ONLY MINOR INJURIES resulted from a two-car collision Friday afternoon on FM 368 South. Michael Perry Wells, 20, of Holliday was driving north and had just rounded the curve at FM 367 when he ran into a car driven by Angela Raschke, 16, as it was attempting to turn into a driveway. The Raschke car was knocked 180 degrees and into the ditch, but remained

upright. Wells' car was knocked 180 degrees in the other direction, and overturned in the ditch. The rear bumpers of the vehicles came to rest less than three feet apart. Riding with Raschke was her cousin, Becky Raschke, and Jody Ostermann was riding with Wells. The accident was investigated by State Trooper David Blackerby.

Hawks heading toward Henrietta

Last week's game against Bowie might have been just what the doctor ordered to cure the Hawks.

Iowa Park came into the game riding a three-game losing streak and looking up at three teams in the District 5-3A race.

It's amazing what a 42-6 win will do for a football team.

Now Iowa Park is tied with four teams for the second spot in district and is playing with a little more confidence heading into Friday night's game against Henrietta.

Childress remains atop the District 5-3A standings at 2-0, followed by Iowa Park, Bowie, Graham and Vernon all tied at 1-1. Henrietta is 0-2.

The Bearcats have fallen on hard times since moving up to Class 3A. Henrietta is the smallest school in that classification in the State and its record reflects it.

Henrietta is coming off an 0-10 season last year and enters Friday

night's 7:30 kickoff against the Hawks at 0-7 this year.

Head coach Weldon Nelms, in his final season as head coach for the Hawks, probably knows what is going through the minds of the Henrietta coaches right now. Nelms only has to look back to his first season in Iowa Park when the Hawks finished 0-10 and then started the next year at 0-5. But from that point on things have been looking much better for the Hawks who have made the playoffs in every year except for Nelms' first year as the Head Hawk.

And on the other hand, the Bearcats don't seem to see a light at the end of the tunnel.

With three district games remaining on their schedule against the Hawks, Childress and Bowie, experts would have to think it could be another 0-10 season.

One of the things Nelms and his coaching staff have to guard against this week is preventing the Hawks

from looking past Henrietta and looking ahead to next week's game against the Vernon Lions.

"Last week's win was a big boost for our football team," Nelms said. "It helped restore some of our confidence and got us headed in the right direction. Now we need to build off of that win and continue to gain momentum and confidence."

"Henrietta should not be able to match up with us," said Nelms. "But on any given night anything can happen. They had a shot at two field goals in the opening game against Vernon to win it in regulation, only to go down in overtime 13-6. We need to concern ourselves with our team and work to improve in some areas that will make us a better team. We are at a point in the season where we know we can't afford a let down. We can't slip up and we know it. We need to go out focused and play another good game to get back some of the confidence we lost earlier in the year." The Hawks went a long way in restoring some of that swagger they had after opening the season at 3-0 by pounding Bowie last Friday night.

"We played well overall," Nelms added. "I was a bit disappointed with the way we turned the ball over after we had forced some turnovers in the third quarter, but overall we played a good game. Our offensive line had a great night and all of our linemen graded out well. We had two backs rush for over 100 yards and our defense came up with some big plays. With the exception of a couple of plays, we played a great game defensively."

Health wise, the Hawks are slowly getting everybody back from the injured list.

Chase Wright played last week but was not at 100 percent, but is looking better this week as is Dustin Shierry who missed the last couple of games. Michael Leal suffered a sprained knee in the Bowie game and will miss the next couple of weeks.

This will be the first time since the Crane game last season that the Hawks have had to travel out of Wichita County to play a football game.

Offensively the Bearcats are led by their quarterback Colin Cates a 170-lb. senior. Joining Cates in the backfield are fullback Justin Slagor and Chris Kirby. The offensive line that will be opening holes and protecting Cates averages 209-lbs. per man.

"Their quarterback is the key to their offense," said Nelms. "He is a real good athlete and can run and

The matter was tabled, and turned over to the dress code committee to study and make a recommendation.

Other agenda items include a

discussion on roof replacement procedures for the high school and Kidwell Elementary, and an assessment of school board team performance.

The meeting will be closed to consider the hiring of a school nurse.

