Hawks hosting Vernon

Over the past several years, the Vernon Lions have struck fear in opponents.

A playoff berth was not something they hoped for, it was expected.

This year neither is true.

Vernon, meet the real world.

To say the Lions have slipped a bit this year would be an understatement. Vernon's record after eight games is 2-6 and 1-2 in District 5-3A play, with games remaining against Iowa Park and Bowie.

Both the Hawks and the Jackrabbits can clinch playoff spots with wins over the Lions.

Childress remains atop the District 5-3A standings at 8-0 and 3-0, while Iowa Park and Graham are tied for second with 2-1 records. Bowie and Vernon are 1-2 and Henrietta is 0-3.

With only two games remaining in the regular season, Childress needs only one win in its final two games against Graham and Henrietta to take the District Title for the second year in a row. The remaining two spots are still up for grabs.

Iowa Park will clinch a playoff spot for the fifth straight season with a win over Vernon Friday night, regardless of the outcome of its final season game in Graham. If Bowie wins its game against Henrietta Friday night, the Rabbits can secure the final playoff spot with a win over Vernon in the final week.

Graham needs some help to get

in after falling to Bowie in the opener. The Steers have the toughest schedule left to play, with games at Childress and at home to Iowa Park next week.

Iowa Park's game against the Lions will kickoff at 7:30 p.m. at Hawk Stadium and will also be Parents Night.

Activities will get underway at 6:40, with each of the senior football players, cheerleaders and band members being announced along with their parents.

If it were any other 2-6 team coming to town, head coach Weldon Nelms might be a bit concerned about his team taking this week's game too lightly. But not Vernon.

"You don't have to say a lot

when it comes to playing Vernon to get these kids ready to play," Nelms said. "You can throw out the records when these two teams hook up. This rivalry goes way back and it's been six years since we've beaten them. I know I haven't beaten them since I've been here and it would sure be nice to beat them this week and wrap up a playoff spot. This will be their Super Bowl. They would love to come up here and beat us. It would make their season."

Vernon comes into the game with a 1-2 district mark after opening league play with a 13-7 overtime win against Henrietta. The Lions have dropped their last two games, 33-7 to Childress and 28-14 to Graham.

Trustees hear report on dress code topic

A recommendation by the school dress code committee to not change the required skirt length was approved by Iowa Park school trustees in a called meeting Thursday night.

Representatives of the Rockin' Hawkettes, a girls' drill team, had appeared before the board at the Oct. 11 meeting. They asked if the dress code on skirt length could be amended to allow the girls to wear their uni-

forms to school. The board members turned the matter over to the dress code committee for a recommendation.

The Iowa Park school dress code states that, "skirts shall not be more than 2" (two) inches above the top of the knee when the student is standing."

A discussion was held by board members on whether the dress code

should be enforced for the wearing of extracurricular uniforms during the academic day.

It was pointed out that the cheerleader's skirts don't meet the dress code, and perhaps they should be restricted to wearing their uniforms to pep rallies during the day.

When it was pointed that the cheerleaders have been wearing their

AMENDING STATE'S CONSTITUTION

Tuesday is date to vote

Early voting on 17 amendments to the State constitution will continue through Friday, at the county sub station, located at 400 North Wall.

The turnout of local voters has been extremely light, with only eight ballots cast by noon Tuesday, even though voting was begun last week. The poll is open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Tuesday is the regular election day, and the same hours of 7-7 will be observed.

Polls to be open Tuesday include: Precinct 32, First Baptist Church Annex in the 200 block of West Park; Precinct 33, W.R. Bradford Elementary; Precinct 34, West Wichita Coop at Valley View, and Precinct 35, Chaparral Baptist Encampment on Church Camp Road.

The following is a brief reference guide containing the official ballot language of each proposition listed in the order in which they will appear on the ballot, followed by a short description of the changes that each would make.

1. "The constitutional amendment to revise the provisions of the filling of a vacancy in the office of the governor or lieutenant governor."

Requires the lieutenant governor to vacate that office when filling a permanent vacancy in the governor's office.

2. "The constitutional amendment relating to the making of advances under a reverse mortgage and payment of a reverse mortgage."

Removes impediments to the full participation of reverse mortgages in the home equity lending program authorized in 1997.

3. "The constitutional amendment to eliminate duplicative, executed, obsolete, archaic, and ineffective provisions of the Texas Constitution."

Self-explanatory. Makes no substantive changes.

4. "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt property owned by institutions engaged primarily in public charitable functions from ad valorem taxation."

Expands the constitutional definition of charitable organizations for property tax exemption purposes from "institutions of purely public charity" to "institutions engaged primarily in public charitable functions."

5. "The constitutional amendment allowing state employees to receive compensation for serving as a member of a governing body of a school district, city, town or other local governmental district."

Provides an exception to the constitutional prohibition against holding more than one civil office for compensation.

6. "The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum size of an urban homestead to 10 acres, prescribing permissible uses of urban homesteads, and preventing the overburdening of a homestead."

Increases the size of an urban homestead that is protected from forced sale for debt repayment from one to 10 contiguous acres, authorizes its use as a home or as both a home and a place of business, and provides refinancing flexibility by allowing only a portion of the homestead to be used as security for a home equity loan.

