Council faces busy agenda

City aldermen face a heavy agenda when they meet at 7 p.m. Monday in council chambers.

Two of the projects the council is working on, concerning the 1999 Texas Capital Fund Real Estate Program, appear on the agenda. Both relate to the city's effort to increase employment with local businesses.

The first concerns a project with Gene James Heating and Air Conditioning, while the other deals with Kathy's Kakes.

Two public appearances are included on the meeting's agenda.

Tommy Keese, Wichita County Emergency Management Director, is to seek permission to locate a radio antenna on the north-side elevated water tower.

The second is to be by Allen Bernstein, president of Iowa Park Little League, who is to request city-paid utilities for the W.F. George Ballpark, for the organization's fall baseball program.

Aldermen are to consider authorizing the city administrator to execute a contract for janitorial services on city-owned facilities.

A resolution is to be considered which if approved would prohibit fishing to the general public at Lake Gordon from 8 a.m. Oct. 1 until 1

p.m. Oct. 2, except participants of the annual KidFish event.

Another resolution would authorize the city administrator to execute a lease/purchase agreement for the purchase of a court records management system.

Another resolution deals with bookkeeping. If approved, it permits the writing off of bad debts owed the city.

Two ordinances are also to be considered during the meeting.

The first concerns a drought contingency plan, establishing criteria for initiation and termination of drought response states, restrictions on certain water uses, establishing penalties for violations and other issues relating to the topic.

The second ordinance, if approved, would establish a municipal court technology fund; providing for the assessment and collection of a court technology fee, and all related requirements for its establishment.

Administrator Mike Price is to discuss extending the contract for solid waste services with I.E.S.I.

Also included on the agenda are two proclamations: thanking Girl Scout Troop 32 for work at Gordon Lake, and recognizing Oct. 6 as Physician Assistant Day in Iowa Park.

Hawks vs. Coyotes in Memorial Stadium

This week's game against Wichita Falls High School has a lot of question marks surrounding it, the biggest being which Iowa Park team will show up to play on the turf at Memorial Stadium Saturday night at 7:30.

Will it be the one that showed up in week two and knocked off the 14th-ranked Hirschi Huskies 13-10, or will it be the one that showed up Friday night and lost to Gainesville at home 27-21?

If it's the one that showed up against Gainesville, it could be a long night for Hawk fans. Old High defeated Gainesville 48-7 in week two and is a perfect 3-0 to start the season averaging over 44 points per game.

But if it's the one that showed up against Hirschi, you'd better get to Memorial Stadium early, because it should be a heck of a game with a big crowd. After all, it will be the only game in town as all other area teams will be in action Friday night.

Pre-game ticket sales for the game will be Friday only at the high school principal's office: \$5 for adults and \$3 for students. All tickets at the game Saturday will be \$6 per person.

The loss to Gainesville last week dropped the Hawks out of the Associated Press Top 10 and all the way to the No. 15 spot in Class 3A polls.

"It was definitely a tough loss for us," said head coach Weldon Nelms. "Our kids came out a little flat coming off the big win over Hirschi and were probably looking ahead to this week's game against the Coyotes. After Old High beat Gainesville like they did, it made it even harder for

our kids to prepare to play them. It's always easy for a team to get ready to play a ranked opponent and it's easy for a ranked team to take teams lightly.

"I hope we learned a big lesson from this loss," Nelms added. "If we can turn it around and learn from it, I think it will make us a much better football team down the road. I think it hurt our pride more than anything

Two men charged carrying weapons

Two young men who claimed to be returning from hunting late at night were arrested by Iowa Park police on charges of unlawful carrying of weapons.

An officer stopped a vehicle in the 800 block of South Texowa at 11:11 p.m. Sunday, and decided to do more investigating after seeing a shotgun in the back seat.

Besides the shotgun, officers also located a handgun and a club in the vehicle.

At 2:55 p.m. Tuesday, officers responded to a reported domestic disturbance in the 700 block of Johnson Road, where they arrested Randy Dean McGaugh, 43.

McGaugh was issued a citation for Class C assault, but was also charged with criminal mischief \$50-\$500, for allegedly damaging a doorway during the disturbance. He was transported to the county jail on the second charge, according to the police blotter.

Chamber opens door for business booths

For the first time in the lengthy history of the Whoop-T-Do, commercial businesses will be allowed to have a booth.

Whoop-T-Do, which is held in conjunction with Iowa Park High School's annual homecoming, is sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce.

This year's event will be held on Saturday, Oct. 16.

The change was made during Monday's monthly meeting of the Chamber's board of directors.

However, unlike booths sponsored by non-profit organizations, the commercial booths will be limited to handing out information only. No sales or items for sale will be allowed.

As is the case of the non-profit organizations, commercial booth spaces will be \$25.