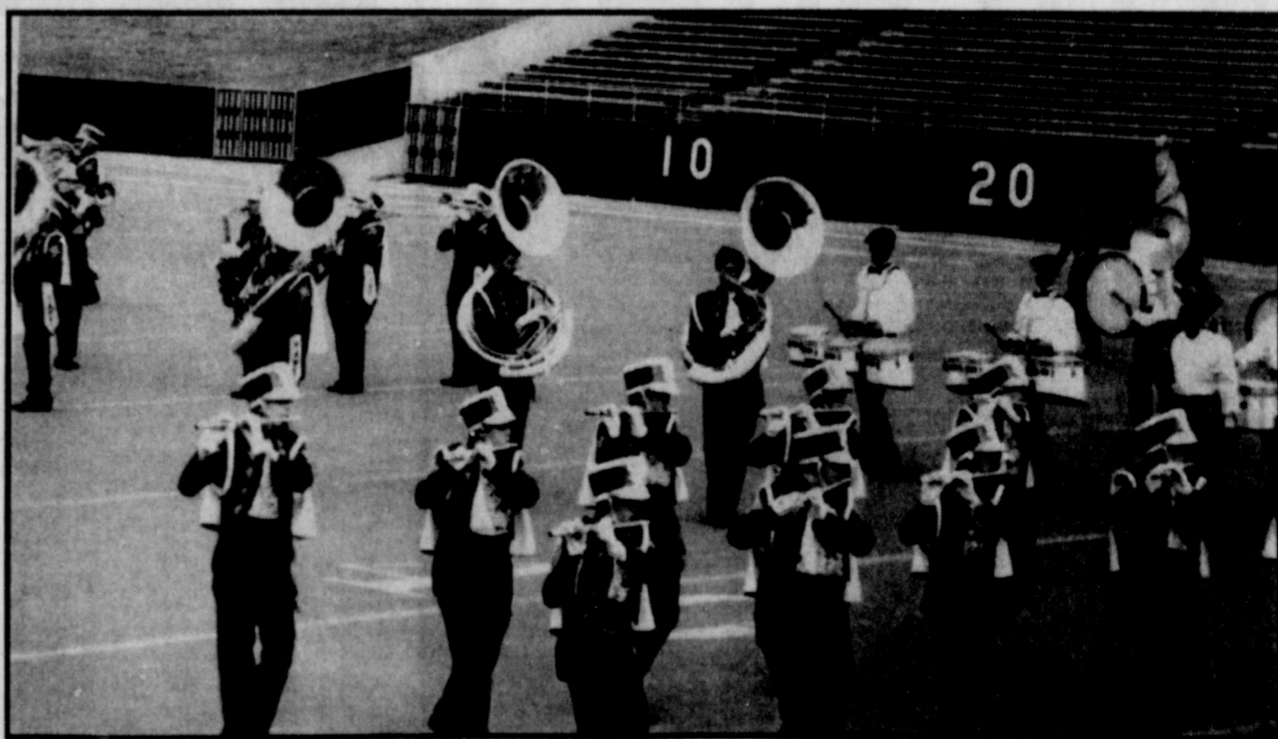
Early voting gets underway



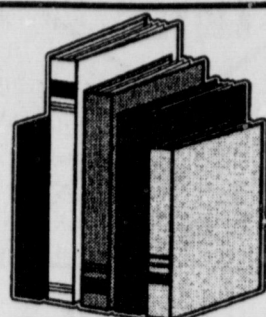
Gilbreath and Brandi Dodge, and Megan Ermis and Nichole Fields, sister of the bride, were flower girls.

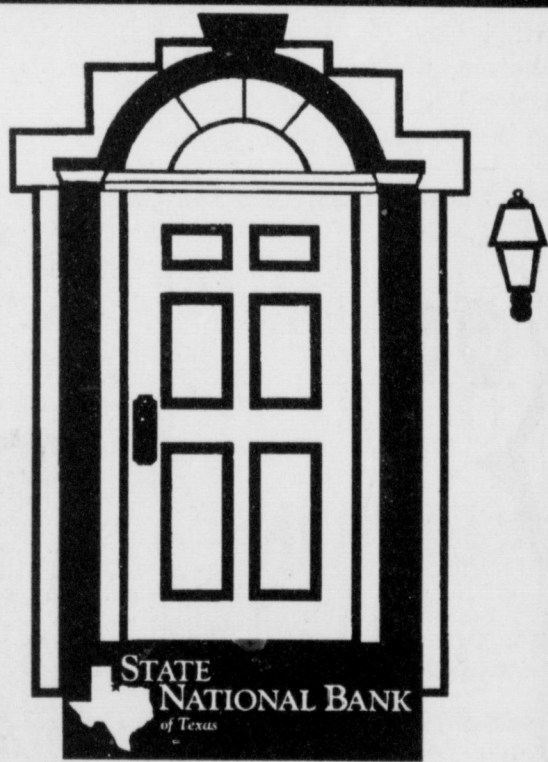

As I See It...

