Hawks heading toward Henrietta

Last week's game against Bowie might have been just what the doctor ordered to cure the Hawks.

Iowa Park came into the game riding a three-game losing streak and looking up at three teams in the District 5-3A race.

It's amazing what a 42-6 win will do for a football team.

Now Iowa Park is tied with four teams for the second spot in district and is playing with a little more confidence heading into Friday night's game against Henrietta.

Childress remains atop the District 5-3A standings at 2-0, followed by Iowa Park, Bowie, Graham and Vernon all tied at 1-1. Henrietta is 0-2.

The Bearcats have fallen on hard times since moving up to Class 3A. Henrietta is the smallest school in that classification in the State and its record reflects it.

Henrietta is coming off an 0-10 season last year and enters Friday

night's 7:30 kickoff against the Hawks from looking past Henrietta and at 0-7 this year.

Head coach Weldon Nelms, in his final season as head coach for the Hawks, probably knows what is going through the minds of the Henrietta coaches right now. Nelms only has to look back to his first season in Iowa Park when the Hawks finished 0-10 and then started the next year at 0-5.

But from that point on things have been looking much better for the Hawks who have made the playoffs in every year except for Nelms' first year as the Head Hawk.

And on the other hand, the Bearcats don't seem to see a light at the end of the tunnel.

With three district games remaining on their schedule against the Hawks, Childress and Bowie, experts would have to think it could be another 0-10 season.

I'd like to use this space this week for a couple of safety tips that could save you or someone else some trouble.

One has to do with early-morning driving and/or walking, while the other deals with driving in the area of an accident.

A reader brought to my attention the problem concerning driving in the early morning.

She pointed out that when one is driving toward the east right after the sun comes up, you are facing directly into the brilliant sun, and are virtually blinded.

What concerned her was that when she had dropped off a student near the high school, returned to Johnson Road and then turned east on the access road, she had great difficulty seeing students walking along the side of the road, because of the sun.

She added that it was the same situation on the same access road near Lake Gordon, where people using the new walking track are having to use the road as a route around the north side.

That's going to be the situation until workers complete the construction of the bridge over the water.

Because my trip to the office each morning on West Highway just before 8 o'clock also requires facing the early sun, I know I have to turn down my visor as low as possible, and still have difficulty seeing both the road and traffic, I fully understand what the woman was saying.

This will continue to be a big problem for more than another week. That's when we return to standard time, which will be an hour later than the period I've been discussing.

I can hardly wait!

The other observation concerning driving has to do with folks who think they've just got to see what has happened following an accident that has just taken place. Because I react to such scenes in order to cover the news, I have an opportunity to witness this problem.

I recognize it is natural for people to be concerned about such an incident and want to know if the people involved are acquaintances and are alright.

Also, there are some people who have a radio scanner and will race to a wreck scene out of curiosity. I see these folks regularly.

The fact is, such curiosity can, and has, caused an accidental accident. But most often, the unnecessary slow down creates problems emergency workers just flatly don't need.

Let me give you an idea about what I'm talking about.

There was a two-vehicle wreck Friday afternoon on FM 368 South. Besides the various vehicles of emergency workers and law officers being parked on the sides of the road, an ambulance was parked in the northbound lane, awaiting a victim.


One of our area residents, who is one of those who uses a scanner, arrived on the scene. His curiosity just got the best of him.

He stopped beside the ambulance, completely blocking all traffic, which was heavy, and tried to talk with observers to learn who had been involved.

This, obviously, is an extreme situation. But, folks, please don't do something like this. It just adds to a serious problem, and obviously is unnecessary.

There, I've got this stuff off my chest. I'm sure you were already aware of such problems, and didn't need reminding.

But if at least one driver who might not have thought about them learns from what's I've said, the use of this space is well worth it.





Yes, I realize they need discipline and I don't have a problem with that as long as it is used correctly. When it is used for every petty thing, it is different.

After many conferences with his teacher, who insisted that he was hyperactive and needed to be on medication, his mother agreed to try the teacher's suggestion. It didn't seem to help that much as far as learning is concerned and his teacher suggested that he go through kindergarten a second year.

His second kindergarten teacher, after talking with his first year teacher, again suggested medication. His mother again followed his teacher's recommendation, against her better judgement, thinking it would help him to learn. It still did not make that much difference in his behavior or learning.

After many more notes and numerous conferences with his teacher and some with the principal also, his teacher concluded that he just got too much attention at home.

Excuse me, but I thought you were supposed to love and encourage your children to do their best in all they do whether it be school or social activities.

After completing a second year of kindergarten, he still had to go 3 times a week to the North Texas Rehabilitation Center all summer to be able to read as he should for first grade. After some testing, they discovered that he did have some learning problems.

It seems that his teachers weren't really interested in finding out why he wasn't learning. Just get him medicated enough to sit still for class. His mother decided that she was

going to remove him from Iowa Park and try a different approach. They moved to Wichita Falls and he started first grade there this fall. What a difference!

He has suddenly became an honor roll student, loves school and wants to learn. Also he has no behavior problems. All of this <u>without</u> any medication whatsoever!

He has a wonderful teacher this year who actually loves all children and believes that <u>all children</u> can learn and encourages them with praise and rewards their accomplishments. encouragement to get over the rough spots. They are not a little group of robots to be programmed one way and that's it.

I am just thankful that his mother had the foresight to see this and got him out of the environment of being labeled a troublemaker and into a creative and encouraging school environment, where the children are not discouraged from being children, but that creativity is allowed to grow and encourages them to be excited about learning.