Non-profit organizations have one more week in order to reserve a booth, if they wish to have the same activity as last year. Duplication of

booth products and activities is prohibited.

The commercial booths will not be integrated with those of the non-profit organization booths, but will be at one end of the street, it was decided.

Other business discussed during Monday's meeting included:

- * calls for members to help during the annual KidFish event, on Saturday, Oct. 2 at Lake Gordon, were announced;

- * a nomination committee to make recommendations for officers in 2000 was named;

- * a request that the Chamber assist in coordinating a concert of the Hawk Jazz Band at the Tom Burnett Library at some date in the future was heard;

- * and, the next meeting of the Chamber directors will be held on Oct. 25, a week later than the usual third-Monday, in order that a report of finances generated by the Whoop-T-Do might be completed.

EISI acquires Bell Group

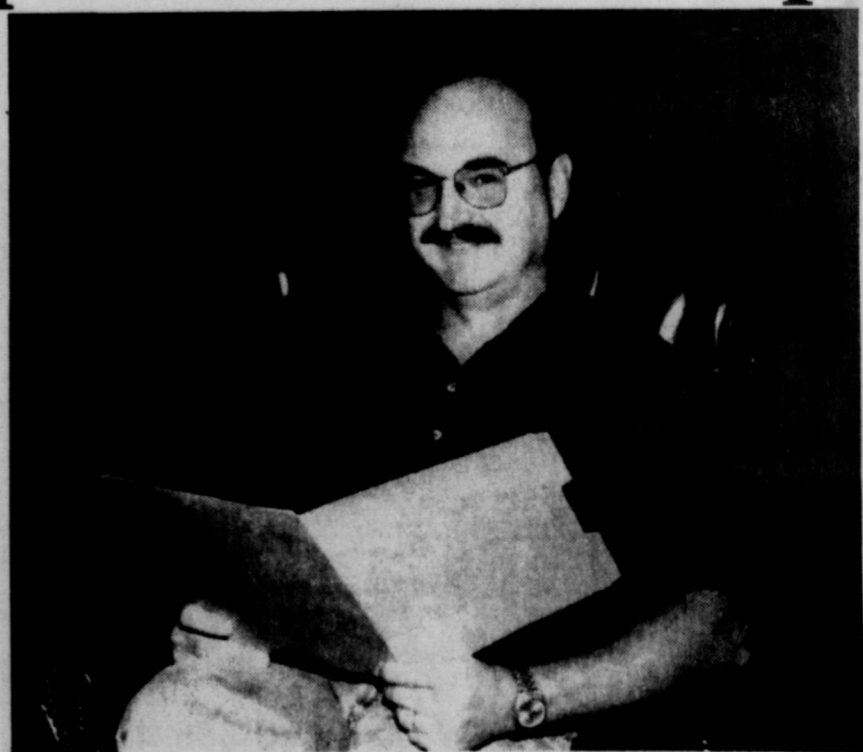
There's a new trashman in Iowa Park.

EISI Corporation has acquired Bellevue Trucking, the trash division of the Bell Group, which included four trash collection operations, three transfer stations and two fully-permitted landfills.

In addition, the acquisition makes EISI the new waste services provider for 22 city franchise contracts in Texas and Oklahoma including about 70,000 municipal, residential and commercial customers.

Texas cities where EISI took over waste collection services from Bell Group include Iowa Park, Burkburnett, Electra, Henrietta, Petrolia, Byers, Windthorst, Montague, Muenster, Bowie, Archer City, Olney, Holliday, Newcastle, Vernon, Chilli-cothe, Paducah and Quanah.

Texas Trivia
 Davy Crockett

The best known hero of the Alamo, Davy was a man of myths. First of all, Davy apparently rarely wore a coonskin cap, though the idea of him without one is like Old Glory without stars. Though tall, he was a little pudgy, not too handsome, and definitely middle-aged (49 at the time of the siege) - details frequently omitted in movies and on TV. His beloved trusty rifle, Old Besty, was left behind in Tennessee when he came to Texas to fight in the Alamo; so much for depictions of him brandishing it at the pesky Mexicans. And despite the much loved Disney theme song labeling him "King of the Wild Frontier," he wasn't born on a mountaintop but merely in the mountainous country of northeastern Tennessee. Whether or not he really killed a bear when he was only three will never be known, so let's give him the benefit of the doubt.

But the big question about Davy is whether he really died at the Alamo. Any loyal Texan flinches at the thought, and yet apparently seven of the defenders survived the slaughter, only to be tortured and killed by their Mexican captors. A Mexican officer, Jose Enrique da la Pena, in a diary unpublished until 1955, identified Crockett by name as one of the seven Texas soldiers who survived. A Texas sergeant, George M. Dolson, also

asserted in a letter published in late 1836 that a Mexican soldier for whom he served as interpreter also swore that Crockett survived the battle.

