Hawk-Husky clash Friday

You know, this could sound like a commercial you might see on television or at school telling you the about the dangers of using drugs.

Speed Kills !!!

Or it could be what head coach Weldon Nelms is preaching to his players as they get ready to take on Hirschi Friday night at 7:30 in Memorial Stadium in Wichita Falls.

This just in... The Huskies are fast. Real fast.

With seven offensive and eight defensive starters back from a team that played in the Class 4A Reigon II Championship Game, Hirschi's expectations for the '99 season are just as high as those of the Hawks.

Returning starters for the Huskies include three fourths of their starting backfield. The only player missing is quarterback Marvin Thompson, who graduated last year. Back are fullback Reggie Robinson, tailback Jerad Estus and wingback Courtney Smith. All three have excellent speed, as does Jared Franklin who has stepped in to fill the shoes left after Thompson's graduation.

"Hirschi is a team that is loaded with speed and has several weapons that can hurt you," said Nelms. "They are well coached and they are hungry. They made a nice run in the playoffs last year and they are definitely a playoff caliber team again this year."

The Huskies are led by their fullback Robinson, who is listed as 5-10, 180 lbs. Robinson rushed for a pair of touchdowns and 211 yards in Hirschi's 24-10 win over Lawton MacArthur last week. Robinson averaged 14 yards per carry and also caught a pass for another 17 yards.

The rest of the team rushed for a minus three yards in the game. Estus finished with 42 yards on 13 carries while Franklin finished with four carries for a minus 37 yards. Smith lost eight yards in his two tries.

Franklin finished 2-of-6 in the game against Lawton Mac for 13 yards. His other completion was to Smith for a 4-yard loss.

"Robinson's their big gun," said Nelms. "He's big and explosive and can go the distance in a hurry if we don't shut him down early. Their quarterback did a good job in his first start. He can throw the ball well, but he is more of a runner. He seems to

look to run first and throw second. Estus is another good back. He's 6-1, 190 lbs. and we can't overlook him. He has excellent speed and can score from anywhere on the field."

Up front the Huskies are much smaller than Iowa Park, averaging only 209 to the Hawks 269. Defensively Iowa Park is averaging just over 278 per man.

"We've got to concentrate on stopping them up the middle," Nelms added. "We have to force them to the perimeter. They seem to run the ball better inside, so we're going to try and get them to run outside. Then we'll have to do a super job of containment. You have to respect their entire offense. You can't shut one guy down and expect to stop them."

If things hold true to form, you shouldn't see nearly as many stunts and blitzes as you saw from the Bulldogs. Hirschi tends to play more of a read-and-react type defense, with several guys that like to hit.

Defensive players to watch for Hirschi include Brian Collier, a 6-0 250 lb. lineman; Chris Dixon, a 6-3 190 lb. linebacker, and Smith, a 5-10, 170 lb. free safety. Up front along the defensive line, Hirschi weighs in at just over 208 pounds per man.

"This is definitely going to be our toughest challenge so far," said Nelms, who saw his team climb another spot to Sixth in the latest Associated Press Poll. "We need to make it a physical game, which should work in our advantage with our size. And we need to control the football. We have to be consistent and stay focused for four quarters of football. We lost some of our focus in the third quarter against Burk and you can't do that in big games and expect to come out on top."

"I also thought our kicking game was a huge plus for us last week," Nelms added. "And I think the kicking game will play a big part in this game as well. We were plus 192 yards and we were in good field position for most of the night. We're going to need another big night out of our special teams again this week."

The Hawks are coming into the game on a nice roll themselves, averaging 37 points per contest and 315 yards rushing in two games.

Meeting on prayer draws crowd

A crowd of more than 70 people from various religious denominations met at the Recreational Activities Center to discuss the Fifth Circuit Court's ruling that a prayer being said over the loudspeaker before sporting events is impermissible.

Recently, school officials were put on notice by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) that, "outside the context of high school graduation, schools may never officially endorse, sponsor or promote prayer." Superintendent of Schools Mike Caplinger has said that the school district has no choice but to comply.