I'd like to use this space this week for a couple of safety tips that could save you or someone else some trouble.

One has to do with early-morning driving and/or walking, while the other deals with driving in the area of an accident.

A reader brought to my attention the problem concerning driving in the early morning.

She pointed out that when one is driving toward the east right after the sun comes up, you are facing directly into the brilliant sun, and are virtually blinded.

What concerned her was that when she had dropped off a student near the high school, returned to Johnson Road and then turned east on the access road, she had great difficulty seeing students walking along the side of the road, because of the sun.

She added that it was the same situation on the same access road near Lake Gordon, where people using the new walking track are having to use the road as a route around the north side.

That's going to be the situation until workers complete the construction of the bridge over the water.

Because my trip to the office each morning on West Highway just before 8 o'clock also requires facing the early sun, I know I have to turn down my visor as low as possible, and still have difficulty seeing both the road and traffic, I fully understand what the woman was saying.

This will continue to be a big problem for more than another week. That's when we return to standard time, which will be an hour later than the period I've been discussing.

I can hardly wait! The other observation concerning driving has to do with folks who think they've just got to see what has happened following an accident that has just taken place.

Because I react to such scenes in order to cover the news, I have an opportunity to witness this problem.

I recognize it is natural for people to be concerned about such an incident and want to know if the people involved are acquaintances and are alright.

Also, there are some people who have a radio scanner and will race to a wreck scene out of curiosity. I see these folks regularly.

The fact is, such curiosity can, and has, caused an accidental accident. But most often, the unnecessary slow down creates problems emergency workers just flatly don't need.

Let me give you an idea about what I'm talking about.

There was a two-vehicle wreck Friday afternoon on FM 368 South. Besides the various vehicles of emergency workers and law officers being parked on the sides of the road,

an ambulance was parked in the north-bound lane, awaiting a victim.

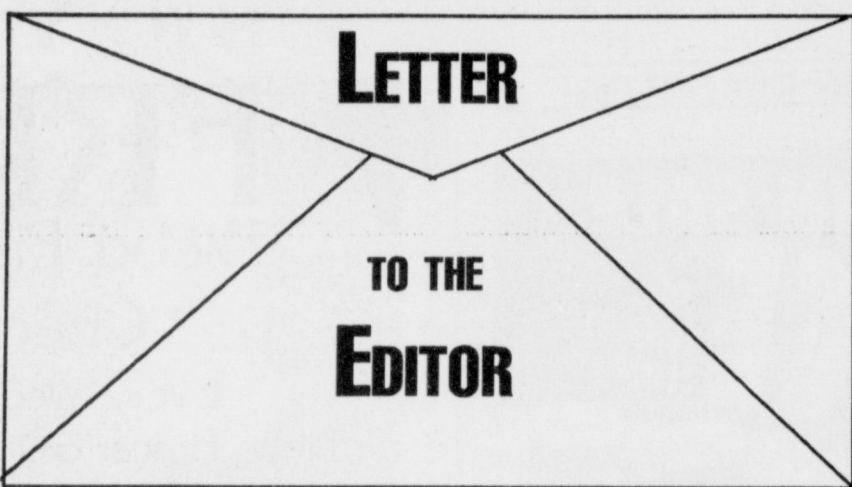
One of our area residents, who is one of those who uses a scanner, arrived on the scene. His curiosity just got the best of him.

He stopped beside the ambulance, completely blocking all traffic, which was heavy, and tried to talk with observers to learn who had been involved.

This, obviously, is an extreme situation. But, folks, please don't do something like this. It just adds to a serious problem, and obviously is unnecessary.

There, I've got this stuff off my chest. I'm sure you were already aware of such problems, and didn't need reminding.

But if at least one driver who might not have thought about them learns from what's I've said, the use of this space is well worth it.



Disappointed with school

To All Parents and Grandparents of IPISD School Students:

As a concerned grand parent of a former Iowa Park Elementary School student, I would like to share with other concerned parents and grandparents what my grandchild experienced through two years of kindergarten in this school system.