7. "The constitutional amendment authorizing garnishment of wages for the enforcement of court-ordered spousal maintenance."

Adds spousal maintenance to child support payments as an authorized purpose for garnishing wages.

8. "The constitutional amendment to provide that the adjutant general serves at the pleasure of the governor."

Changes the term of office of the adjutant general from the current two-year provision to service at the pleasure of the governor.

9. "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to create a judicial compensation commission."

Establishes a nine-member commission appointed by the governor to recommend to the legislature each biennium judicial salaries that would be binding unless rejected by either the House or the Senate. Legislation

necessary to implement this proposal was adopted and will take effect if voters approve the amendment.

10. "The constitutional amendment to provide that the commissioner of health and human services serves at the pleasure of the governor."

In concert with proposition 8, changes the term of office of the commissioner of health and human services from the current two-year provision to service at the pleasure of the governor.

11. "The constitutional amendment permitting a political subdivision to purchase nonassessable property and casualty insurance from an authorized mutual insurance company in the same manner that the political subdivision purchases life, health, and accident insurance."

Adds another exception to the ban against local governments buying insurance from mutual insurance companies which stems from the constitutional prohibition against political subdivisions lending their credit to or becoming stockholders in any company.

12. "The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to exempt from ad valorem taxation leased motor vehicles not held by the lessee primarily to produce income."

Authorizes a property tax exemption for vehicles leased by individuals for non-business use -- the same treatment now afforded to vehicles owned by individuals. The exemption will not be effective until a future Legislature passes implementing legislation.

13. "The constitutional amendment providing for the issuance of \$400 million in general obligation bonds to finance educational loans to students."

Authorizes the Higher Education Coordinating Board to issue in installments an additional \$400 million (\$960 million authorized since 1965, including \$300 million last in 1995) in general obligation bonds to support the state's Hinson-Hazlewood College Student Loan Program.

14. "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide that a state board, commission or other agency shall be governed by a board composed of an odd number of three or more members."

Clears up any confusion (caused by the current constitutional requirement that one-third of state agency governing board members must be elected or appointed every three years) about the ability of the Legislature to create state agency boards and commissions with memberships that are not evenly divisible by three.

15. "The constitutional amendment permitting spouses to agree to convert separate property to community property."

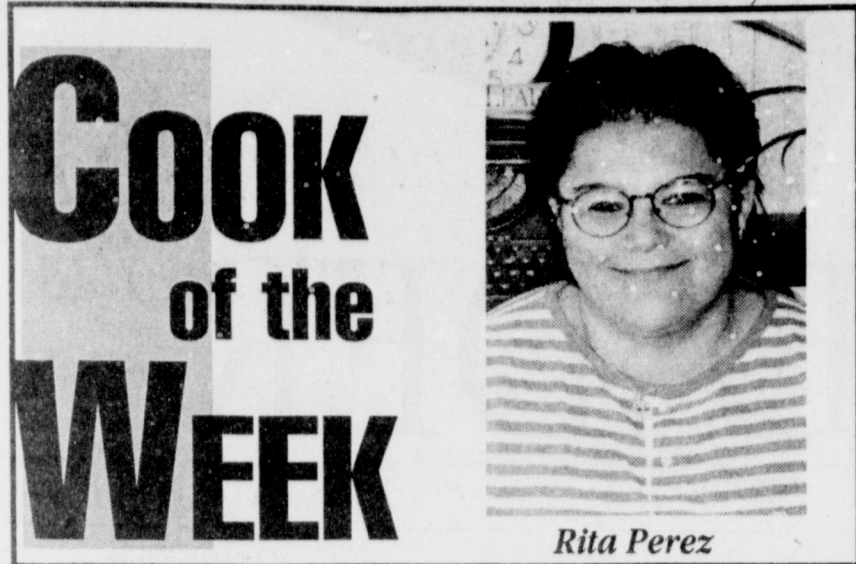
Allows spouses to make such agreements consistent with the current constitutional provision authorizing the conversions of community property to separate property if both spouses agree in writing.

16. "The constitutional amendment to provide that certain counties shall be divided into a specific number of precincts."

Requires counties with populations of 1800 to 50,000 (instead of 30,000) to have between two and eight (instead of five) justice of the peace and constable precincts. Currently, counties over 30,000 (which will increase to 50,000) are required to have four to eight precincts.

17. "The constitutional amendment relating to the investment of the permanent university fund and the distribution from the permanent university fund to the available university fund."

Authorizes the University of Texas Board of Regents to increase distributions to the Available University Fund from the Permanent University Fund by basing the transfer, with certain restrictions, on total fund earnings, including capital gains, rather than the current mandated distribution of all dividend and interest income. Also authorizes the Board of Regents to invest funds using an expanded prudent investor standard, which legitimizes investments that are made with the exercise of reasonable care, skill and caution.

Following are some of the favorite recipes of Rita's family.