Larry Washburn, minister of Pacific Avenue Missionary Baptist Church, was moderator for the meeting, that was held last Thursday night.

Washburn began by emphasizing that the matter should be handled in a positive manner. "The school board's hands are tied," he said. "But they are following the laws of the

land, which in effect is sending a positive message."

"We, as parents, can send the wrong message to our kids if we don't follow the law," he stated.

Washburn suggested that people let the school board members and superintendent know they understand their position and are behind them.

The meeting was described by several in the audience as one of harmony and fellowship, with people from all denominations coming together for a common cause. "The purpose of this meeting crosses denominational boundaries - it is a God thing," one man said.

A lady commented that the only thing lost is the loudspeaker. After a period of discussion, those attending agreed that during the period of silence before the next football game, they would stand and recite The Lord's Prayer, which they felt is universal and encompasses most religions.

When someone said the group could possibly be an example for other school districts with this problem, a lady from Wichita Falls spoke up. She said that she was impressed with the way in which the group handled themselves and hoped they could have something similar in Wichita Falls.

Forms were available at the door with the names, addresses and phone numbers of U.S. Senators for those who want to contact them and ask support in overturning the appeals court decision.

The group was told that direct phone calls are effective and having a certain day and time to call was suggested. When the day for making the calls is decided, members of the group will be informed and a notice run in *The Iowa Park Leader*.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Washburn told the audience that school is not the only place to pray. "Start praying with your children at

home," he said.

Board to meet

School board members will continue to address the school prayer issue at their regular meeting tonight, which is scheduled to get underway at 7:30 in the W.F. George Middle School Library.

Tracy Eaton has requested time to address the board about school prayer, and school trustees will vote on a resolution concerning prayer at football games.

Also, during the open forum portion of the meeting, a public hearing will be held on the Academic Excellence Indicator System.

Agenda items calling for action by the board include:

- * extracurricular band and athletic policies for 1999-2000;
- * field trips/fundraisers
- * Hawk Stadium concession usage guidelines; and

TEA recommended Student Performance Domain as an addition to the Superintendent's Appraisal.

Supt. Mike Caplinger will give a report on facility plans, bond proceeds investments, band uniforms, and his goals for 1999-2000.

A portion of the meeting will be closed to: "accept resignations and employ personnel."

Council to study ordinance

The city's ordinance concerning curfew hours for minors will undergo its second public hearing during Monday night's regularly-scheduled

meeting of the city council.

Such hearings are required by state law, according to City Administrator Mike Price, in order for council members to evaluate effectiveness and make any desired changes.

At the first of the two hearings, no comments were made either from the audience or by aldermen that would indicate any changes were either desired or needed.

A public appearance has been requested by Steven Raby, who is to seek permission to use the old Recreational Activities Center building for a haunted house project again this Halloween.

Two subjects on the meeting agenda are listed under the topic of "bid action."

The first is to "score and rank Administrative RFP's and award a contract for administrative services for the 1999 Texas Capital Fund Real

Estate program in conjunction with Kathy's Kakes."

The second is to "consider authorizing the City Administrator to advertise for bids for janitorial services on city-owned facilities."

A resolution will be considered which, if approved, would authorize the mayor to execute a contract for the purchase of the property concerned in the Kathy's Kakes project.

Another resolution concerns accepting the 1999 certified city tax roll.

Administrator Price is to discuss with the council a report which is now required under state law, which concerns a report to be mailed to all city water customers concerning 1998 drinking water quality.

Also to be discussed is a proposal to allow the police department to use vacant lots at the Emerald Street water tower as a drug dog training area.

City receives rebate check

The City of Iowa Park has received a sales tax rebate check this month from the state comptroller's office in the amount of \$26,360.64.

That is a whopping increase of 39.80 percent from the same month last year, according to the report.

The rebate includes local sales taxes collected in July and reported to the comptroller in August.

For the year, Iowa Park is running 16.02 percent ahead of 1998, with a total of \$246,301.14.

