

Hawks hosting Bobcats in first district contest

That big win over Hirschi in week three ... forget about it.

That loss to the Coyotes in week five ... forget about it, because neither of them mean anything as Iowa Park prepares to start what head coach Weldon Nelms calls the "Real Season"

Friday night's District 5-3A opener against defending champion Childress is when the games start counting.

Iowa Park will play host to the Bobcats tomorrow night starting at 7:30 at Hawk Stadium in what looks like a battle for the District Title in week one.

The Hawks and the Bobcats look like the two top teams in District 5-3A, with Vernon falling a bit this year.

Childress comes into the game with a perfect 5-0 record while Iowa Park comes in at 3-2 after falling in their final two games against Gainesville and Wichita Falls High School.

But those records don't carry a lot of weight heading into the district opener, according to Nelms.

"Everybody is starting over now at 0-0." Nelms stated. "It's money time now. We're going to pick up our intensity level and our preparation for our upcoming opponents. This is a big game for us. It's not a must win in the sence that the loser is done for the season, but it is a game we feel we

these kids and show them their support."

The 5-0 Bobcats enter the game with wins over Tulia, Holliday, Canadian, Amarillo River Road and West Texas High and have several players back from last year's squad that went several rounds in to the State Playoffs, including one of their very talented running backs in Willie Thomas.

Thomas was joined by Travoy Brown in the Bobcat backfield last season giving Childress a tandem of running backs that was one of the best in the State.

"As Willie Thomas goes, so go the Bobacts," Nelms added. "He's their go-to guy. He's a big, strong runner that always seems to come up with big plays for them. He hurt us last year, scoring a couple of touchdowns and rushing for over 100 yards. But he's not the only weapon they have. They're big up front and their skilled people all have breakaway speed and their defense has played very stingy all season long. We need to control the line of scrimmage on both sides of the ball and our tackling

that home field advantage, get behind has to get a lot better. Last year that hurt us against them. If we go out and set the tone defensively, it just seems to make everything else work better. I think we're going to have to throw the ball some to be successful against them. They blitz a lot and will give you a lot of different looks defensively and they will crowd the line of scrimmage, so we're going to have to be able to move the ball through the air to keep them honest."

> Joining Thomas in the Bobcat backfield will be quarterback Don Grunden and fullback Kyle Timmons who will share the rushing load. When the Bobcats go to the air, look for wingback Michael Brisco, tight end Kevin Keys and split end Jeffery Evans to be on the receiving end of Grunden's passes. The Childress offensive line averages 226-lbs. per man

Defensively, the Bobcats are led by defensive end Caleb Seal, middle linebacker Simon Arcivar and their safeties Keys and Jaycin Smothermon. Their defensive line averages 225-lbs. per man.

Perhaps the people that live in metropolitan areas around dangerous storage locations will send the few in Austin that extended the delimma a letter.



Q. I live in Wichita County and would like to plant Bluebonnets. when and how should I go about sowing the seeds?

A. September to October are ideal times for Bluebonnet planting. Select a sunny, well-drained spot in your landscape and lightly cultivate the soil.

Sow the seed and rake the existing soil over the seed to lightly cover the seed. Water the seeds in and then let Mother Nature take care of the rest.

Bluebonnet seed is a hard, tough seed coat which has resulted in some seed being acid-treated to help break down the seed coat. Acid-treated seed will germinate more reliably and flower the following spring.

Untreated seed will result in some seed germinating while other seeds will reside in the soil for several years before germination occurs.

This is simply for your information, I do not recommend that home gardeners try to treat their own seed with acid. You could request acidscarified seed at purchase time.

O. I live in an older neighborhood in Wichita Falls and have three large Cedar Elms in front of my home. The middle tree was hit by lightning and is split down through most of the trunk to the ground. Can I band the tree trunk to hold it together or do you think I should just have it removed?

Q. We planted a Lace Bark Elm in Wichita Falls. The tree has died very rapidly and the leaves are still on the tree. We know these are classic symptoms of Cotton Root Rot, but we did not know that Lacebark Elm was susceptible to the disease. Is this tree susceptible or could there be another cause for the rapid death of our tree?

A. Lace Bark Elm is an excellent shade tree, but this tree is highly susceptible to Cotton Root Rot.

Our recommended plant material lists actually have a caution about planting the tree in any area prone to this disease. No plant is immune to this devastating problem, but some plants like pear, apple and Lacebark Elm are regularly attacked.

The symptoms you have described concerning the way the tree declined are suggestive of Cotton Root Rot. Rapid rate of decline and leaves which remain attached to the plant even after turning brown are text book examples of this disease.

Do not attempt to plant another Lace Bark Elm in your landscape or you may face the same situation.

Offensive standouts included Biehl, Swanner and Tyler Hayley.


