Trustees discuss construction plans

City's water tower to aid in disasters

Iowa Park's newest water tower will soon be playing an important facility if a major catastrophe event should eventually strike in Wichita County.

No, not its content, but rather its height and being located in the central part of the county.

The tower, which is located on the north side of US 287, is to be the base of a UHF radio antenna and repeater system.

The proposal to locate the antenna atop the tower was approved Monday night by the city council, in response to a request made by Tommy Keese, Wichita County Emergency

KidFish set here Saturday

It's the fourth annual KidFish event, and youngsters and their parents from all over the area are expected to attend.

Director.

Keese explained that grant funds have been made available for the installation, which will be used by fire chiefs and police chiefs in the event of a disaster when normal radio channels are tied up by field personnel.

Also approved was a request from Allen Bernstein, who sought permission to use the W.F. George Ballfield as an evening practice area for his fall baseball teams.

The president of Iowa Park Little League explained local participation had increased from one club last year to enough for five teams this season, and practice area was important, including the need for lights due to the lack of daylight after school days.

The council pointed out that it would make an exception to allow the teams to do evening practices, but it presented a problem in that the additional cost of electricity was not considered during the earlier budget work sessions.

Firms to represent the city's administration of the 1999 Texas Capital Fund Real Estate program, which is to allow Kathy's Kakes to purchase the Dudley's Deli business and Gene James Heating and Air Conditioning to purchase the major portion of the old Tompson Tool property, were approved.

No further action, however, will be taken on the two projects until the city receives final contracts from the state, it was pointed out. The program is designed to assist municipalities in their efforts to maintain and increase employment. The purchases, which are financed for a 20-year period, are designed so that the city will not lose any money should a problem arise during the period of financing, Mike Price, city administrator, explained. The lowest of two bids received for the janitorial services on cityowned facilities was submitted by Tim and Sherry Clouse. The contract covers three years with two one-year extensions. Their successful bid, which provides for the cleaning of city hall, police station, library and Recreational Activities Center, was \$460 per week. The other bid was \$726. Aldermen approved a resolution which prohibits public fishing at Lake Gordon, from 8 a.m. this Friday until 1 p.m. Saturday, so that the annual

Preliminary designs for Bradford and Kidwell Elementary cafeterias were approved th the Iowa Park school board during a called meeting Tuesday night.

All other facility construction and renovation plans had been approved at the Sept. 14 called meeting of the board.

Architects will now begin workon drawings that go out to bidders," and construction will possibly begin in November.

Architect Bob Weaver met with Allen Shewmake, director of food services, last week to go over plans for the elementary school cafeterias.

\$300,000 has been allotted for each cafeteria. Along with accepting bids on new kitchen equipment, there will be optional bids considered for flooring, ceiling tile, new serving lines and dishwashers.

Several cafeteria employees were present and voiced their disappointment with the new plans. From earlier drawings, they had the impression that more was going to be done.

Weaver explained that in the preliminary plans, "you have to take each element and guess as close as you can. You've got to work with the big picture." He said the final figure can vary either way. Cost of the first plans shown turned out to be \$500,000, which is \$200,000 over budget.

Pam Tyler, cashier at Bradford, told of the bad smell coming from traps and drains at that cafeteria, and felt the plumbing needed to be replaced.

The school trustees felt they would have to address priorities, as well as continue working toward eliminating any remaining problems. During the open forum portion

Applications for youth wishing to participate in the event are available at Iowa Park City Hall.


A special tank containing fish will also be available for the very young children who might not be allowed to fish the lake's waters.

Some are appreciated, some are interesting, some easily dismissed, and some get my reaction, though I don't think it's exactly what they want.

My particular case in point concerns my monthly bill I received this week from Classic Cable.

Yeah, the statement was inside the envelope, as expected. But there was something else included that wasn't expected. It was an advertisement from a life insurance company, apparently unrelated to the cable company.

I responded immediately, but I'm not sure it was exactly what the company wanted.

There was a postage-paid card included for the receiver's response. And it went into the mail the very next morning.

I didn't write anything on the card. Just left it blank. Yeah, they'll have to pay a few

cents to get it back when it arrives at the company's post office. That's my

objective.