Wichita Falls is 2.24 percent above last year, Burkburnett 1.62, and Electra is 62.01 percent, according to the report.

But that's not the situation in neighboring Holliday, which reportedly is running behind this time last year by 27.66 percent.

A meeting to begin planning the eighth grade end-of-year celebration will be held at 8 p.m. Monday at the Iowa Park RAC.

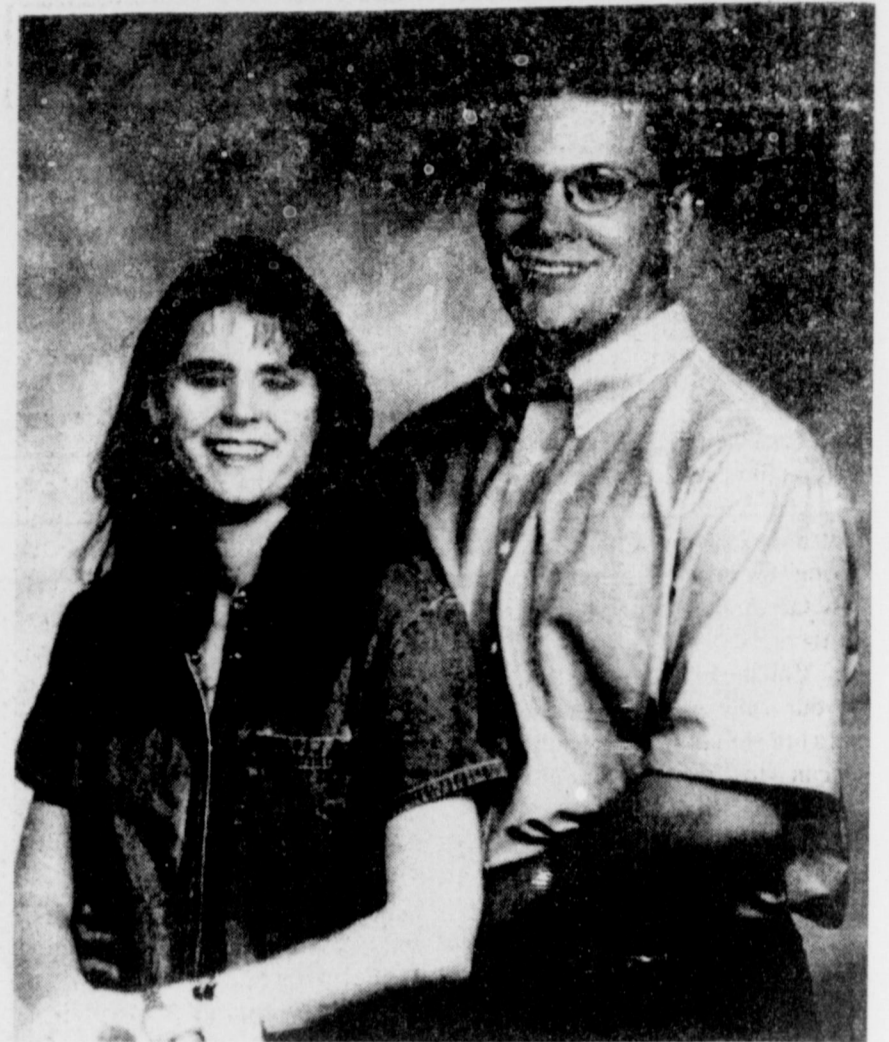
In addition to making plans for the celebration, fund-raising ideas will also be discussed. All parents of eighth grade students are asked to attend.