Rita's Country Style Pork Ribs

4 lbs. country style pork ribs
1/3 cup hickory liquid smoke
1/2 cup barbecue sauce
1/4 cup minced onion
1/4 cup minced garlic
1 can beer for tenderizer (or meat tenderizer of your choice)

Wash meat. Place 1/3 cup liquid smoke in bottom of 9x14 glass dish. Add 1/2 cup barbecue sauce, 1/4 cup minced onion, 1/4 cup of minced garlic. Then add 1 can of beer to tenderize the ribs. Mix well. Place meat in dish. Mix sauce well over the meat. Cover with foil and put in ice box for 30 minutes. Turn once, then again one more time before cooking. Remove and cook on grill to your taste or until done. Serves 2-4.

Mom's Potato Salad

4-6 large potatoes
2 tps. mustard
2 Tbsps. mayonnaise
4 boiled eggs (add more if you want)
4-6 slices cooked bacon
2 diced pickles
1/2 cup diced onions
Salt & pepper to taste

Cut potatoes into quarters and then dice them. Cover with water and bring to a boil. Cook until almost done; drain. In extra large bowl, mix onions, pepper, pickles, eggs, mustard, mayonnaise, bacon and salt. Mix in potatoes and pour into nice bowl. Cool for better taste. Serves 4-6.

Rita's Hamburger Surprise

4 lbs. hamburger meat
1/2 cup bell peppers
1/2 cup onions
1/2 cup diced tomatoes
1 tsp. garlic
2 tps. chili powder
1 1/2 Tbsps. powdered cumin

Brown hamburger meat with bell peppers and onions until done. Drain grease. Add tomatoes, garlic, chili powder and cumin. Cook 3 minutes. For a thicker sauce, add 1 1/2 tablespoons of flour and hot water. Mix flour well and add to the meat. Stir in well and let simmer 10 minutes.

Serve with potatoes or homemade Spanish rice.

Spanish Rice

3 cups rice
1/2 cup diced bell peppers
1/2 cup diced onion
1/2 cup diced tomatoes
1 tsp. garlic salt
1 tsp. chili powder

4 cups hot water

Brown rice with 1 tablespoon of grease. Add peppers, onions, tomatoes, and seasonings. Turn heat down. Add 4 cups of water and bring to a boil. Cook on high heat 30 minutes. Stir only once. Cover and let simmer 20 minutes or until done. Serves 4.

uniforms to school for several years, board member Wendall House said, "at one point in time they didn't make exceptions for cheerleaders, so why make an exception now?"

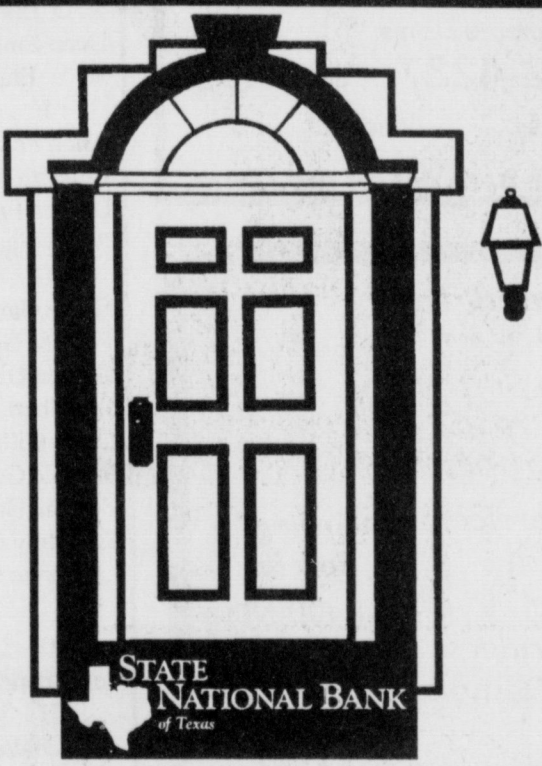

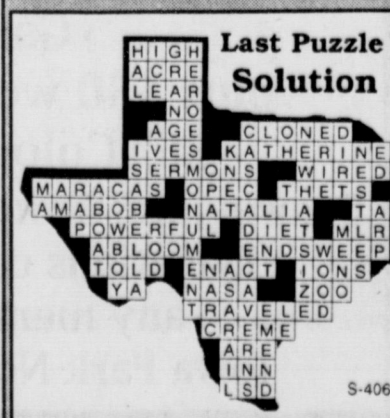

As I See It... By Bob Hamilton



I seldom use this space to talk about anything commercial, and haven't done it for a long time.

But a lot of folks are confused about our deadlines here at the paper, and maybe I can clear the issue up, for a while, anyway.

The most common topic of confusion is our deadline for classified advertising. We are constantly getting calls or comments from folks wanting to run a garage sale, or the like, on Tuesdays and asking if it is too late.

Well, unless we have announced a week earlier that we are going to press early because of a postal holiday, that deadline is on noon Wednesday.

Advertising we identify as "display" has a deadline of 4 p.m. on Tuesday. That is the advertising that has a border around it, including birthday ads and the like.

It's never a problem for us to explain the deadlines whenever someone calls, but I thought maybe this reminder might be of some help.

As to deadline for stories, such as organization meetings, weddings, and things of a personal matter, we ask that the information be turned in

as early as possible. We are happy to accept the information at any time, but when it comes in on a Wednesday, when we are extremely busy putting the finishing touches on that issue, we can't always promise that the information will be used that week.