During the first year, his teacher was constantly sending notes home and daily reports on his bad behavior. Yes, I realize they need discipline and I don't have a problem with that as long as it is used correctly. When it is used for every petty thing, it is different.

After many conferences with his teacher, who insisted that he was hyperactive and needed to be on medication, his mother agreed to try the teacher's suggestion. It didn't seem to help that much as far as learning is concerned and his teacher suggested that he go through kindergarten a second year.

His second kindergarten teacher, after talking with his first year teacher, again suggested medication. His mother again followed his teacher's recommendation, against her better judgement, thinking it would help him to learn. It still did not make that much difference in his behavior or learning.

After many more notes and numerous conferences with his teacher and some with the principal also, his teacher concluded that he just got too much attention at home.

Excuse me, but I thought you were supposed to love and encourage your children to do their best in all they do whether it be school or social activities.

After completing a second year of kindergarten, he still had to go 3 times a week to the North Texas Rehabilitation Center all summer to be able to read as he should for first grade. After some testing, they discovered that he did have some learning problems.

It seems that his teachers weren't really interested in finding out why he wasn't learning. Just get him medicated enough to sit still for class.

His mother decided that she was going to remove him from Iowa Park and try a different approach. They moved to Wichita Falls and he started first grade there this fall. What a difference!

He has suddenly become an honor roll student, loves school and wants to learn. Also he has no behavior problems. All of this without any medication whatsoever!

He has a wonderful teacher this year who actually loves all children and believes that all children can learn and encourages them with praise and rewards their accomplishments.

I think all teachers should step back and take a look at themselves and see if they really do love teaching or has it just become a job. You as educators, especially in the lower elementary grades are molding these children's outlook on education for the next 12 years. If they get nothing but criticism and negative input from you, what makes you think they will still be there as a senior to graduate.

All children are not the same and some need a little more help and encouragement to get over the rough spots. They are not a little group of robots to be programmed one way and that's it.

This proves to me that truly all children can learn given the right opportunity and encouraging environment.

It is a sad day when you have a kindergarten student come home telling you how he hates school when he should be excited and wanting to learn, instead of worrying about getting a red light instead of a green.

I am just thankful that his mother had the foresight to see this and got him out of the environment of being labeled a troublemaker and into a creative and encouraging school environment, where the children are not discouraged from being children, but that creativity is allowed to grow and encourages them to be excited about learning.



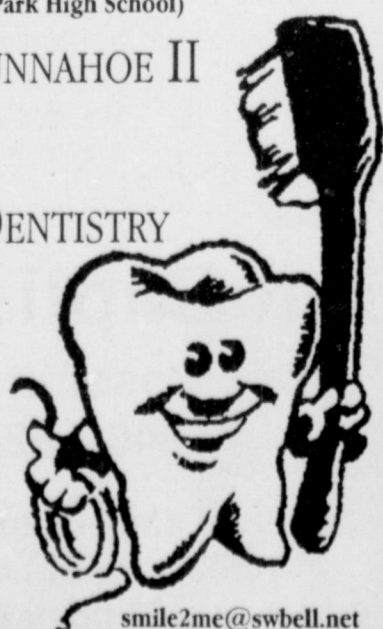

Cook of the Week



Sue Garrett

Sue and Kenneth Garrett have felt like Iowa Park is home since moving here in 1962 from Houston. Both grew up in Eastland County. Sue is a graduate of Carbon High School and attended Midwestern State University after moving to Iowa Park.

Kenneth is a graduate of Eastland High School. He went to Ranger Junior College, and later took courses in criminal justice at MSU.

After going through the academy and becoming a trooper for the Department of Public Safety, Kenneth was assigned to Houston, where they lived until he was transferred to this area.

Sue said that they loved the change and were thankful that they lived closer to their families. In addition, they now had a five year old daughter and felt Iowa Park was a good place for her to go to school and be involved in community activities.

Sue worked 15 years as a bookkeeper and buyer for Park Pharmacy, then worked at the Wichita County court house until she retired in 1996.

Kenneth retired from the DPS in 1992, and they moved to Coppell for two years where he worked as a state inspector.

Their daughter, Teresa Phillips, now lives in Wataga, and has a son,

Andy Wright.