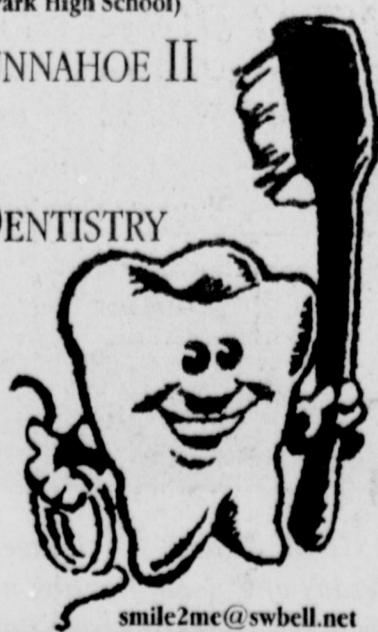

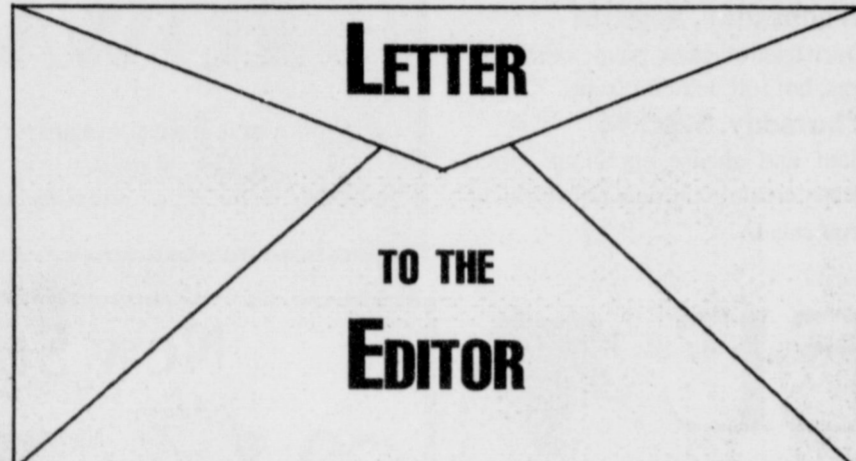
My, how time flies!

Police recover stolen car

 He was later released after signing a promise to appear in municipal court.
 Early Tuesday morning, Corey Robert Balk, 26, was picked up on warrants issued locally, for expired license plates and failure to maintain financial responsibility.
 He also was released after promising to appear in municipal court, according to the police blotter.
 Iowa Park police took two individuals into custody Monday, both on outstanding warrants issued by the Wichita County sheriff's office.
 Misty Lasheia White, AKA Hopkins, 21, reportedly was wanted on a warrant for possession of marijuana, with a fine of \$556.25. She was later turned over to a deputy to be transported to jail.
 That evening, Justin Lee Worley, 20, was picked up on a county-issued warrant for theft by check. He also was transported to jail.
 A resident in the 900 block of East Highway told police Tuesday morning that a lawnmower, valued at \$187, had been taken from his back yard, without permission. The case is under investigation.

