AMENDING STATE'S CONSTITUTION Tuesday is date to vote

The turnout of local voters has been extremely light, with only eight ballots cast by noon Tuesday, even though voting was begun last week. The poll is open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Tuesday is the regular election day, and the same hours of 7-7 will be observed.

Polls to be open Tuesday include: Precinct 32, First Baptist Church Annex in the 200 block of West Park; Precinct 33, W.R. Bradford Elementary; Precinct 34, West Wichita Coop at Valley View, and Precinct 35, Chaparral Baptist Encampment on Church Camp Road.

The following is a brief reference guide containing the official ballot language of each proposition listed in the order in which they will appear on the ballot, followed by a short description of the changes that each would

Early voting on 17 amendments to the State consti- necessary to implement this proposal was adopted and will take effect if voters approve the amendment.

> .10. "The constitutional amendment to provide that the commissioner of health and human services serves at the pleasure of the governor."

> In concert with proposition 8, changes the term of office of the commissioner of health and human services from the current two-year provision to service at the pleasure of the governor.

11. "The constitutional amendment permitting a political subdivision to purchase nonassessable property and casualty insurance from an authorized mutual insurance company in the same manner that the political subdivision purchases life, health, and accident insurance."

Adds another exception to the ban against local governments buying insurance from mutual insurance companies which stems from the constitutional prohibi-

Hawks hosting Vernon

Over the past several years, the Vernon Lions have struck fear in opponents.

A playoff berth was not something they hoped for, it was expected.

This year neither is true.

Vernon, meet the real world. To say the Lions have slipped a bit this year would be an understatement. Vernon's record after eight games is 2-6 and 1-2 in District 5-3A play, with games remaining against Iowa Park and Bowie.

Both the Hawks and the Jackrabbits can clinch playoff spots with wins over the Lions.

Childress remains atop the District 5-3A standings at 8-0 and 3-0, while Iowa Park and Graham are tied for second with 2-1 records. Bowie and Vernon are 1-2 and Henrietta is 0-3.

With only two games remaining in the regular season, Childress needs only one win in it's final two games against Graham and Henrietta to take the District Title for the second year in a row. The remaining two spots are still up for grabs.

Iowa Park will clinch a playoff spot for the fifth straight season with a win over Vernon Friday night, regardless of the outcome of it's final season game in Graham. If Bowie wins it's game against Henrietta Friday night, the Rabbits can secure the final playoff spot with a win over Vernon in the final week.

Graham needs some help to get

in after falling to Bowie in the opener. The Steers have the toughest schedule left to play, with games at Childress and at home to Iowa Park next week.

Iowa Park's game against the Lions will kickoff at 7:30 p.m. at Hawk Stadium and will also be Parents Night.

Activities will get underway at 6:40, with each of the senior football players, cheerleaders and band members being announced along with their parents.

If it were any other 2-6 team coming to town, head coach Weldon Nelms might be a bit concerned about his team taking this week's game too lightly. But not Vernon.

"You don't have to say a lot

when it comes to playing Vernon to get these kids ready to play," Nelms said. "You can throw out the records when these two teams hook up. This rivalry goes way back and it's been six years since we've beaten them. I know I haven't beaten them since I've been here and it would sure be nice to beat them this week and wrap up a playoff spot. This will be their Super Bowl. They would love to come up here and beat us. It would make their season.

Vernon comes into the game with a 1-2 district mark after opening league play with a 13-7 overtime win against Henrietta. The Lions have dropped their last two games, 33-7 to Childress and 28-14 to Graham.

1. "The constitutional amendment to revise the provisions of the filling of a vacancy in the office of the governör or lieutenant governor."

Requires the lieutenant governor to vacate that office when filling a permanent vacancy in the governor's office.

2. "The constitutional amendment relating to the making of advances under a reverse mortgage and payment of a reverse mortgage."

Removes impediments to the full participation of reverse mortgages in the home equity lending program authorized in 1997.

3. "The constitutional amendment to eliminate duplicative, executed, obsolete, archaic, and ineffective provisions of the Texas Constitution."

Self-explanatory. Makes no substantive changes. 4. "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt property owned by institutions engaged primarily in public charitable functions from ad valorem taxation."

Expands the constitutional definition of charitable organizations for property tax exemption purposes from "institutions of purely public charity" to "institutions engaged primarily in public charitable functions."