Sue is a past member of the Iowa Park Garden Club and served as coordinator for Camp Fire. She is a member of Iowa Park Church of Christ, where she teaches a third and fourth grade Sunday school class and helps with Vacation Bible School.

As far as having a hobby, Sue said she collects glassware and likes to go "antiqueing."

Her recipes are ones she has used often and her family enjoys. She said when she first started making the "Hershey Chocolate Cake," you could buy Hershey bars for five cents each. Now she uses two large bars for the recipe.

Hershey Chocolate Cake

- 8 - 5 ¢ plain Hershey bars (now I use 2 large Hershey bars)
- 1 small can chocolate syrup
- 1 cup shortening
- 2 cups sugar
- 4 eggs
- 2 tsps. vanilla
- 2 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp. soda
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1 cup buttermilk

Melt candy and chocolate syrup over hot water. Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs and vanilla and

beat well. Sift dry ingredients; add buttermilk; then blend in chocolate. Bake one hour and 15 minutes at 325 degrees in a greased and floured 9x13 inch pan.

Icing:

- 1 cup sugar
- 1/2 cup evaporated milk
- 1 small pkg. chocolate morsels
- 12 marshmallows, cut up
- 1 tsp. vanilla

Heat milk and sugar. Add chocolate morsels, marshmallows and vanilla. Cook until all are dissolved. Beat until smooth and spread on cool cake.

Cheese Soup

- 1 stick margarine
- 1 med. onion, chopped fine
- 4 stalks celery, chopped fine
- 1/2 bell pepper, chopped fine
- 3 med. carrots, grated

Saute onion, celery, pepper and carrots in margarine. Put in large pan and add:

- 2 cans Swanson chicken broth
- 2 cans cream of potato soup
- 2 lbs. Velveeta cheese

Simmer 30 minutes on low.

Quick Chili

- 1 lb. lean ground beef
- 1 large garlic, chopped

Brown meat and garlic; drain.

- 2 cans Mexican stew tomatoes
- 1 can whole kernel corn
- 2 Tbsps. chili powder
- 1 can kidney beans

Drain corn and beans. Add to meat & garlic mixture and simmer 20 minutes.

Hungry Jack Beef Casserole

- 1 lb. ground beef
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 - 16 oz. can pork & beans
- 3/4 cup Kraft barbecue sauce
- 2 Tbsps. brown sugar
- Small onion, chopped
- 1/4 cup chopped bell pepper

1 large can Hungry Jack biscuits
1 cup shredded cheese
Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Brown ground beef. Stir in next 6 ingredients. Heat until bubbly. Pour into lightly greased 2 quart casserole. Cut biscuits in halves to form 20 half circles. Place cut-side down around edge and center of casserole. Sprinkle with cheese. Bake at 375 degrees 25-30 minutes or until biscuits are golden brown.

Hallelujah White Cake

- 2 cups granulated sugar
- 2/3 cup shortening
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup milk
- 3 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
- 3 tsps. baking powder
- 1 tsp. salt
- 4 egg whites
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 1 - 10 oz. jar red current jelly

Preheat oven to 375 degrees. Grease and flour two 9-inch round cake pans. Thoroughly cream sugar, shortening and vanilla. Add milk alternately with blended flour, 3 teaspoons baking powder and salt. Beat egg whites with remaining 1 teaspoon baking powder until stiff but not dry. Gently fold egg whites into first mix-

ture. Empty batter into prepared cake pans. Bake about 20 minutes, or until cake tests done. Cool layers on wire cake racks.

While cake layers are still warm, split layers horizontally. Using 10-ounce jar of red current jelly, spread layers with jelly and put together in stack. Frost top and sides with Amen Frosting and decorate with shredded coconut.

Amen Frosting

- 2 unbeaten egg whites
- 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
- 2 tsps. light corn syrup
- 1/3 cup cold water
- Dash salt
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- Shredded coconut - 8 oz. can or bag

Place all ingredients, except vanilla, in top of double boiler and beat one minute with electric beater to blend. Then place over boiling water and cook, beating constantly, till frosting forms stiff peaks, about 7 minutes. Remove from boiling water and add vanilla. Continue to beat until of spreading consistency. May be tinted pale pink if desired. Sprinkle with shredded coconut.