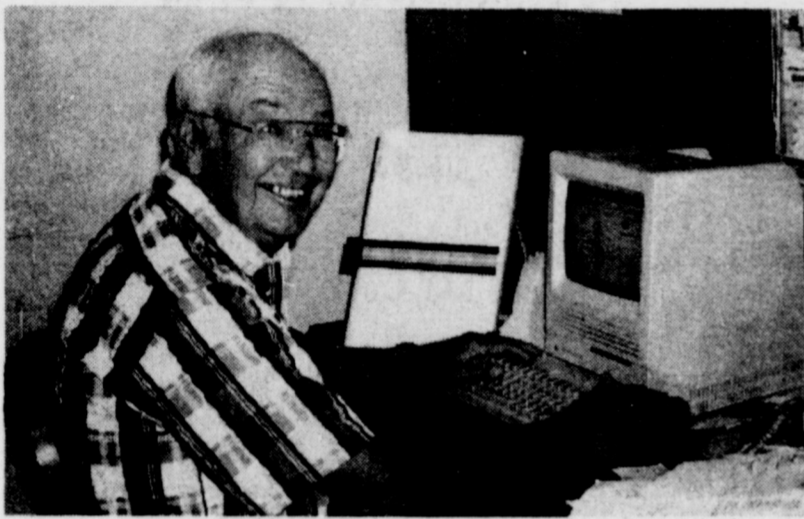

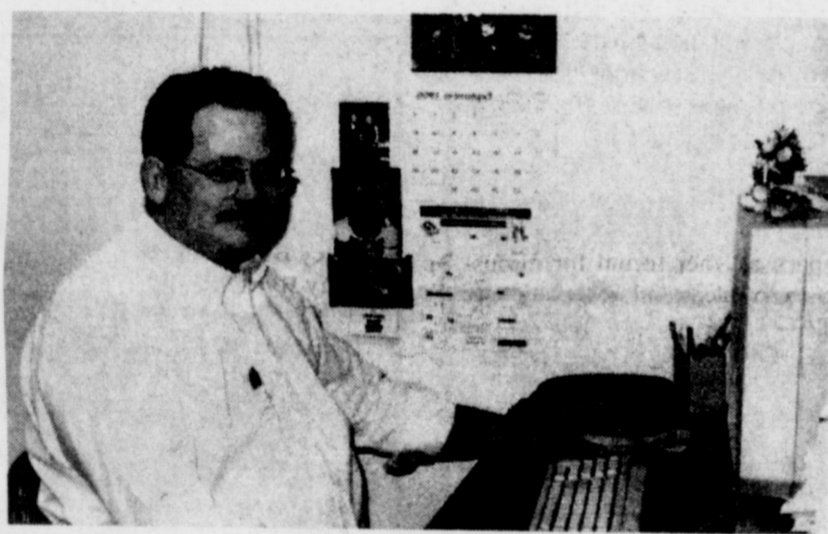

WHAT DOES GOD SAY? By Ross Saunders

About the inspiration of His word? Let us first look at internal evidence. "For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (2 Peter 1:21). "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16). "Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth." (John 16:13). "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you" (John 14:26). Jesus said in Matthew 10:19-20, "...for it shall be given you what ye shall speak. For it is not ye that speak, but the Spirit of your Father which speaketh in you." The apostles spake as the Spirit "gave them utterance" (Acts 2:4). The "inspired" apostle Paul said, "And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power: that no prophecy of the scripture is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (2 Peter 1:21). Any who read these Scriptures must either believe them or deny them. To deny them is to disbelieve in God or charge Him and His apostles with lying. The fact that all of our Lord's apostles except John died deaths by martyrdom, attests to their credibility.

The word "inspiration" means "God breathed." The Scriptures affirm that God guided the apostles by His Holy Spirit the write His truth in instruct, correct and reprove us. The consequence of not following His instruction is seen in the words of Jesus, who said, "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day" (John 12:48).

The little question that the inspired word of God, the Bible, is the best preserved book of antiquity. It has survived the onslaught of skeptics for centuries, but has recently been economically targeted by publishers. Modern so-called translations or version being printed are often inaccurate paraphrases or partial paraphrases. Others are written with less consideration of what God originally "inspired," interweaving human wisdom and interpretations under the guise of being easier to read, resulting in an uninspired message. Read the preface to the NIV. The King James Version, a literal word for word text, along with NKJ, and New American Standard, are recommended.

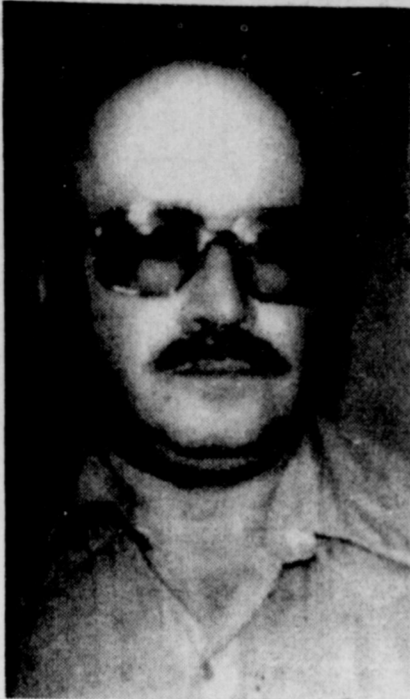

Hawks run over Bulldogs, 47-13

Forget everything you've ever heard about the statement that says the team that wins the time of possession usually wins the ballgame.

