Meeting on prayer draws crowd

A crowd of more than 70 people from various religious denominations met at the Recreational Activities Center to discuss the Fifth Circuit Court's ruling that a prayer being said over the loudspeaker before sporting events is impermissible.

Recently, school officials were put on notice by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) that, "outside the context of high school graduation, schools may never officially endorse, sponsor or promote prayer." Superintendent of Schools Mike Caplinger has said that the school district has no choice but to comply.

Larry Washburn, minister of Pacific Avenue Missionary Baptist Church, was moderator for the meeting, that was held last Thursday night.

Washburn began by emphasizing that the matter should be handled in a positive manner. "The school board's hands are tied," he said. "But they are following the laws of the

The city's ordinance concerning

land, which in effect is sending a positive message."

"We, as parents, can send the wrong mesage to our kids if we don't follow the law," he stated.

Washburn suggested that people let the school board members and superintendent know they understand their position and are behind them.

The meeting was described by several in the audience as one of harmony and fellowship, with people from all denominations coming together for a common cause. "The purpose of this meeting crosses denominational boundaries - it is a God thing," one man said.

A lady commented that the only thing lost is the loudspeaker. After a period of discussion, those attending agreed that during the period of silence before the next football game, they would stand and recite The Lord's Prayer, which they felt is universal and encompasses most re-

When someone said the group could possibly be an example for other school districts with this problem, a lady from Wichita Falls spoke up. She said that she was impressed with the way in which the group handled themselves and hoped they could have something similar in Wichita Falls.

Forms were available at the door with the names, addresses and phone numbers of U.S. Senators for those who want to contact them and ask support in overturning the appeals court decision.

The group was told that direct phone calls are effective and having a certain day and time to call was suggested. When the day for making the calls is decided, members of the group will be informed and a notice run in The Iowa Park Leader.

Speed Kills !!! Or it could be what head coach Weldon Nelms is preaching to his players as they get ready to take on Hirschi Friday night at 7:30 in Memorial Stadium in Wichita Falls.

This just in. . . The Huskies are fast. Real fast.

With seven offensive and eight defensive starters back from a team that played in the Class 4A Reigon II Championship Game, Hirschi's expectations for the '99 season are just as high as those of the Hawks.

Returning starters for the Huskies include three fourths of their starting backfield. The only player missing is quarterback Marvin Thompson, who graduated last year. Back are fullback Reggie Robinson, tailback Jerad Estus and wingback Courtney Smith. All three have excellent speed, as does Jared Franklin who has stepped in to fill the shoes left after Thompson's graduation.

"Hirschi is a team that is loaded with speed and has several weapons that can hurt you," said Nelms." They are well coached and they are hungry. Thay made a nice run in the playoffs last year and they are definitely a playoff caliber team again this year."

The Huskies are led by their fullback Robinson, who is listed as 5-10, 180 lbs. Robinson rushed for a pair of touchdowns and 211 yards in Hirschi's 24-10 win over Lawton MacArthur last week. Robinson averaged 14 yards per carry and also caught a pass for another 17 yards.

The rest of the team rushed for a minus three yards in the game. Estus finished with 42 yards on 13 carries while Frankiln finished with four carries for a minus 37 yards. Smith lost eight yards in his two tries.

Franklin finished 2-of-6 in the game against Lawton Mac for 13 yards. His other completion was to Smith for a 4-yard loss.

"Robinson's their big gun," said Nelms. "He's big and explosive and can go the distance in a hurry if we don't shut him down early. Their quarterback did a good job in his first start. He can throw the ball well, but he is more of a runner. He seems to Estus is another good back. He's 6-1, 190 lbs. and we can't overlook him. He has excellent speed and can score from anywhere on the field."

Up front the Huskies are much smaller than Iowa Park, averaging only 209 to the Hawks 269. Defensively Iowa Park is averaging just over 278 per man.

"We've got to concentrate on stopping them up the middle," Nelms added. "We have to force them to the perimeter. They seem to run the ball better inside, so we're going to try and get them to run outside. Then we'll have to do a super job of containment. You have to respect their entire offnese. You can't shut one guy down and expect to stop them."

If things hold true to form, you shouldn't see nearly as many stunts and blitzes as you saw from the Bulldogs. Hirschi tends to play more of a read-and-react type defense, with several guys that like to hit.

Defensive players to watch for Hirschi include Brian Collier, a 6-0 250 lb. lineman; Chris Dixon, a 6-3 190 lb. linebacker, and Smith, a 5-10, 1701b. free safety. Up front along the defensive line, Hirschi weighs in at just over 208 pounds per man.

"This is definitely going to be our toughest challenge so far," said Nelms, who saw his team climb another spot to Sixth in the latest Associated Press Poll. "We need to make it aphysical game, which should work in our advantage with our size. And we need to control the football. We have to be consistent and stay focused for four quarters of football. We lost some of our focus in the third quarter against Burk and you can't do that in big games and expect to come out on top.