Without fail, whenever I get a postage-paid card or envelope from a company that comes without my request, I mail it.

I'd hope that everyone does the same. Maybe we can get some of this unrequested solicitation business to stop cluttering what we consider our private mail.

It's a little thing, but it gives me some satisfaction. They don't want my type of response any more than I did their unsolicited solicitation.



Parent disappointed

When I was in High School (admittedly 29 years ago), the greatest pressure I had was if my skirt was too short (or admittedly I even wandered if it was short enough). The kids of today are under pressure from so many sides, even from us parents, and I have tried to put myself in their shoes and cannot even begin to understand the things they are going through. One of the best avenues of support I found was my teacher. I had one in particular that I could go to with my fears and concerns and she helped guide me through that difficult time of transition from childhood to adulthood. In most cases that is still true. In many cases it isn't. I have a great deal of respect for teachers of this time of rebellion and violence. The issues they face are nowhere near the complexity of my time. I have told many a school official that my first instinct would be to spank the child that called me a "B". I also had to be honest enough to say I'm not sure my hand would have went further down than their face. I know that it has to be difficult with the rules they have to live under because of this ever changing world. But, there are some basic rules that I don't understand why some teachers feel no longer need to be in place. One such rule is help a troubled student even if it's against himself. Just because a student isn't one who puts forth more of an effort than to just get by, doesn't mean he isn't worth your time. I have a big problem. I've gone through the system and it doesn't work. My son is only motivated by sports. Last year the teachers didn't believe me and when he asked for extra credit work at the last minute to keep in sports the first six weeks his English teacher said "I will not give extra effort to help a student who is just plain lazy". He failed. He was ineligible for sports. I begged the teacher for help. She actually laughed at me and said she didn't care if he played sports or not. I told her there was a bigger picture than just this moment. If he doesn't have the motivation of sports, he'll shut down completely. She said that wasn't her problem. He never made above a 50 in any other class for two six-week periods. He then had four out of the six teachers make the effort to talk to him. Tell him he needed to look beyond the negative of one person and look to the future he could accomplish. He was encouraged and pulled himself up and made it to High School. This year has been a tremendous turnaround in his attitude and outlook. He has made a large effort to do the work and only struggled in English, which is his weakest subject. For the first three weeks, he made 84 to 93 grades. Then he hit a stump and needed help. Then he was plagued with an injury when he broke his wrist in three places during football. He also became ill when he had an allergic reaction to the pain medication he was given. He fell behind. Instead of asking for help, he tried to go it alone. He only got further behind. Then the teacher told him the

work would only be graded on a basis of 50% and down from there. He asked why. She said her policy of late work was it was only worth 50% and anything wrong would be taken from that point. In stepped MOM.

I went to the teacher. I got every assignment he was lacking. I personally checked the worksheets and vocabulary. I was given a deadline of one day to turn in over 10 book assignments. These assignments were sentences he had to write placing the correct punctuation. Since I only had one day and with a broken wrist that still gave him difficulty, it created problems in sitting down to write this much material. I decided to type the sentences and make them into worksheets. He did the punctuation.

The next morning I turned in ALL the worksheets (lesson 5 and 7); the vocabulary (vocab 3); and all and will take no further action.

The simplest thing to do would be to change classes. My son is not willing to give up the support system and peer group he already has in place just to avoid this teachers attitude and my position is why should he be expected to. She says I lied about the paper. Well in for a penny in for a pound, why would I lie about one and not the other. I have conceded that I do not know if the other assignment was done or not let alone turned in.

No matter, the outcome is still the same. My son failed. He is being placed on the ineligible list for which he takes at least 75% responsibility. I refuse to let him take 100% because I KNOW the assignment given as zero was turned in.

No matter, the outcome is still that this teacher needs a major attitude

Another resolution approved was the writing off of bad debts owed the city, an annual bookkeeping effort. The total amount was \$3,422.72, which included almost \$320 for deceased or incarcerated residents.

The first of two ordinances approved during the meeting included the city's new drought contingency plan, which was mandated by the state legislature.

The other ordinance approved established a \$4 "technology fee" to be charged on each guilty sentence handed down through municipal court. The money collected will be used for purchase, maintenance and operation of programs associated with the court.