Six week Bran Muffins

- 7 cups Raisin Bran flakes
- 5 cups unsifted flour
- 2 cups sugar
- 5 tsps. soda
- 2 tsps. salt
- 4 cups milk
- 2 Tbsps. vinegar
- 1 cup vegetable oil
- 1/2 cup molasses
- 4 eggs, beaten

Mix first five ingredients (mix well). Then add vegetable oil, molasses and eggs. Fill muffin tin 2/3 full and bake at 400 degrees 15 to 20 minutes. Batter will keep for six weeks in refrigerator.

Hawks whip up on Bowie, 42-6

With the scoreboard clock reading 5:21 left to play in the first quarter and the Hawks clinging to a slim one-point lead at 7-6, Hawk fans might have thought they were in for another game that went down to the final buzzer before the winner could be determined. That was until Iowa Park scored 35 unanswered points to blow out the Bowie Jackrabbits 42-7 in front of a packed homecoming crowd. What looked like it would be a close game quickly turned into a rout as the Hawk defense shut out the Rabbits the rest of the game by forcing eight turnovers, including five fumbles and three interceptions. Iowa Park, now 4-3 overall and 1-1 in district play, scored in every quarter and rolled up 374 yards of total offense, including 358 on the ground, while the Rabbits, who fell to 3-4 overall and 1-1 in district play, managed only 238 yards of offense, including only 65 yards rushing.

Iowa Park opened the scoring by taking the opening kickoff and marching 62 yards in nine plays, capped by Jimmy Wilson's 28-yard touchdown run around his right end. Wilson finished the night with three touchdowns and 131 yards rushing on only eight carries. Rick Hartman added the first of his four extra points to make it 7-0 with 7:56 left to play in the first.

On Bowie's first play from scrimmage, Skye Richey was met at the line of scrimmage by a host of Hawk defenders, forcing a fumble that was recovered by Chase Wright at the Bowie 40. But two plays later Iowa Park returned the favor when the Hawks fumbled the ball back over to the Rabbits at the 35.

Following the Iowa Park turnover, Bowie marched 65 yards in only five plays, the biggest coming on a 49-yard reception from Dylan Stark to Brent Fee that moved the ball to the Iowa Park 14. Two plays later Richey dashed 11 yards for the touchdown to pull the Rabbits to within one at 7-6. A bad snap on the point after attempt left Bowie behind by one with 5:21 left to play in the first quarter.

From that point on it was all Iowa Park as the Hawks gave the large homecoming crowd what they came to see.

Iowa Park took the ensuing kickoff at its own 39 and took only three plays to find the endzone. Ryan Huff, who also rushed for over 100 yards finishing with 117 on 10 tries, capped the drive with a 34-yard run to push the lead to 14-6 at the end of the first quarter.

Midway through the second quarter, Iowa Park again lit up the scoreboard this time on a 73-yard run by Wilson with 3:55 left in the first half. Hartman's extra point attempt was no

good, leaving the score at 20-6 at the half.

Sloppy is the word that describes the third quarter as the two teams combined to turn the ball over eight times, five for the Rabbits and three for the Hawks. Iowa Park did manage to score once in the period, on a three-yard run by Wilson with 3:50 remaining. Wilson's short touchdown run was set up by a big 38-yard scamper by Huff. Hartman's point-after made it 27-6 heading into the final period.

Iowa Park opened the fourth quarter with a five-play, 13-yard drive following a Bowie fumble. J.R. Matott broke free and sacked Stark, forcing a fumble that was recovered by Michael Abby at the Bowie 13. Five plays later Tyler Pulley scored from two yards out to push the lead to 33-6. Hartman's point after attempt was blocked by the Rabbits, but the bouncing ball was scooped up by Hartman and he carried it into the endzone for the two-point conversion to make it 35-6.

Iowa Park's final touchdown came with 1:04 left to play, when Bryan Swenson scored from four yards out to make the final 42-6.

The offensive line of Shane Dunn, James Williams, Damon Fox, Kyle Young, Russell Duggins and Matott all had a good night opening holes for the Hawk running backs who rushed for 358 yards on 46 carries for an average of 7.78 yards per carry.

Defensively the Hawks were led by Brandon Lane who finished with 19 tackles including two sacks and a pair of forced fumbles. Chase Simpson and Matott both

finished with 12 tackles with Matott recording a sack and a forced fumble. Jeff Duerson, Aaron Duran and Lane all had interceptions while Wright, Wilson, Abby, Fox and Bryan Swanson all had fumble recoveries for Iowa Park.