Public Comments on Finding

All interested agencies, groups, and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City to the address as set forth above. Such written comments must be received at the address specified within sixteen (16) days after this publication. All such comments so received will be considered and the city will not request the release of funds or take any administrative action on the project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

RELEASE OF FUNDS

The City of Iowa Park will undertake the activities described above with Community Block Grant Funds under Title I from its Program Year 1999 under a contract from the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Iowa Park is certifying to TDoED that Timothy Hunter, in his official capacity as Mayor, consents to accept the jurisdiction of the Federal Courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the City of Iowa Park may use the Block Grant funds and it will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. TDoED will accept an objection to its approval only on one or more of the bases and procedures described in 24 CFR Part 58.75. Objections are to be addressed to the Texas Department of Economic Development, P.O. Box 12728, Austin, Texas 78711.

Home Life theme of 23 Study Club meeting

Home Life was the theme for Twenty Three Study Club's meeting held last Thursday at Tom Burnett Library. Highlights of the meeting were a book review and a report on Hospice.

Program leader Shirley Hicks welcomed the members and read the quote for the day, "Nothing is so contagious as enthusiasm; it moves stones. It charms brutes. Enthusiasm is the genius of sincerity and truth accomplishes no victories without it," from the writings of Edward G.E. Bulwer-Lytton. She also led members in the Pledge of Allegiance and the group reading of the Club Collect.

The meditation by Mary Guthrie was a humorous selection on aging from Barbara Johnson's book, "Stuck a Geranium in Your Hat and Be Happy."

The Federation Counselors report by Joy Bell McKinnon dealt

with the ongoing preservation and restoration of Independence Hall, which GFWC continues to support.

Roll call was answered with each member giving an organizational tip or shortcut.

Mrs. Hicks then gave a report on Hospice of Wichita Falls, which is dedicated exclusively to furnishing care, hope and support for people with cancer and other life threatening illnesses in the last months of life.

She stated that it was incorporated as a non profit organization in December 1983, and began service in April 1985 to provide in-home care for patients terminally ill with cancer or other life threatening diseases. On Jan. 27, 1997, as the result of a very generous gift from the Earl and Emma White Foundation, the Hospice Center at 4909 Johnson Road in Wichita Falls began offering inpatient care in a beautiful home-like

setting.

Care is provided by the patient's own physician, Hospice Medical Directors, Registered Nurses, Certified Nurses Aides, licensed social workers, clergy and volunteers who offer medical and physical care for the patient and emotional support and spiritual guidance for both patient and family.

Registered nurses are on call 24 hours a day to provide instructions in patient care, skilled nursing care and pain management as needed. Also provided is assistance in acquiring necessary medical equipment and supplies for home care. A group of more than 150 specially trained volunteers become friends to the patients and their families providing respite care and emotional support.

Home care is offered to all Texas communities within a 50-mile radius of Wichita Falls. Although many services are covered by Medicare, Medicaid, and private insurance, no patient who meets the admission criteria is denied assistance due to a lack of financial resources.

Generous financial support from the community makes it possible to serve all patients who meet admission criteria. One of the most familiar fund raising efforts during the Christmas holiday season.

After her report, Mrs. Hicks introduced Kay Lucy, area educator in speech, drama, and English, and frequent cast member at Backdoor Theatre, who reviewed the book, "Clutter's Last Stand," by Don Aslett.

Following her humorous review, members were given a pop quiz to determine their "clutter score."

Refreshments were served by the hostesses, Jean Johnson, Jo Ann Hale, and Lucy Reynolds, from a table decorated in a colorful autumn theme.

Books purchased by club members for the library under GFWC's

"Libraries2000" project were also on display.

President Margaret Soell reminded members of the District Fall Board Meeting at Seymour on Oct. 23. She also announced that the Nov. 8 meeting will be the annual Federation Day combined meeting of Amity and Twenty Three Study Clubs.

Janice Newman was named to form a committee and develop rules

for a Christmas lighting contest. She is to report at the November meeting.

The Chamber directors voted to again encourage businesses to hold drawings for turkeys and hams again this Thanksgiving and Christmas.

Police busy on warrants

The next blood drive is scheduled for Dec. 2, from 1:30 to 6:30 p.m. at the Masonic Lodge at 700 West Washington.

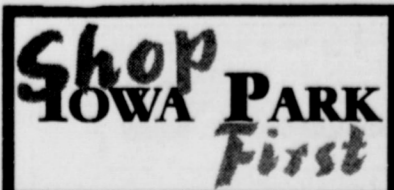
VRJC offers nursing exam

City council takes care of business

During their regularly-scheduled meeting Monday night, the city council approved two resolutions dealing with excess funds carried over from the 1998-99 budget.

The first was to invest in interest-bearing long-term investments which will increase the city's emergency fund to one million dollars.

The second was to expend a

quarter of a million toward a certificate of obligation which will cut the interest cost considerably, as well as the time it will be paid out. Among other projects, that loan was used to finance construction of the newest water tower.