If that had been the case, Burkburnett would have killed the Hawks here Friday night in a battle of long-time rivals. But it was just the opposite. Despite running 20 fewer plays than the Bulldogs in just the first half alone, Iowa Park cruised to a 47-13 win, to improve to 2-0 while Burk fell to 0-1.

Iowa Park, which climbed to No. 6 in the latest Associated Press Poll after the win over the Bulldogs, managed to run only 15 total offensive plays to Burk's 35 in the first half. But it wasn't the number of the plays that mattered, as Iowa Park jumped out to a 27-6 halftime lead.

It didn't take long for the Hawks to light up the scoreboard. Burk took the opening kickoff and on the Bulldogs' second play from scrimmage, Chip Richmond was hit behind the line, forcing a fumble that Dustin Shierry recovered at the Bulldog 17. Two plays later Shierry scored on a 13-yard run with 10:38 left in the opening period to give Iowa Park a 6-0 lead. Rick Hartman added the first of his five point-after attempts to push the lead to 7-0.

After stopping the Bulldogs on downs on their next possession, Iowa Park was once again in business before a fumble turned the ball back over to Burk at the Iowa Park 33. The fumble was one of five by the Hawks, who lost four of the loose balls.

Burk capitalized on the mistake when Richmond scored from 16 yards out with 2:15 left in the period to pull the Bulldogs to within one at 7-6 after the point-after attempt failed.

But just as quickly as Richmond's touchdown silenced the Hawk crowd, Jessey Robertson got them back into the game in a hurry. Robertson bobbled the ensuing kickoff at his own 22, then picked it up and was off to the races, going 78 yards for the touchdown to swing the momentum back in Iowa Park's favor and giving the Hawks a 14-6 lead with 1:59 left in the opening quarter.

After forcing the Bulldogs to punt on their next possession, Iowa Park took over in excellent field position following a 14-yard punt. Ryan Huff broke off a 28 yard run that put the ball inside the 10, only to see the Hawks fumble it away on the next play at the 3-yard line as the period expired.

The second quarter was much like the first. Iowa Park ran only seven plays, but scored touchdowns on two of their first three plays in the period to extend the lead to 27-6.

Shierry scored his second touchdown of the game with 8:19 left in the half on a 43-yard scamper on the second play from scrimmage,



following another short punt by the Bulldogs.

On Burk's next possession, a fumble by Richmond, his second of the game, was recovered by Russell Duggins, giving Iowa Park the ball at their own 40.

On the first play from scrimmage, Chase Wright, who had scored three touchdowns in the opener against Holliday, broke a tackle and picked up some downfield blocks en route to his 60-yard touchdown with 5:34 left in the quarter.

Burk's only scoring opportunity came with 1:22 left in the half when Zachary Thornton missed wide right on a 32-yard field goal attempt.

The third quarter saw neither threaten, with Iowa Park losing another fumble in the period.

Burk got back on the board with 11:20 left in the fourth quarter when Richmond scored from 7 yards out. Thornton added the point-after to cut the Iowa Park lead to 27-13. Richmond's run capped an 11-play 66-yard drive.

That would be the last time the Bulldogs would sniff the endzone.

Iowa Park answered with three touchdowns in the game's final 11 minutes, the first coming on the Hawks' possession following the Burk touchdown.

Tyler Pulley tossed a 33-yard touchdown pass to Wright, who battled a pair of Bulldog defenders to pull down the pass, falling into the endzone for the score to make it 34-13 with 9:21 remaining.

Chris Simmons gave the Hawks excellent field position with a big fumble recovery on

Burk's ensuing possession, giving Iowa Park the ball at the Burk 23 with 7:10 left in the fourth. Five plays later, Michael Leal found the endzone from a yard out to push the score to 40-13 with 4:58 still showing on the clock. The big play of the drive was a 16-yard completion to Mason Adams from Pulley on a fourth-and-four play from the 17.