"I also thought our kicking game was a huge plus for us last week," Nelms added. "And I think the kicking game will play a big part in this game as well. We were plus 192 yards and we were in good field position for most of the night. We're going to need another big night out of our special teams again this week."

The Hawks are coming into the game on a nice roll themselves, averaging 37 points per contest and 315 yards rushing in two games.

The City of Iowa Park has received a sales tax rebate check this month from the state comptroller's office in the amount of \$26,360.64.


That is a whopping increase of 39.80 percent from the same month last year, according to the report. The rebate includes local sales

taxes collected in July and reported to the comptroller in August. For the year, Iowa Park is run-

ning 16.02 percent ahead of 1998. with a total of \$246,301.14. Wichita Falls is 2.24 percent

above last year, Burkburnett 1.62, and Electra is 62.01 percent, according to the report.

But that's not the situation in neighboring Holliday, which reportedly is running behind this time last year by 27.66 percent.

Administrator Price is to discuss with the council a report which is now required under state law, which concerns a report to be mailed to all city water customers concerning 1998 drinking water quality.


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

At Harvard, he served as the Supreme Court Chair of the Harvard Law Review. He took the Texas Bar exam in July.



WHAT DOES GOD SAY?

About the inspiration of His word? Let us first look at internal evidence. "For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (2 Peter 1:21). "All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness" (2 Timothy 3:16). "Howbeit when he, the Spirit of truth, is come, he will guide you into all truth:" (John 16:13). "But the Comforter, which is the Holy Ghost, whom the Father will send in my name, he shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you" (John 14:26). Jesus said in Matthew 10:19-20, "...for it shall be given you what Ye shall speak. For it is not ye that speak, but the Spirit of your Father which speaketh in you." The apostles spake as the Spirit "gave them utterance" (Acts 2:4). The "inspired" apostle Paul said, "And my speech and my preaching was not with enticing words of man's wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power: That your faith should not stand in the wisdom of men, but in the power of God" (1 Corinthians 2:4). He continues in verse 13, "Which things also we speak, not in the words which man's wisdom teacheth, but which the Holy Ghost teacheth;..." The apostle Peter affirmed that "no prophecy of the scripture is of any private interpretation. For the prophecy came not in old time by the will of man: but holy men of God spake as they were moved by the Holy Ghost" (2 Peter 1:21). Any who read these Scriptures must either believe them or deny them. To deny them is to disbelieve in God or charge Him and His apostles with lying. The fact that all of our Lord's apostles except John died deaths by martyrdom, attests to their

The word "inspiration" means "God breathed." The Scriptures affirm that God guided the apostles by His Holy Spirit the write His truth in instruct, correct and reprove us. The consequence of not following His instruction is seen in the words of Jesus, who said, "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day" (John 12:48).

The is little question that the inspired word of God, the Bible, is the best preserved book of antiquity. It has survived the onslaught of skeptics for centuries, but has recently been economically targeted by publishers. Modern so-called translations or version being printed are often inaccurate paraphrases or partial paraphrases. Others are written with less consideration of what God originally "inspired," interweaving human wisdom and interpretations under the guise of being easier to read, resulting in an uninspired message. Read the preface to the NIV. The King James Version, a literal word for word text, along with NKJ, and New American Standard, are recommended.




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
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Hawks run over Bulldogs, 47-13

Forget everything you've ever heard about the statement that says the team that wins the time of possession usually wins the ballgame.

If that had been the case, Burkburnett would have killed the Hawks here Friday night in a battle of long-time rivals. But it was just the opposite. Despite running 20 fewer plays than the Bulldogs in just the first half alone, Iowa Park cruised to a 47-13 win, to improve to 2-0 while Burk fell to 0-1.

Iowa Park, which climbed to No. 6 in the latest Associated Press Poll after the win over the Bulldogs, managed to run only 15 total offensive plays to Burk's 35 in the first half. But it wasn't the number of the plays that mattered, as Iowa Park jumped out to a 27-6 halftime lead.

It didn't take long for the Hawks to light up the scoreboard. Burk took the opening kickoff and on the Bulldogs' second play from scrimmage, Chip Richmond was hit behind the line, forcing a fumble that Dustin Shierry recovered at the Bulldog 17. Two plays later Shierry scored on a 13-yard run with 10:38 left in the opening period to give Iowa Park a 6-0 lead. Rick Hartman added the first of his five pointafter attempts to push the lead to 7-0.

After stopping the Bulldogs on downs on their next possession, Iowa Park was once again in business before a fumble turned the ball back over to Burk at the Iowa Park 33. The fumble was one of five by the Hawks, who lost four of the loose balls.

Burk capitalized on the mistake when Richmond scored from 16 yards out with 2:15 left in the period to pull the Bulldogs to within one at 7-6 after the point-after attempt failed.

But just as quickly as Richmond's touchdown silenced the Hawk crowd, Jessey Robertson got them back into the game in a hurry. Robertson bobbled the ensuring kickoff at his own 22, then picked it up and was off to the races, going 78 yards for the touchdown to swing the momentum back in Iowa Park's favor and giving the Hawks a 14-6 lead with 1:59 left in the opening quarter.