Two other resolutions listed on the council's agenda also were approved. Both deal with Capital Fund

projects, which relate to transfer of ownership for two local businesses who will increase their number of employees.

One of the businesses is Kathy's Kakes, which is purchasing Dudley's Deli, while the other is Gene James Air Conditioning and Heating, which is purchasing most of the buildings and land of the long defunct

Thompson Tool.

City Administrator Mike Price explained to the council that he plans to utilize local contractors to do work involved with the Thompson Tool project, whenever it can be contracted for \$15,000 or less. That amount is the maximum allowed for such work by the state without going through the bidding process.

Roger Palmateer, local representative of Edward D. Jones, was granted a six-month extension on his currently-approved waiver of the solicitation ordinance.

Also approved, was a re-plating of a lot at the southeast corner of Alameda and Yosemite, where a new home is to be built.

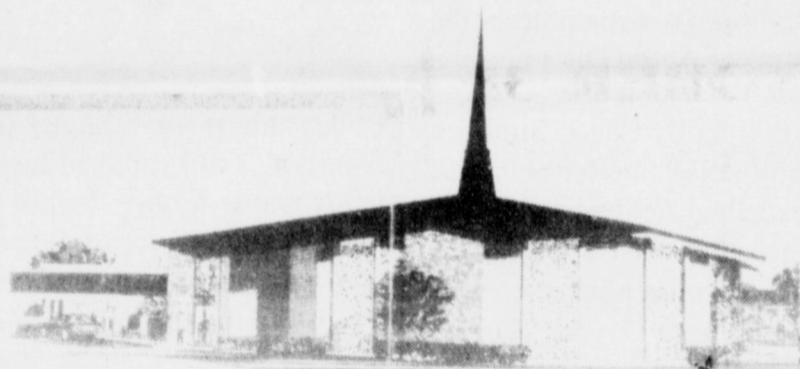

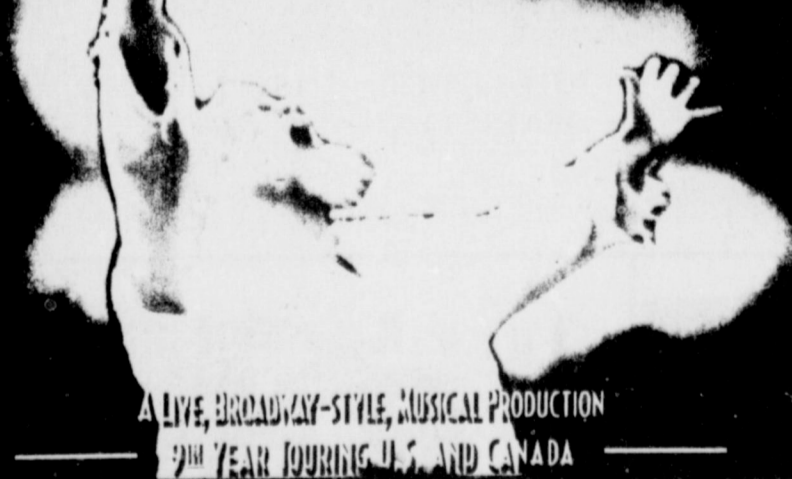

WHAT DOES GOD SAY?

By Ross Saunders

About His Word? "God...hath in these last days spoken unto us by his Son" (Hebrews 1:1-2). Jesus Christ, God's Son, is the Word (John 1:1-4) who became "flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14). Reasoning from the lesser to the greater, the Hebrews writer ranks Christ above angels in Hebrews chapter one. In chapter two, God says that there will be no escape if one neglects the salvation spoken by Christ and confirmed by His apostles (verse 3). In chapter 3:1-6, Christ is exalted above Moses, the lawgiver of the Old Testament. He then warns against "departing from the living God," like Israel. And in chapter 4:11, 12 is God's warning against transgressing the Word of His son. "For the word of God is quick, and powerful, and sharper than any twoedged sword, piercing even to the dividing asunder of soul and spirit, and of the joints and marrow, and is a discerner of the thoughts and intents of the heart." None of the us can hide from God. "Neither is there any creature that is not manifest in his sight: but all things are naked and opened unto the eyes of him with whom we have to do" (verse 13).

Christ's word is alive and must be received properly. "For this cause also thank we God without ceasing, because, when ye received the word of God which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe" (1 Thessalonians 2:13). Man can understand it (Ephesians 3:3-4). By His word, we know that Jesus Christ understands us and knows our need even better than we.

Christ's word is the Spirit's law. To conserve space, please read John 14:26; 15:26; 16:7-13; Ephesians 3:1-5. These verses were all fulfilled in Acts 2:1-4, when the Holy Spirit came upon the apostles. God's revealed truth through the Holy Spirit fill apostles is referred to as "the law of the Spirit of life in Christ Jesus that made me free from the law of sin and death" (Romans 8:2).

Christ's word is His standard of judgment. "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the word that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day" (John 12:48).

Only obedience to Christ's word can raise one from the state of being "dead in sin" to life (Romans 6:4; Ephesians 2:1). Some think the Holy Spirit must effect some "feeling" within the heart apart from Christ's word. Such was claimed in Matthew 7:21-23, and Christ called it a "work of iniquity" or lawlessness. Solomon spoke of a way that "seemeth right" but results in death. 1 Corinthians 2:14, does not teach that we cannot understand God's word, but distinguishes the inspired apostles from others who were uninspired. "We cannot understand" is nothing more than an excuse.