5. "The constitutional amendment allowing state employees to receive compensation for serving as a member of a governing body of a school district, city, town or other local governmental district."

Provides an exception to the constitutional prohibition against holding more than one civil office for compensation.

6. "The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum size of an urban homestead to 10 acres, prescribing permissible uses of urban homesteads, and preventing the overburdening of a homestead."

Increases the size of an urban homestead that is protected from forced sale for debt repayment from one to 10 contiguous acres, authorizes its use as a home or as both a home and a place of business, and provides refinancing flexibility by allowing only a portion of the homestead to be used as security for a home equity loan.

7. "The constitutional amendment authorizing garnishment of wages for the enforcement of courtordered spousal maintenance."

Adds spousal maintenance to child support payments as an authorized purpose for garnishing wages.

8. "The constitutional amendment to provide that the adjutant general serves at the pleasure of the governor."

Changes the term of office of the adjutant general from the current two-year provision to service at the pleasure of the governor.

9. "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to create a judicial compensation commission."

Establishes a nine-member commission appointed by the governor to recommend to the legislature each biennium judicial salaries that would be binding unless rejected by either the House or the Senate. Legislation tion against political subdivisions lending their credit to or becoming stockholders in any company.

12. "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation leased motor vehicles not held by the lessee primarily to produce income."

Authorizes a property tax exemption for vehicles leased by individuals for non-business use -- the same treatment now afforded to vehicles owned by individuals. The exemption will not be effective until a future Legislature passes implementing legislation.

13. "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$400 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students."

Authorizes the Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue in installments an additional \$400 million (\$960 million authorized since 1965, including \$300 million last in 1995) in general obligation bonds to support the state's Hinson-Hazlewood College Student Loan Program.

14. "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide that a state board, commission or other agency shall be governed by a board composed of an odd number of three or more members."

Clears up any confusion (caused by the current constitutional requirement that one-third of state agency governing board members must be elected or appointed every three years) about the ability of the Legislature to create state agency boards and commissions with memberships that are not evenly divisible by three.

15. "The constitutional amendment permitting spouses to agree to convert separate property to community property."

Allows spouses to make such agreements consistent with the current constitutional provision authorizing the conversions of community property to separate property if both spouses agree in writing.

16. "The constitutional amendment to provide that certain counties shall be divided into a specific number of precincts."

Requires counties with populations of 1800 to 50,000 (instead of 30,000) to have between two and eight (instead of five) justice of the peace and constable precincts. Currently, counties over 30,000 (which will increase to 50,000) are required to have four to eight precincts.

17. "The constitutional amendment relating to the investment of the permanent university fund and the distribution from the permanent university fund to the available university fund.

Authorizes the University of Texas Board of Regents to increase distributions to the Available University Fund from the Permanent University Fund by basing the transfer, with certain restrictions, on total fund earnings, including capital gains, rather than the current mandated distribution of all dividend and interest income. Also authorizes the Board of Regents to invest funds using an expanded prudent investor standard, which legitimizes investments that are made with the exercise of reasonable care, skill and caution.

to go to Texas Ranger and Dallas Cowboy games.

Following are some of the favorite recipes of Rita's family.

Rita's Country Style Pork Ribs

4 lbs. country style pork ribs
1/3 cup hickory liquid smoke
1/2 cup barbecue sauce
1/4 cup minced onion
1/4 cup minced garlic
1 can beer for tenderizer (or meat tenderizer of your choice)

Wash meat. Place 1/3 cup liquid smoke in bottom of 9x14 glass dish. Add 1/2 cup barbecue sauce, 1/4 cup minced onion, 1/4 cup of minced garlic. Then add 1 can of beer to tenderize the ribs. Mix well. Place meat in dish. Mix sauce well over the meat. Cover with foil and put in ice box for 30 minutes. Turn once, then again one more time before cooking. Remove and cook on grill to your taste or until done. Serves 2-4.

Mom's Potato Salad

4-6 large potatoes 2 tsps. mustard

- 2 Tbsps. mayonnaise
- 4 boiled eggs (add more if you want)
- 4-6 slices cooked bacon
- 2 diced pickles 1/2 cup diced onions
- Salt & pepper to taste

Cut potatoes into quarters and then dice them. Cover with water and bring to a boil. Cook until almost done; drain. In extra large bowl, mix onions, pepper, pickles, eggs, mustard, mayonnaise, bacon and salt. Mix in potatoes and pour into nice bowl. Cool for better taste. Serves 4-6.