After another three-and-out by the Bulldogs, Iowa Park took over at the Bulldog 29 with just over three minutes left in the game. Four plays later, Jimmy Wilson capped the scoring with a 30-yard touchdown run to make the final score 47-13.

Leading rushers for the Hawks included, Huff with 79 yards on 12 carries, Wright with 59 yards on five carries, Shierry with 56 yards on five carries and Wilson with 40 yards on six tries.

Burk was led in rushing by Richmond, who finished with 120 yards on 27 carries. Jeff Jinks added 56 yards on 12 attempts.

COOK OF THE WEEK

30 years of recipes

In conjunction with *The Leader's* thirtieth anniversary this week, we are rerunning recipes that have been featured in our Cook of the Week columns during those years.

Green Enchilada Pie

Ingredients:
1 lb. ground beef
Garlic to taste
1/2 medium onion
1 cup grated cheese
1 can cream of chicken soup
1 can green chilies
1 pkg. tortillas

Brown meat slowly. Season with salt, pepper and garlic. Add chopped onion and cook until soft. Add chopped chilies. Add soup with 1 can water and simmer 15-20 minutes. Dip tortillas in hot grease just until soft. Put together in layers: tortillas, meat mixture, grated cheese - ending with cheese on top. Heat in oven 10-15 minutes or until cheese melts.

Pecan Delight Pie

Beat 1/2 tsp. baking soda into 3 egg whites. Beat until stiff. Add 1 cup chopped pecans and 20 Ritz crackers, finely crushed. Pour into buttered 9 or 10 inch pie pan. Bake 30 minutes at 325 degrees. Let cool completely.

Whip 1/2 pint cream or Dream Whip. Cover pie with cream and refrigerate overnight.

Aunt Bob's Taters

Ingredients:
5 cups cubed, cooked potatoes
Mix:
1 cup sour cream
1 1/2 - 2 cups small curd cottage cheese
1/4 cup chives
Garlic salt to taste

Pour this mixture over the potatoes in a casserole dish; mix well and cover with grated Longhorn cheese. Bake at 350 degrees 20-30 minutes or until bubbly hot and cheese is melted. (Serves 10-12).

These "taters" are great for a crowd and can be prepared a day ahead of serving - just be sure to get real hot.

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 44 - HJR 44 proposes a constitutional amendment that would ensure a clear succession in event of vacancies in the offices of Governor and Lieutenant Governor. Specifically, the amendment would provide that if after qualifying for the office, the Governor is temporarily unable to serve, the Lieutenant Governor shall act as Governor until the Governor is able to serve; but if the Governor is permanently unable to serve, the Lieutenant Governor shall become the Governor for the remainder of the unexpired term. The amendment would require a Lieutenant Governor who becomes Governor to forfeit the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment would also provide similar succession procedures when a vacancy occurs in the office of Governor before the newly elected Governor qualifies for office, and when the newly elected Governor is temporarily unable to take office. The amendment would also provide that if there is a temporary vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate will fill the position; but if there is a permanent vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor, the President pro tempore of the Senate shall serve as Lieutenant Governor until such time as the whole senate can convene to elect one of its members to perform the duties of Lieutenant Governor. Finally, the amendment would provide that if the Lieutenant Governor, while temporarily exercising the powers of the Governor, becomes temporarily disabled or unable to serve, the President pro tempore of the senate shall exercise the powers and authority of the office of the Governor until such time as the Governor or Lieutenant Governor resumes those powers and duties.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to revise the provisions for the filling of a vacancy in the office of governor or lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

SJR 12 - SJR 12 proposes a constitutional amendment that would resolve conflicts between the Texas Constitution and federal law relating to the definition, rules, and procedures of reverse mortgages. The amendment would define "reverse mortgage" in part as an extension of credit made against the homestead of a person who is 62 years or older, or whose spouse is 62 years or older. It would expand the list of circumstances under which payment of principal and interest become due and the procedures involved in foreclosure, and would require certain advances to be made according to specific terms in loan documents, including advances by the lender, on behalf of the borrower for payments necessary to protect the lender's interest. Finally, the amendment would require the Texas Supreme Court to promulgate rules of civil procedure expediting court-ordered foreclosures of reverse mortgage liens.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the making of advances under a reverse mortgage and payment of a reverse mortgage."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 62 - HJR 62 proposes a constitutional