Hawks overcome Bearcats, 36-12

For the first 14 minutes of play in Friday night's game against Henrietta, Iowa Park looked unstoppable.

The Hawks rolled up nine first downs and had already put up 22 points before the Bearcats had made their second first down, let alone score any points. And leading 22-0, Iowa Park recovered a fumble on the Bearcat 27 and could have made things even worse.

But for the third week in a row, the Hawks have been in a giving mood and turned the ball back over, preventing the score from being any worse.

When it was all said and done, Iowa Park defeated Henrietta 36-12, handing the Bearcats their 22nd straight loss.

Iowa Park improved to 4-3 overall and 2-1 in district play with the win.

After allowing only one first down on Henrietta's opening possession, Iowa Park took over at its own 26 with 8:41 left in the first quarter. Eight plays later, Tyler Pulley scored the first of his three touchdowns to put the Hawks on top 6-0 with 6:04 remaining in the first. Pulley then threw to Aaron Duran for the two-point conversion to make it 8-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, Chase Simpson recovered a fumble by Colby Shelton at the 17, giving Iowa Park excellent field position.

It only took one play for the Hawks to cash in on the turnover, when Pulley hooked up with his tight end J.R. Matott for a 17-yard TD pass with 5:45 still showing in the first quarter. Rick Hartman came on to kick the first of his four extra points to give Iowa Park a 15-0 lead.

Henrietta was unable to make a first down on its next possession and was forced to punt after a sack by Matott on third down.

Iowa Park took over on its own 46 and 10 plays later, Jessy Robertson scored from three yards out to put the Hawks on top 22-0 after Hartman's point after. The drive started with 3:17 left in the first quarter and ended with 10:37 left in the half.

On the first play from scrimmage following the kickoff, Justin Schlanger fumbled the ball, which was recovered by Chris Simmons at the Bearcat 27, giving Iowa Park an opportunity to totally blow the game open with still over 10 minutes left in the first half.

But a Hawk fumble on the next play prevented the lead from growing.

Henrietta got on the board with 1:57 left in the half on a five-yard run by quarterback Colin Craft. The point-after pass attempt failed, leaving the score 22-6.

Iowa Park showed its two minute offense on the ensuing kickoff, starting at its own 26.



Chase Wright romps for yardage

Pulley hit three straight passes to Bryan Swenson for 19 yards, to Justin Phillips for 25 yards and to Chase Wright for seven yards, moving the ball to the Bearcat 23. The next play Swenson broke free for 16 yards, moving the ball to the seven, giving Iowa Park a first and goal with just under a minute to play. But on third and goal with only three seconds remaining, Pulley's pass intended for Wright in the end zone was intercepted by Gus Parker to end the half.

The Hawks took the second half kickoff and marched 62 yards in seven plays, capped by Pulley's second touchdown of the night, this one on a one-yard run to make it 29-6. The big play of the drive was a 48-yard completion from Pulley to Swenson.

Henrietta was unable to make a first down on its next possession, forcing another punt. Two plays later the Bearcats had the ball back, after recovering another Hawk fumble.

The turnover cost the Hawks, as the Bearcats marched 53 yards in seven plays for the score. The touchdown came on an 11-yard completion from Craft to Brett Crossland with 2:16 left in the third quarter. The big play in the drive was a 39-yard completion to Kyle Jeffries.

Iowa Park took the ensuing kickoff at its own 34 and took only four plays to score. Pulley dove over from a yard out to push the led to 36-12 with 44 seconds left in the third quarter. The first play of the drive, Ryan Huff

ran for 21 yards, then added 12 more on the next play. On the third play of the drive, Wright broke lose for 32 yards down to the one.

Neither team scored in the fourth quarter. Wright led Iowa Park in rushing with 110 yards on eight carries, followed by Huff with 70 on nine carries and Pulley with 41 on 10 tries. Swenson added 32 yards on eight at-

Defensively the Hawks were led by Matott, who finishes with 18 tackles including nine unassisted, six assisted, two caught behind the line tackles and a sack. Simpson followed with nine tackles while Damon Fox and Wright each finished with seven.

Simmons and Simpson came up with fumble recoveries for the Hawks.

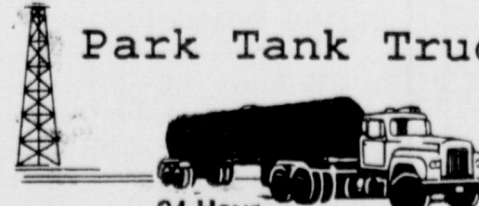

Lady Hawks district champions

Just like they've done all season long, the Iowa Park Lady Hawk volleyball team made things exciting.

And I do mean exciting. Tuesday night, Iowa Park defeated long time rival Vernon in a thrilling three-game match to claim what is believed to be its first District Championship since 1947, by beating the Lady Lions 15-13, 12-15, 16-14.