A discussion was held on future trash collection service by I.E.S.I., which recently purchased Bell Processing.

of the book assignments but two as they were paragraphs he had to write. The first thing I was told by the teacher was that the grades would be based on 50%. I didn't let that rattle me. I told her a 50 was better than a zero. She stood straight, pursed her lips into a thin line, stuck her nose in the air. She looked down at the papers and said, "Well your effort was nice but I will also be taking an additional 10 points off because you typed the sentences and his grading will be based on 40%." I asked her for clarification in terms of what a grade would mean and it was explained that there were 10 sentences. Normal grading would mean each were worth 10 points for a 100. But now, the most he could get on the paper was a 40 and each sentence missed would be another "10 points each" deducted. If he missed four sentences, he would get a ZERO.

I explained the situation of his motivation in staying in sports. She also said, "I don't care and I'm tired of having to make concession for the football players not being in my class anyway. I'm not going out of my way to tell a student he has missing assignments that jeopardize his eligibility." I thought that regardless of sports being involved that one of the jobs of the teacher was to let a student know they were in trouble and if they needed help to please come to them. Am I wrong?

The final stage of this whole incident was the results of the meeting with the principal, the teacher, and me. Last Friday I called the teacher. She told me she had all the assignment and she would have a grade on Monday. The current average was 69.9. On Monday, I was told he didn't make it and failed with a 67. My first question was how did his grade drop. She replied that it was an approximation given earlier. The second question, what happened to his papers. She replied that he was missing two assignments. I asked what happened between Friday and Monday and got no reply. I told the principal that the one assignment she says is missing was handed to her personally by ME. The other I had no knowledge of. Her reply was "That's my story and I'm sticking to it and the 67 Grade." The principal's position is that he doesn't know who to believe

adjustment. She needs to not make statements about doing special things for football players because she is not the only teacher to have students missing because of injury or game attendance. If she has a problem with athletics then she needs to seek another profession. Maybe it's just an ENGLISH thing.

For the teachers like her, think about changing professions because with society going in the direction it's headed for, it's not going to get better. For the FAR GREATER number who care about the student as a person and not just as a student, my heartfelt thanks and support in all that you do.

For those administrators who feel that as a parent I have no right to criticize, grow up. Start treating the students as people. Quit calling them liars just because there are two different stories. I am sick and tired of the policy "Adults are always right and the students are liars". The mentality of closed circuit TV, body searches, locked doors, name calling (by adults), and assumptions based on appearance and background (MONEY TALKS), should be thrown out the door and EVERYONE placed on equal footing. When a student (even mine), OR teacher, belittles another until the wronged person blows, then the tormentor should receive punishment also. Even if that person is an ADULT.

No parent should be afraid of their child making the statement "I've let down my teammates and school so I should just go blow my head off since even she feels I'm no good". FOR THAT, I BLAME THE EN-GLISH TEACHER. For the history teacher who calmed him down and boosted his self esteem, I am forever in your debt and send my prayers to heaven to give you EXTRA POINTS.

Q. I live here in Wichita County and have two Butterfly Vines, botanical name: (Stigmaphyllon cilitum). I would like to know if this vine is cold hardy here?

A. Butterfly Vine is cold tolerant in South Texas, the Rio Grande Valley area, and other Zone 9 locations. This vine will not survive a normal winter season in North Texas, unless it is given the protection of a greenhouse or other structure.

The vine is attractive in late summer when yellow flowers are produced in clusters. The actual fruit produced by the vine resembles small chartreuse butterflies. This is obviously where the fine's name originated.

You would probably be best off

control is difficult at best.

Applying a control produce like Malathion can offer some temporary control, but complete elimination is tough. Continual insecticide applications tend to kill beneficial insects causing the aphid population to explode.

Aphids also exhibit resistance to many control produces and some controls may even cause increased aphid problems. Sevin insecticide often tends to cause aphid flare ups.

This is the primary reason why I recommend Pecan trees for planting only in large, open areas over turf. Pecan trees over drives, walks, patios, etc. are a continual maintenance problem. If it is any consolation, they

The four teams in the district include Iowa Park, Vernon, Henrietta and Bowie, which is just starting this season.