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum size of an urban homestead to 10 acres, prescribing permissible uses of urban homesteads, and preventing the overburdening of a homestead."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 16 - HJR 16 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that if an employee is delinquent in paying court-ordered spousal maintenance, a portion of that employee's wages may be withheld to pay the spousal maintenance. Current law allows such withholding, or garnishment, only for payment of delinquent court-ordered child support.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing garnishment of wages for the enforcement of court-ordered spousal maintenance."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 95 - HJR 95 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that the adjutant general, who is appointed by the Governor and who serves as the governing officer of the state military forces, serves as long as the Governor wishes the appointed person to serve in that capacity rather than serving a specific two-year term set by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that the adjutant general serves at the pleasure of the governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 9 ON THE BALLOT

SJR 10 - SJR 10 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to create a judicial compensation committee to make recommendations for salaries for the justices and judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Courts of Appeals, and the District Courts. The amendment would mandate that the recommendations become law if neither the Senate nor the House of Representatives rejects them by the majority vote.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to create a judicial compensation commission."

PROPOSITION NO. 10 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 74 - HJR 74 proposes a constitutional amendment that would provide that the commissioner of health and human services, who is appointed by the Governor, serves as long as the Governor wishes the appointed person to serve in that capacity rather than serving a specific two-year term set by the legislature.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that the commissioner of health and human services serves at the pleasure of the governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 11 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 69 - HJR 69 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize a county, city, town, or other political subdivision to

PROPOSITION NO. 15 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 36 - HJR 36 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow spouses, by an agreement in writing, to convert all or part of their separate property into community property. Separate property is primarily the property owned or claimed by the spouse before marriage and the property acquired by the spouse during the marriage by gift or inheritance. Community property consists of the property, other than separate property, acquired by either spouse during marriage.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting spouses to agree to convert separate property to community property."

PROPOSITION NO. 16 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 71 - HJR 71 proposes a constitutional amendment that would allow a county with a population of 50,000 or more, rather than 30,000 or more, to be divided into four to eight justice of the peace and constable precincts. The amendment would also allow a county with a population between 18,000 and 50,000 to have two to eight justice of the peace and constable precincts, rather than the current maximum of five precincts. Furthermore, the amendment would limit Randall County to not less than two and not more than six precincts. Finally, the amendment would set a minimum of four precincts for any county that as of November 2, 1999, is divided into four or more precincts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that certain counties shall be divided into a specific number of precincts."

PROPOSITION NO. 17 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 58 - HJR 58 proposes a constitutional amendment which would require the board of regents of the University of Texas System to manage investments of the permanent university fund (PUF) according to the standards of a prudent investor. Generally, earnings from the PUF are distributed to the available university fund (AUF) and then ultimately distributed to the public university systems of Texas. Under the amendment, the amount distributed to the AUF would consist of distributions, as determined by the University of Texas System board of regents, from the total return on all investment assets of the PUF, instead of consisting only of the dividends, interest, and other income of the PUF minus administrative expenses. The amendment also would provide guidelines for minimum and maximum amounts to be distributed to the AUF, and require that the board of regents manage distributions to the AUF in a manner that will provide the AUF with a stable and predictable stream of annual distributions and maintain the purchasing power of the PUF investments and annual distributions to the AUF.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the investment of the permanent university fund and the distribution from the permanent university fund to the available university fund."

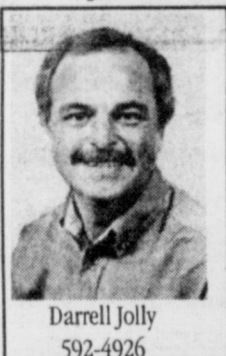

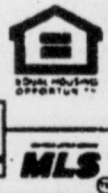
