All three have excellent speed, as does Jared Franklin who has stepped in to fill the sho left after Thompson's graduation. Hirschi is a team that is loaded that can hurt you." said Nelms." They that can hurt you," said Nelms." They
are well coached and they are hungry. Thay made a nice run in the playoffs last year and they are definitely a playoff caliber team again this year." The Huskies are led by their fullback Robinson, who is listed as 5 10, 180 lbs . Robinson rushed for a pair of touchdowns and 211 yards in Hirschi's 24-10 win over Lawton MacArthur last weck. Robinson averaged 14 yards per carry and also The rest of the team rushed for minus three yards in the game. Estus finished with 42 yards on 13 carries while Frankiln finished with four carries for a minus 37 yards. Smith lost eight yards in his two tries. Franklin finished 2 -of-6 in the game against Lawton Mac for 13 yards. His other completion was to Smith for a 4 -yard loss.
"Robinson's their big gun," said Nelms. "He's big and explosive and can go the distance in a hurry if we don't shut him down early. Their quarterback did a good job in his firs he is more of a runner. He seems to
look to run first and throw second. Estus is another good back. He's 6-1 190 lbs. and we can't overlook him. He has excellent speed and can score
from anywhere on the field " from anywhere on the field. Up front the Huskies are much only 209 to the Hawks 269 . Defen sively lowa Park is averaging just over 278 per man.