Rita's Hamburger Surprise

4 lbs. hamburger meat 1/2 cup bell peppers 1/2 cup onions 1/2 cup diced tomatoes 1 tsp. garlic 2 tsps. chili powder

1 1/2 Tbsps. powdered cumin

Brown hamburger meat with bell peppers and onions until done. Drain grease. Add tomatoes, garlic, chili powder and cumin. Cook 3 minutes. For a thicker sauce, add 1 1/2 tablespoons of flour and hot water. Mix flour well and add to the meat. Stir in well and let simmer 10 minutes.

Serve with potatoes or homemade Spanish rice.

Spanish Rice

3 cups rice 1/2 cup diced bell peppers 1/2 cup diced onion 1/2 cup diced tomatoes 1 tsp. garlic salt 1 tsp. chili powder

4 cups hot water

Brown rice with 1 tablespoon of grease. Add peppers, onions, tomatoes, and seasonings. Turn heat down. Add 4 cups of water and bring to a boil. Cook on high heat 30 minutes. Stir only once. Cover and let simmer 20 minutes or until done. Serves 4.


After a closed portion of the meeting, Lisa Chitwood was hired as school nurse for the remainder of the year.



The ornaments feature a picture of the Tom Burnett Library and have the wording, "Merry Christmas, Iowa Park, Texas 1999."


Each year the Garden Club plans to have ornaments made that will depict a historic building or site in Iowa Park.





But a lot of folks are confused about our deadlines here at the paper, and maybe I can clear the issue up, for a while, anyway.



The reason for such a decision not to prepare such a Statement is based upon the fact that all environmental concerns could either be minimized or mitigated.

Such written comments must be received at the address specified within sixteen (16) days after this publication. All such comments so received will be considered and the city will not request the release of funds or take any administrative action on the project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

RELEASE OF FUNDS

The City of Iowa Park will undertake the activities described above with Community Block Grant Funds under Title I from its Program Year 1999 under a contract from the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Iowa Park is certifying to TDoED that Timothy Hunter, in his official capacity as Mayor, consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Iowa Park may use the Block Grant funds and it will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. TDoED will accept an objection to its approval only on one or more of the bases and procedures described in 24 CFR Part 58.75. Objections are to be addressed to the Texas Department of Economic Development, P.O. Box 12728, Austin, Texas 78711.

Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by the TDoED. No objections received later than thirty-three (33) days after this publication will be considered by TDoED.

setting.

Care is provided by the patient's which GFWC continues to support. own physician, Hospice Medical Directors, Registered Nurses, Certified Nurses Aides, licensed social workers, clergy and volunteers who offer medical and physical care for the patient and emotional support and spiritual guidance for both patient and family.

> Registered nurses are on call 24 hours a day to provide instructions in patient care, skilled nursing care and pain management as needed. Also provided is assistance in acquiring necessary medical equipment and supplies for home care. A group of more than 150 specially trained volunteers become friends to the patients and thie families providing respice care and emotional support.

Home care is offered to all Texas communities within a 50-mile radius of Wichita Falls. Although many services are covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and private insurance, no patient who meets the admission criteria is denied assistance due to a lack of financial resources.

Generous financial support from the community makes it possible to serve all patients who meet admission criteria. One of the most familiar fund raising efforts is the annual Tree of Lights ceremony during the Christmas holiday season.

After her report, Mrs. Hicks introduced Kay Lucy, area educator in speech, drama, and English, and frequent cast member at Backdoor Theatre, who reviewed the book, "Clutter's Last Stand," by Don Aslett.


Janice Newman was named to form a committee and develop rules for a Christmas lighting contest. She is to report at the November meeting.

Police busy on warrants





be no escape if one neglects the salvation spoken by Christ and confirmed by His apostles (verse 3). In chapter 3:1-6, Christ is exalted above Moses, the lawgiver of the Old Testament. He then warns against "departing from the living God," like Israel. And in chapter 4:11, 12 is God's warning against transgressing the Word of His son. "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart." None of the us can hide from God. "Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do" (verse 13).

Bobby Loyd finished in fourth place in the boys' varsity division, earning him a medal.


The Iowa Park JV girls finished in second place overall with Jenny York and Elizabeth Collins finishing fifth and ninth respectiviey.