Iowa Park finishes the regular season at 14-10 overall and a perfect 6-0 in district play.

The Lady Hawks trailed for most of the first game, falling behind 10-7 and 13-11 before coming on to win 15-13. Shannon Veitenheimer served out the final four points to give Iowa Park game one.

"We started out slowly," said head coach Brenda Hodges. "I think the girls were a little unsure of themselves. I told them in the huddle that you can't think you're going to win, you have to know you're going to win."

Iowa Park then jumped on top 5-1 in game two before going into a slump.

"It's just like it's been all year long," Hodges added. "We look like we're going to go on a roll and put them away in two games, then we just fizzle and end up going three."

Vernon came back to win game two 15-12 to force a third game.

In game three, Iowa Park grabbed a 10-7 advantage, but before you knew what had happened, Vernon not only erased the lead but had gone on top 14-10, needing only one point to steal the win.

"That was scary when we were down 14-10 and I looked out there and we had one of those squirrely lineups on the floor," Hodges said. "We had a weird rotation in there when we called our last time out and we just said, we had practiced like this before and to go out there and do it."

And do it they did. Sophomore Dana Smith served the next four points to pull the Lady Hawks even at 14-14, then with Iowa Park leading 15-14, Robyn Dillard's block set off the celebration.

The win ended the 52-year drought of having a District Championship volleyball in the trophy case

and will give the Lady Hawks a bye in the first round of the playoffs.

Last year Iowa Park finished the season as the Bi-district Champions, falling to Clifton in the Area Round of the playoffs.

Iowa Park's Area Round opponent will not be determined until next week with the Area Championship being played November 4-6.

"This was a total team effort," said Hodges. "Everybody stepped up when we needed them to. It makes it even more special to win the District Title when you do it against Vernon, and do it like we did by coming back like that."



The Pep Rally for Friday night's football game will be held at 9:45 that morning in the high school gym.

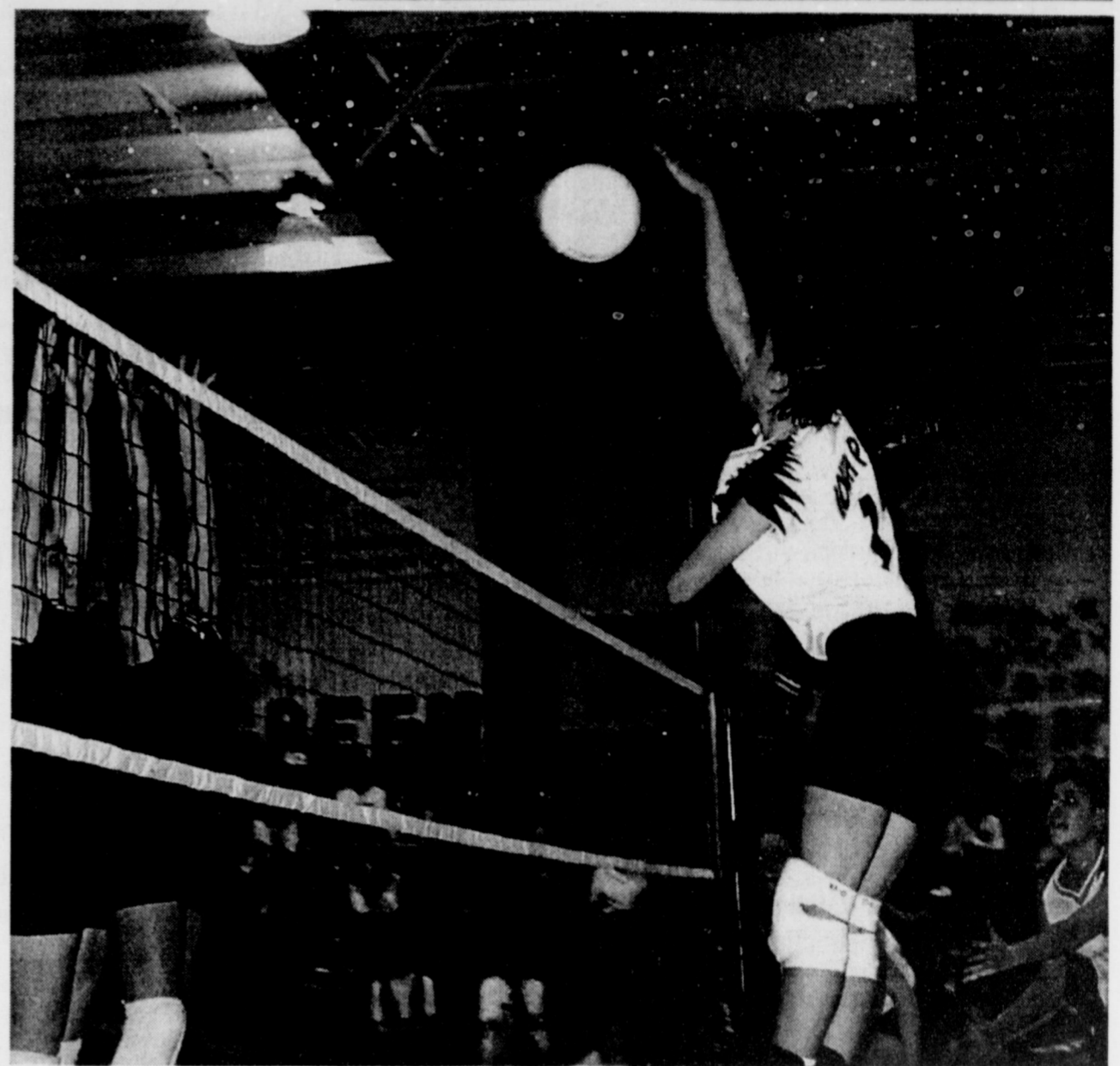

Iowa Park had to settle for a 14-14 tie with Henrietta and now stand at 2-0-1 in league play with two games remaining against Vernon and Graham.

