Native grass pastures are looking good at this time of year. It has been found that the best time of year to stock a pasture heavy is from early spring to June 15. Grazing a pasture or range in this manner helps eliminate weeds and annual grasses, especially if some of the cattle are sold or moved to another pasture to permit the pasture to rest during summer months. R. W. Ramming and G. H. Gwinn buy steers only in fall, graze them on wheat and native pasture through winter and spring or until about June 15 and sell all cattle. Both the above farmers' pastures are definitely on the road to improvement by this grazing method.






