Council approves request from clinic for parking

Patients of Park Clinic will have additional parking space in the near future, thanks to an arrangement between the Clinic and City of Iowa Park.

The arrangement resulted following a public appearance before the council Monday night by Dr. Larry

Dr. Stutte's proposal was to utilize part of the west side of Colorado, across from the Clinic, for angle parking, as is utilized on the east side in front of the Clinic.

His proposal was for the Clinic to pay the cost of all materials, which were estimated at \$5,908, and the city's contribution, besides the space, was estimated at \$1,353. The City's portion would be included in next year's budget, Mayor Tim Hunter said.

The width of Colorado is 50 feet, and the existing pavement is less than 30 feet, according to City Administrator Mike Price.

During discussion of the proposal, Alderman Wayne House voiced his objection, pointing out that his church, Methodist, had asked the city for a similar project a few years ago. The proposal was declined, and his congregation had to pay \$20,000 for the work, he said.

The area to be used primarily for Clinic parking would also be available for the larger crowds that attend functions at the Burnett Memorial Library, it was pointed out.

When the council voted on the proposal, House cast the only vote in opposition.

OTHER BUSINESS

Also during Monday's regularlyscheduled meeting, a public hearing was held on annexing of land near Lake Iowa Park, acting on an ordinance to set the cost of additional roll-out trash containers, and a report on the city's Texas Capital Fund

There were no comments either from the audience or the council concerning the annexation issue.

The 138 acres is property the city purchased from Gene Wigley, located between US 287 and Lake Iowa Park, where plans are underway for development of an 18-hole golf course.

Responding to requests for additional roll-out containers, for which the cost was not included in previous actions of the council, a monthly rate of \$4.75 was established.

Cost of a single roll-out container is \$9.25 monthly.

Administrator Price informed the council that efforts to obtain funding from the Texas Department of Economic Development in behalf of Landkirk Investments have been unsuccessful.

The Landkirk project was to fund purchase of most of Barbour Trucking property under the state's pro-

gram for employment development in communities.

Though the proposal has been in Austin several months, problems caused by changing schedules of the state personnel was the reason given the council by the City Administra-

Two similar projects, involving Gene James Air Conditioning and Kathy's Kakes, were both successfully completed.

Landkirk is already operating in Iowa Park, and the council will continue to seek other avenues to retain the business locally, Mayor Hunter

MONDAY MEETING SET

The council is to meet again at 7 p.m. Monday, in council chambers, to continue work on the 2000-2001 budget.

At least four other budget studies have been held leading up to Monday's meeting.



Refreshments were served by members of Chapter #42 Order of Eastern Star following the installation of officers.

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
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

The worst thing kids did back in my day was to go out on summer nights and "steal" cherries off trees. I never heard of being involved in gang activities like we hear about today, and certainly have no recollection of any youth having ever been picked up by the police for breaking some

In trying to analyze that situation, I can only think that the reason was we were all so busy working, trying to earn enough money to pay our way to the picture show on Saturday, or to buy things we wanted but our parents didn't want to pay for.

There was no law regarding age, working conditions or minimum

It was not unusual for me to approach someone and ask if they would allow me to mow their lawn, chop weeds in a nearby vacant alley, or something like that.

For such a project, I would gladly accept a quarter, even if it required using my own push-type mower and required two to three hours.

And I washappy to be allowed to pull cotton bolls during season. The pay was, as I recall, \$1 to fill a 100pound sack, and that was about my capacity in a full day.



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WHAT DOES GOD SAY?

About Ministers? "Minister" occurs many times in the New Testament and is used in different ways. It is used to refer to a service rendered (Matthew 20:28; Romans 15:25). It is a term also applied to the one who serves (Ephesians 3:7; Collossians 1:7; 1 Timothy 4:6). In this sense, the word diakonos is used and means "to execute the commands of another" (Thayer's Greek-English Lexicon, page 138). In Romans 15:16, Paul calls himself the minister of Jesus Christ. In 1 Timothy, the Holy Spirit urges Timothy to be "a good minister of Jesus Christ."

Peter elaborates upon this responsibility. "If any man speak, let him speak as the oracles of God; if any man minister, let him do it as of the ability which God giveth: that God in all things may be glorified through Jesus Christ, to whom be praise and dominion for ever and ever. Amen" (1 Peter 4:11). The ministers of the New Testament were limited to what God authorized through His Son, Jesus. "As I besought thee to abide still at Ephesus, when I went into Macedonia, that thou mightest charge some that they teach no other doctrine" (1 Timothy 1:3). The Holy Spirit condemns "any other thing that is contrary to sound doctrine" (1 Timothy 1: 8-11). "Sound doctrine" is the tool the Holy Spirit has given ministers to "exhort and to convince the gainsayers" (those who speak against or contradict, Titus 1:9). To be sound (hugiaino) is to be "free from any

"For the time will come when they will not endure sound doctrine; but after their own lusts shall they heap to themselves teachers, having itching ears;" (2 Timothy 4:3). That time came quickly, within the first century (2 Thessalonians 2:3-12), and it is no less true today. John wrote, "Beloved, believe not every spirit, but try the spirits whether they are of God: because many false prophets are gone out into the world" (1 John 4:1). How many times have you known a minister to skirt an issue or simply fail to uphold a truth because it was, or is, unpopular to do so? How many have profaned their calling by immoral conduct and poor example of righteousness? We are all aware of this, and yet we pass it off as "being human," which does not address the passages above. Are ministers today held accountable for fulfilling the above passages by the Holy Spirit?