Cake was served to celebrate the September birthdays of Bobbie Heacox, Dorothy Johnson, Billie Railsback, and Muriel Woody.

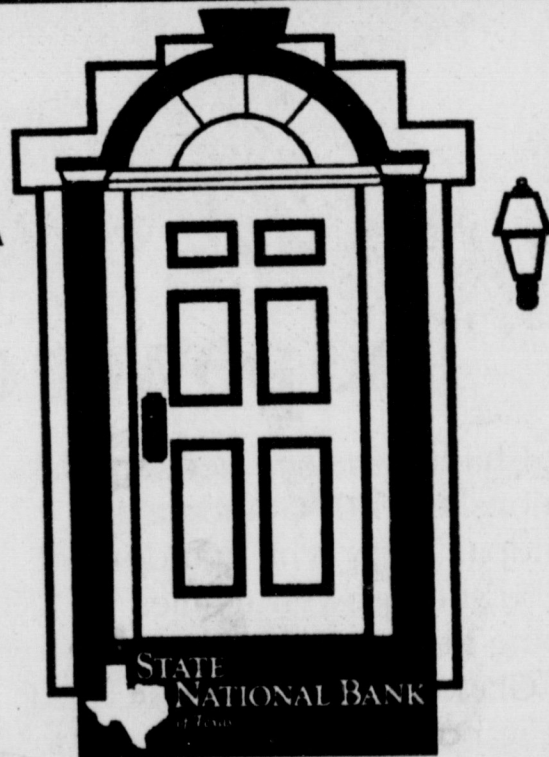
Two lapel pins, made by Loretta Stephens, was the door prize won by Martha Dudley.

Smith's degree is an associate in Applied Science in Radiology.

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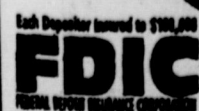

Well, that's not life, and it's not the way things happen.

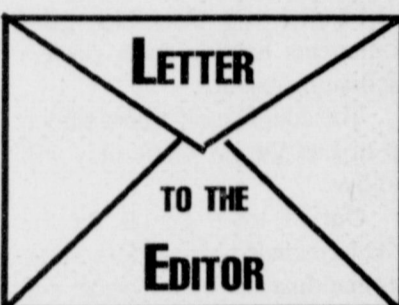
But, I believe that if you would measure the number of stories about the good things that happened, you'd

A RESOLUTION PRAYER AT FOOTBALL GAMES

September 9, 1999

WHEREAS the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals has ruled that football game prayers over the public address speaker are unconstitutional, and WHEREAS the Texas Attorney General has joined with the states of Alabama, Colorado, Kansas, Louisiana, Nebraska, South Carolina, and Tennessee in asking the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn the appeals court decision, and

WHEREAS the Iowa Park Board of Trustees believes that a nonsectarian prayer that asks for protection from accidents both on and off the field for our students is a broad based request that would be appropriate in any prayer regardless of religion or faith, and

WHEREAS the practice of student initiated, student led prayer at Hawk Football Games is a tradition dating back more than fifty years, and

WHEREAS, it is not the intent of the Iowa Park Board of Trustees to proselytize rather than protect the health and safety of our students and to protect the constitutional right to free speech, and

BE IT RESOLVED that the Iowa Park Board of Trustees support the effort to overturn the federal appeals court decision regarding prayer at football games, and

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Iowa Park School District go on record supporting the Governor of Texas and the Texas Attorney General in urging the U.S. Supreme Court to overturn the decision of *Doe vs. Santa Fe ISD*, and that this resolution be distributed to legislators and public officials in positions of leadership.

Witness our hand, this 9th day of September 1999.