Henrietta jumped on top 8-0 on an 80-yard touchdown run in the first half.

Iowa Park was able to move the ball in the opening half only to see penalties kill the drive inside the 25.

The half ended with Henrietta on top 8-0.

Iowa Park took the second half kickoff and marched the length of the field to tie the score at 8-8. Jeremy Fuller scored the touchdown on a quarterback keeper, then handed to Cody Penn who dove over his left tackle for the conversion to tie the game at 8-8.

A Ryan Shiery punt return set the Hawks up in excellent field position at the Bearcat 45. The Hawks moved down the field with Fuller scoring on a sweep to give Iowa Park a 14-8 lead.

Henrietta answered with a touchdown pass to knot the score at 14-14, but the Hawk defense rose to the occasion to stop the point-after to keep the game tied.

Late in the fourth quarter, Iowa Park was on the move at the Bearcat 21, in position to put the game away, only to see a fumble end it's hopes at a victory.

Iowa Park will travel to Vernon tonight to take on the Lions at 5 p.m., then will close out the season at home next week against Graham.

Overall, the Lions have been outscored 114-214 for the season.

Vernon and Iowa Park have played five common opponents in Wichita Falls High School, Hirschi, Henrietta, Childress and Burkburnett. In those five games, Vernon has been outscored 61-150, while Iowa Park has outscored those same five opponents 115-63. Vernon is 1-4 in those game while Iowa Park is 3-2.

"This is a big game for us," said Nelms. "We still haven't played our best game. This is the time we need to come together and start our run toward the playoffs. Everything is on the line, a big rivalry game, Parents night, a playoff berth, it doesn't get much better than this. We need to go out and play four quarters of solid football. We still haven't done that yet this year. We've looked good in spurts, but we haven't maintained that for an entire game. I think you'll see a big improvement Friday night. Our offensive line is starting to gel and play more like a unit and our backs are getting healthy again. Defensively we're getting everybody back this week, so that should help us as well."

This year there will be no Chederick Ricks, no Sidney Gaines, and no Jason Klappenbach for the Hawks to watch out for.

And that Lion defense that has always been so tough to score on is gone as well. This year's defense is allowing almost 28 points per game.

The Lions are led this year by quarterback Jeremy Tyra and sophomore running back Terwayne Willie. Joining them in the backfield will be fullback Cedric Scott. The offensive line averages only 190-lbs. per man.

Defensively, the Lions are led by defensive tackle Seth Anderson and linebacker Hudson Quillin. The defensive line averages 199-lbs. per man.

"One of our biggest concerns right now is the number of turnovers we are having," Nelms stated. "What makes it even worse is we are turning the ball over after we have forced a turnover. When you force a turnover you have to take advantage of it, especially against a good football team. The last three weeks we haven't been doing that. We force a turnover and we give it right back. You have to turn those into points. Some of it is the defense doing a good job of putting a helmet on the football, but a lot of it is our lack of concentration. We've been working on some drills this week that should help, but we still need to take care of the ball better. That's the kind of thing that will get you beat. We can't afford mistakes like that heading into the playoffs."

Health wise, Iowa Park is finally getting most of it's players back heading into this week's game.

Both Chase Wright and Dustin Shiery are nearing 100 percent. Michael Leal will be back this week after missing two games with a knee injury and Chris Simmons should be able to return this week after suffering an ankle injury against Henrietta.

In the head-to-head meetings between the two teams, Vernon holds an 18-10 advantage and has won the last five meetings between the two teams, including last year's 35-22 game.

Bobby Loyd finished in fourth place in the boys' varsity division, earning him a medal.

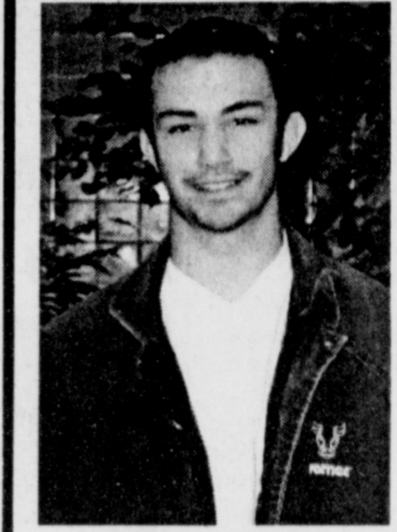
The Iowa Park JV girls finished in second place overall with Jenny York and Elizabeth Collins finishing fifth and ninth respectively.