Why are not ministers held accountable? First, it is possible many do not believe the passages. Second might be simple weakness, avoiding being the "bad guy." Third, many do not believe in the plenary, verbal (complete, word for word) inspiration of the Scriptures. It is evident that many agnostics fill pulpits and chair religious department of leading Universities and Seminaries. Fourth, the spirit of relativity has all but obscured the meaning of "sound doctrine" and God's definition of "good" is no longer accepted in the minds of many. Read 2 Timothy 2:15; 2 Thessalonians 2:11-12.

Know your local fireman

One of the main reasons the Iowa Park Firemen say they join the department is wanting to help people in the community. Patrick Moulton says that is the reason he joined the department in October 1999.

He is employed at the James V.
Allred as a correctional officer where
he works four days and off four days.

He spends most of his four days off close to Iowa Park so he will be available to answer calls. "If I have errands to run on my days off I get them taken care of and get back to Iowa Park," Moulton said. He says at times he has cut his running short or gotten just out of town and turned around to get back because a call come in. "Your plans can change real quick," says Moulton. Sometimes they might get in from a call just in time to go to work.

Moulton explained the firemen and EMT's carry a pager with them and when the police dispatcher receives a call for help the dispatcher tones and gives a brief description of the reason for the tone and location.


The fire chief or assistant chief is almost always on the scene when the firemen and EMTs get to the scene. They scope out the situation and when the firemen arrive the chief or assistant already has a plan as to how and what needs to be done.

Firemen respond to EMT calls to assist the EMTs. The firemen carry the equipment in for the EMTs so they can get right to the patient.

Moulton says often the firemen know what the EMT needs by watching what they are doing. It is team work. This allows the EMT to stay right with the patient.

Firemen or EMTs who don't make the truck (get to the station after the truck rolls) will stay at the station in case the other crew needs back up or additional supplies on the scene. They also stay until the medical truck or fire truck returns so they can help clean up and restock the truck and/or van.

Each call that comes in is different. It might be the same type call as the one before but each call has a



different scenario. Each call effects the firemen and EMTs differently. One thing that might effect the way firemen and react is the reaction of the patients family.

Often the firemen try to calm the families as the EMTs take care of the patient.

Moulton says if a fireman or EMT needs someone to talk with after a call they always have the chief and other veteran firemen. They are encouraged to talk and not hold it in.

Fires, accidents and illness doesn't take off on holidays and neither does the responders.

Often if they expect a lot of calls they will hang-out at the station. July 4th being one of their busier days for grass fires the firemen and their families have a cook-out and picnic at the southside fire station.

They are also at the station ev-

ery Tuesday evening for meeting training or what else might need to be

"We don't just come up here when there is a call," Moulton said.

Moulton says the members of the firedepartment and their families are just one big family.

When they answer a call they are all business but other times they have great fun togather. Moulton says he enjoys being part of the firemen family and they all get along. The fire station is like a second home Moulton stated.

Moulton said, "you get out of it what you put in it. If you put 100% you get 100%. If you just show up once in a while you want get much out of it." He added he gets a lot of satafaction out of what he does with the fire department.

mer at P.K. Lake. 1 egg, beaten 1/4 cup sugar

1 tsp. salt

3 Tbsps. oil

1 pkg. yeast, dissolved in 1/4 cup warm water

3/4 cup lukewarm milk 2 3/4 cup flour

1 stick melted butter

Mix in the order given. Set aside (covered), let rise 1 hour. Roll out on floured wax paper. Flour slightly on top and bottom. Cut out with round cutter and dip both sides in melted butter. Fold over and place in lightly buttered pan. Cover pan with a tea towel and let the rolls rise 1 hour. Bake in a 400 degree pre-heated oven for 12 minutes. Makes about 30 rolls.

Clay's Sorbet

1 cup water 1/4 cup sugar 1 pkg. frozen fruit

Using a blender, purce this mix-

Whip 2 egg whites to stiff peaks, fold into fruit mixture. Freeze.

When ready to eat briefly blend till creamy smooth. (This is great to use in the small ice cream freezers that fit into the frozen section of your

Nutmeg Sauce

1 egg yolk 1 cup milk

1/2 cup sugar

Mix ingredients well, using a wire whisk. Heat mixture in a double boiler and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Reduce heat, simmer 1 minute. Stir in 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg.

Serve over warm apple pie slices.

Gayla's Poppy Seed Cake

1 pkg. Duncan Hines Butter cake mix

1/2 cup sugar 3/4 cup cooking oil

8 oz. sour cream

1/4 cup poppy seeds 4 eggs

Prehat oven to 325 degrees. Grease and lightly sugar bundt pan (we're using sugar instead of flour)

Mix sugar, oil and sour cream. Add cake mix and 1 egg at a time. Mix well after each egg. Stir in poppy seeds. Pour mixture into bundt pan and bake 1 hour.

Kay Perkin's Fruit Pizza

1 pkg. slice and bake sugar cookies 1 - 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese

1/2 cup sugar

1 tsp. vanilla


1/2 cup preserves (your choice of


Fresh strawberries, bananas, kiwi fruit

Slice sugar cookies into 1/4 inch slices, cover pizza pan with the cookie dough. Bake according to package directions. Let cool.

Mix softened cream cheese, sugar and vanilla. Spread over the cookie crust. Arrange fruit on top of the cream cheese mixture beginning with one strawberry in the center. Circle strawberries with sliced bananas; circle bananas with kiwi and finally a circle of sliced strawberries. Make as many circles as necessary or create your own design. Mix preserves with 3 tablespoons of water and drizzle over the top of the pizza.

This is very rich but delicious! The preserve drizzle is optional.






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