After forcing the Bulldogs to punt on their next possession, Iowa Park took over in excellent field position following a 14-yard punt. Ryan Huff broke off a 28 yard run that put the ball inside the 10, only to see the Hawks fumble it away on the next play at the 3-yard line as the period expired.

The second quarter was much like the first. Iowa Park ran only seven plays, but scored touchdowns on two of their first three plays in the period to extend the lead to 27-6.

Shierry scored his second touchdown of the game with 8:19 left in the half on a 43-yard scamper on the second play from scrimmage,

following another short punt by the Bulldogs.

On Burk's next possession, a fumble by Richmond, his second of the game, was recovered by Russell Duggins, giving Iowa Park the ball at their own 40.

On the first play from scrimmage, Chase Wright, who had scored three touchdowns in the opener against Holliday, broke a tackle and picked up some downfield blocks en route to his 60-yard touchdown with 5:34 left in the

Burk's only scoring opportunity came with 1:22 left in the half when Zachary Thornton missed wide right on a 32-yard field goal

The third quarter saw neither threaten, with Iowa Park losing another fumble in the period.

Burk got back on the board with 11:20 left in the fourth quarter when Richmond scored from 7 yards out. Thornton added the pointafter to cut the Iowa Park lead to 27-13. Richmond's run capped an 11-play 66-yard

That would be the last time the Bulldogs would sniff the endzone.

Iowa Park answered with three touchdowns in the game's final 11 minutes, the first coming on the Hawks' possession following the Burk touchdown.

Tyler Pulley tossed a 33-yard touchdown pass to Wright, who battled a pair of Bulldog defenders to pull down the pass, falling into the endzone for the score to make it 34-13 with 9:21 remaining.

The big play of the drive was a 16-yard completion to Mason Adams from Pulley on a fourth-and-four play from the 17.

After another three-and-out by the Bulldogs, Iowa Park took over at the Bulldog 29 with just over three minutes left in the game. Four plays later, JimmyWilson capped the scoring with a 30-yard touchdown run to make the final score 47-13.

Leading rushers for the Hawks included. Huff with 79 yards on 12 carries, Wright with 59 yards on five carries, Shierry with 56 yards on five carries and Wilson with 40 yards on six

Burk was led in rushing by Richmond, who finished with 120 yards on 27 carries. Jeff Jinks added 56 yards on 12 attempts.

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

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
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

Under current law, a political subdivision is generally prohibited from spending public funds or extending credit to become a stockholder in a corporation but is permitted to purchase nonassessable life, health or accident insurance policies from a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in Texas. This amendment would authorize a political subdivision to also obtain non-assessable prop-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment permitting a political subdivision to purchase nonassessable property and casualty insurance from an authorized mutual insurance company in the same manner that the political subdivision purchases life, health, and accident insurance.

PROPOSITION NO. 12 ON THE BALLOT

SJR 21 - SJR 21 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt from ad valorem taxation a leased motor vehicle that is not used by the lessee primarily to produce income. The amendment would provide that the legislature also may limit the ability of a political subdivision to subject such a vehicle to taxation.

The amendment also would authorize the Legislature to limit the amount of interest the bonds can bear and establish procedures for the investment of the bond proceeds. The proposed amendment would specify the method of repaying the bonds.

HJR 29 - HJR 29 proposes a constitutional amendment which would authorize the Legislature to require the board of regents of the state university and boards of trustees or managers of the educational, charitable, and penal institutions of the state, whose members serve six year terms, to be composed of an odd number of three or more board members (for example, 5, 7, or 9 members). The proposed amendment would allow approximately one-third of members of boards whose membership is not evenly divisible by three to be elected or appointed every two years. The amendment also would allow the Legislature to set the composition of constitutionally required boards, whose members serve for a term of six years, to a number divisible by three so that exactly one-third of the board members may be elected or appointed every two years.

Furthermore, the amendment would limit Randall County to not less than two and not more than six precincts. Finally, the amendment would set a minimum of four precincts for any county that as of November 2, 1999, is divided into four or more precincts.

PROPOSITION NO. 17 ON THE BALLOT

HJR 58 - HJR 58 proposes a constitutional amendment which would require the board of regents of the University of Texas System to manage investments of the permanent university fund (PUF) according to the standards of a prudent investor. Generally, earnings from the PUF are distributed to the available university fund (AUF) and then ultimately distributed to the public university systems of Texas. Under the amendment, the amount distributed to the AUF would consist of distributions, as determined by the University of Texas System board of regents, from the total return on all investment assets of the PUF, instead of consisting only of the dividends, interest, and other income of the PUF minus administrative expenses. The amendment also would provide guidelines for minimum and maximum amounts to be distributed to the AUF, and require that the board of regents manage distributions to the AUF in a manner that will provide the AUF with a stable and predictable stream of annual distributions and maintain the purchasing power of the PUF investments and annual distributions to the AUF.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment relating to the investment of the permanent university fund and the distribution from the permanent university fund to the available university fund."
