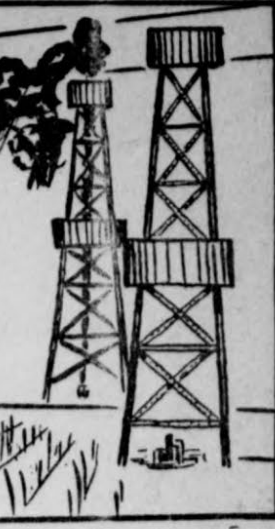

Report on X-ray Clinic Shows 31 Need Care For Various Causes

Miss Margaret Hall, executive secretary of the Wichita County Tuberculosis association, has received reports from the x-ray survey made. The x-ray pictures show 8 cases in Iowa Park on November 7. Of tuberculosis (6 in early stages and 2 in moderately advanced stages), 13 suspicious cases, 8 cardiac cases and 2 other kinds of diseases. Miss Hall urges everyone who received a notice of these effects to follow up and see his family physician at once, and everyone who has been in contact with these persons to go to his doctor for an examination and x-ray, or come to the Health Unit in Wichita Falls to receive a free x-ray.

The x-ray machine in the Health Unit was purchased and is maintained through the sales of Christmas Seals.

Miss Hall also urges all school teachers who did not receive their x-rays this year to come to the Health Unit and take advantage of the opportunity offered to have x-rays made.

Says Miss Hall: "Let's not forget to buy Christmas Seals and stick them on our letters and cards. It is a sign we are interested in our families and our community."

ing down the reindeer by the Eskimos. In the latter case a native will just start walking after the deer and consistently follow him until he becomes gentle.

Santa and the reindeer will be escorted by the high school band and the Volunteer Fire department.

Weiss Makes Team At Lon Morris JC

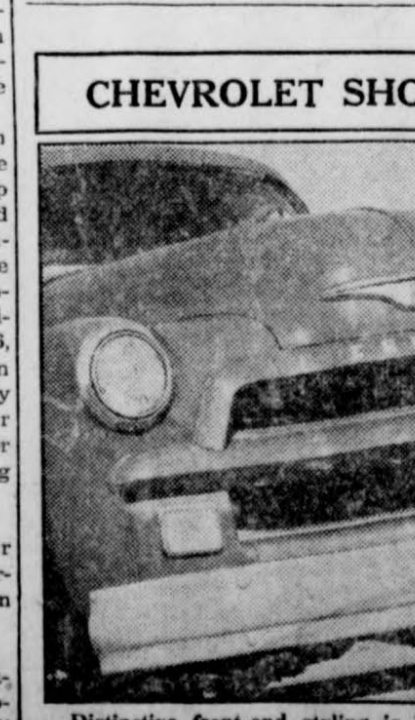

"Real Catholicity" was Mrs. L. Lovelace's part, "Here Locally" was given by Mrs. K. P. Abernathy.

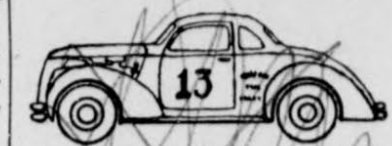

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Soil Conservation

Henry Wolf, farming 2 miles north of Iowa Park, has completed construction of three-tenths mile of channel type field terraces. Mr. Wolf plans to construct more terraces when waterway is better covered with grass. King ranch blue-stem and buffalo grass are being used in the waterway.

The Roller estate of Bacon Switch has successfully seeded to waterways with the bluestem.

Albert Erockriede, farming the Emma Shultz farm east of Punkin Center, will construct a waterway for runoff water from terrace system. By shaping the waterway at this time, small grain can be seeded on the area in the spring.

Jack Martin, south of Iowa Park, continues leveling of land for improved irrigation. Joe Price manages the farm and has done a good job of establishing proper grade on 8 acres of land previously leveled and has a fine stand of irrigated pasture grass. Mixture is Kentucky 31 fescue grass, perennial rye grass and alfalfa. Thirteen pounds of fescue, 8 pounds of rye grass and 3 pounds of alfalfa were seeded per acre. About 16 pounds of nitrogen and 48 pounds of phosphate per acre were used.

Gerald Klunkerman, 5 miles north-east of Iowa Park, has a nice crop of Austrian winter peas on 60 acres of cultivated land.
