, so Doyle retired with 30 years of service.

Doyle said during his career he received every award available for civil service. After he retired he was called back to accept the Outstanding Civil Service Medal. Doyle said receiving this award was truly unexpected and he is very proud of it.

Charlene told of attending Doyle's retirement party. She said she had not attended a retirement party in the past, so when they called her to accept a plaque and certificate she was shocked. She stated "I did not know what to say. The only thing I did was push him out the door and lock it." Doyle said, "that brought the roof down."

Doyle says he would have never been able to accomplish anything if it wasn't for Charlene. She took care of

me and all of my co-workers knew this.

Doyle said he has been retired almost 14 years and has not regretted it one time. He had been told that being with your spouse 24 hours a day would be hard. But, he said it has been great and it gets better everyday.

He says he now helps her as much as possible with her hobby, family genealogy.

Doyle proudly stated that Charlene had already published two books and is working on three others on family genealogy. He added when she does a book for a family, she only charges the cost of the publishing and binding.

"We don't work for money," he said. "When we talked about retiring we decided we would only retire if we could retire and not have to worry about making money."

Doyle enjoys bragging on Charlene. He told of one of her larger projects.

She chaired the committee of "Happy Birthday Iowa Park."

He said the Iowa Park Historical and Genealogy Society obtained written permission from Bob Hamilton, the publisher of the *Iowa Park Leader*, to have the October 20, 1988 issue of the *Leader* bond into a book. The issue had 64 pages of family and Iowa Park history and 16 pages of current events.

All proceeds from the sale of the book goes to the society. He stated Mr. Hamilton would not accept money from the sale of the book. This has been very meaningful to the society and has made it possible for them to increase their genealogy material at the Tom Burnett Library.

Charlene took the paper and wrote down each name mentioned and what page it was mentioned, each time it was mentioned. She entered

this information into her computer and then printed it out and had a friend to combine the names and list the pages outside the names they are mentioned on. This creating the index for the Happy Birthday Iowa Park book.

They also proof read the entire paper seeking any information that might not be correct and created the Errata. All 345 pages of the book is as it was printed in paper form, with no changes.

There were 206 books made available for sale and the printer has 22 additional books on hold.

Charlene says they have nine more books and that will be all, unless they decide to get the 22 books from the printer.

Another of Charlene's projects was video taping movies and news for her niece who lived in Nigeria. She had six VCR's set up so she could tape various shows at once.

She had also taken care of their

aging parents for 19 years. Doyle said for 19 years they went to the nursing home at least once a day.

Charlene is a member of the North Texas Genealogy Association, Genealogy Society of Southern Illinois, Marshall County Kentucky Genealogy and the Iowa Park Historical and Genealogy Society.

Charlene also served on the Iowa Park School Centennial committee.

Doyle says that he doesn't like to travel, but he will take Charlene

anywhere she needs to go as long as he can get back and sleep in his bed.

Doyle says it seems he can't do anything without Charlene helping him. She stated, "Yes you can, but you just like the company."

Doyle says that life is so full it's hard to imagine.

The couple get a blessing out of helping others, but no matter what they do for their friends they will not except pay. Doyle says that taking money takes the joy out of helping.