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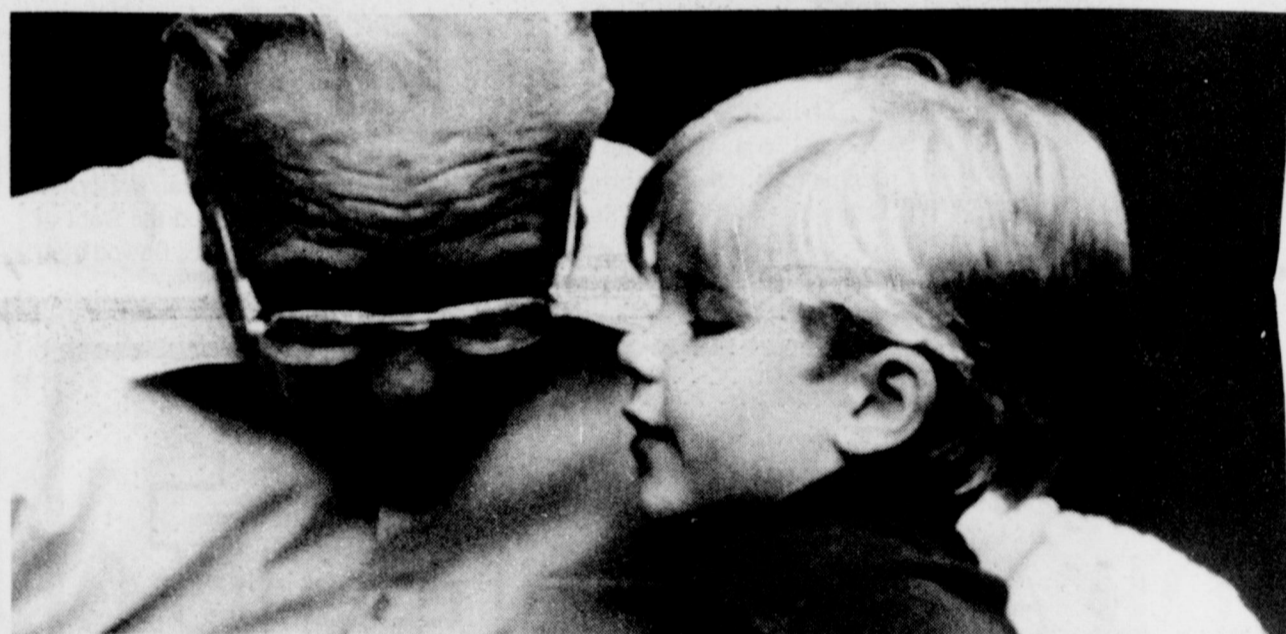

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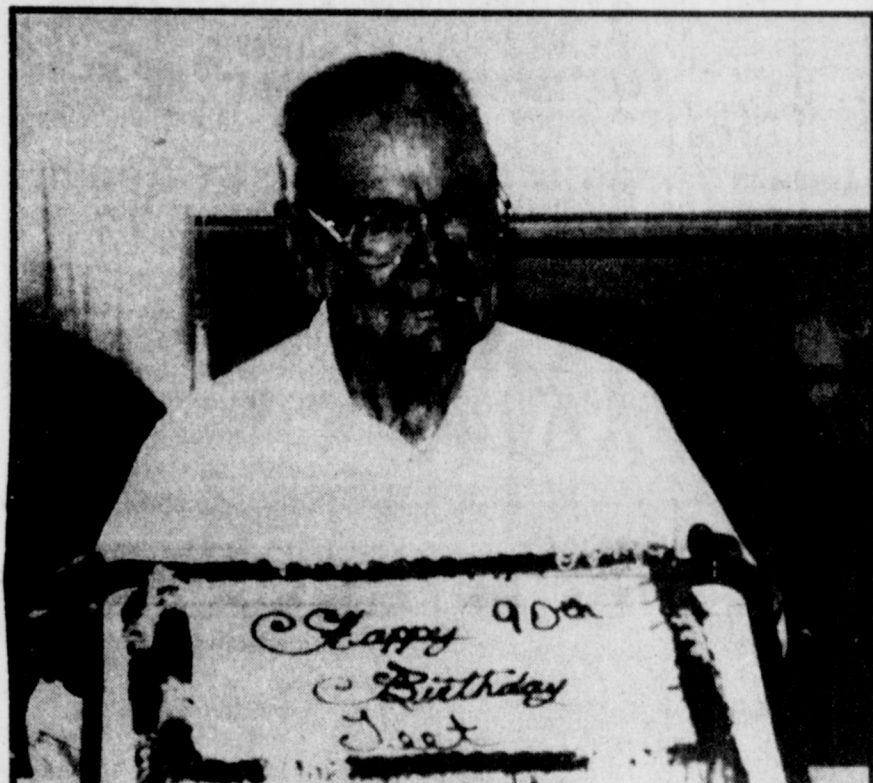
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W.T. BRADFORD ... celebrates 90th birthday

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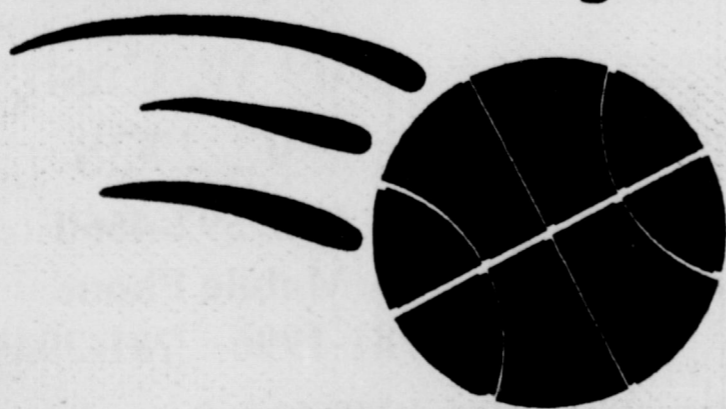
