The Lions club had more than a luncheon meeting this week at the Methodist church. Sam Hill conducted a short business session that accomplished many things.
First was announcement of the American Security Loan drive which is to run from April 15 through June 30. This drive has the wholehearted support of Lions International and in support of it, President Hill selected W. A. George, L. C. Minich and Ira Campsey to see that the cause does not languish in Iowa Park.

A group of clean-up workers will hit the spots missed in the whirlwind campaign, so every citizen of Iowa Park will be given an opportunity to assist.
Taylor George, program chairman for the day, then introduced Frank Crippliver, Lions club member from Wichita Falls, a former district governor of the organization, who made a talk of great interest to his fellow Lions.
Mr. Crippliver was generous in his praise for the way Iowa Park people in general and the Lions club in particular get things done. He threw some double bitted jolts into the stream of thought of his listeners and ended with a plea that we not fear a depression. Rather that we must expect one and prepare for it now so that it will not harm us as much as it might if we are not ready for it.

Contest Started to Make Iowa Park "The City Beautiful"

In an effort to make Iowa Park residents realize the value of having a neater appearance, the Chamber of Commerce has formulated a plan to induce people to make their property more presentable.
The plan grew out of a meeting of the Beautification Committee of the chamber which was held Tuesday morning. Attending the meeting were Mrs. Gordon G. Clark, chairman of the committee; Mrs. O. O. Hendricks, Mr. Homer Blalock and Mrs. Jack Austin, members; J. C. Horn, president; Mrs. M. C. Yeagan, secretary; Curtis Sewell, mayor of Iowa Park; and Jack Austin, manager of the Texas-Oklahoma Fair association.
A contest will start on Friday, April 23, at which time a handbill will be placed in each home by Camp Fire girls and Cubs telling of the contest and explaining that the points of judging will be neatness and cleanliness only.
The town has been divided into four sections for the purposes of this program and chairmen have been named to build interest in the purposes of the contest.
For the southwest portion of Iowa Park, Mrs. Jack Austin is chairman; for the southeast, Mr. Homer Blalock; northeast, Mrs. O. O. Hendricks; and northwest, Mrs. Gordon Clark.
Each chairman plans to appoint block captains in his section of town and make an earnest effort to win the award.
Mayor Sewell has made arrangements to furnish a city truck for Thursday, April 23, which will pick up cans if they are boxed or sacked and on the city was not obligated to haul off trash, but because he and the city council are interested in having a clean town, they will make this service available.
M. L. Hines, county commissioner, will have signs made and installed pointing the way to the official dumping grounds, which are located about two miles south of town.
The contest will last through October and it is planned to have it become an annual competition.
Judges will be selected from the four sections of town. They will make an inspection at the beginning of the contest, keep watch over their section during the contest period, make a final inspection, and decide the winning section of the town the last of October.

MATERNITY CLINIC OBTAINED HERE

Through the persistent efforts of Mrs. L. E. Brooks and Mrs. D. O. James and with the assistance of the Wichita County Health Unit, Iowa Park is now scheduled to have a weekly maternity clinic and a monthly well child conference.
Under the plan as outlined by Mrs. Esther Campbell, public health nurse working out of the Wichita County Health Unit, maternity clinics will be held each Tuesday at 12 noon in the First Christian church with a well child conference on the first Tuesday of each month at noon.
To inaugurate this new service Tuesday, April 13, Mrs. Campbell had assisting her Dr. Paul Collins of Wichita Falls as consulting physician to make the examinations and offer medical advice to expectant mothers; another public health nurse from the Wichita Falls unit; and two student nurses.
Four patients came for the first clinic and Mrs. Campbell is gratified with the good start made, but she hopes the clinic and conferences will reach more people.
Eligibility to use the services of the Health Unit has been determined by agreement with the Wichita County Medical Association and interested persons are invited to seek information from Mrs. Brooks, Mrs. James or at the weekly sessions of the clinic.

In giving to the cancer fund, a person also becomes a member of the Texas Division of the American Cancer Society. This society has put out a little folder describing seven of the danger signals which should be watched for incipient cancer.
1. Any sore that does not heal, particularly about the tongue, lips or mouth.
2. A painless lump or thickening, especially in the breast, lip or the tongue.
3. Progressive change in the color or size of a wart, mole or birthmark.
4. Persistent indigestion.
5. Persistent hoarseness, unexplained cough, or difficulty in swallowing.
6. Bloody discharge from the nipple or irregular bleeding from any of the natural body openings.
7. Any change in the normal bowel habits.
It is pointed out that every three minutes someone dies of cancer and that only by watching for cancer and securing treatment at its early stages can this killer be controlled.

SUMMER PROGRAM PLANNING BEGUN BY CHURCH WOMEN

Progress is being made from time to time on plans of the Council of Church Women to resume operation of their summer program of recreation for youth of Iowa Park. Mrs. Homer Blalock, president of the organization, and Mrs. Taylor George, committee chairman for the project, are making plans to secure a qualified director who can supervise the recreation program and form classes in handicraft, dramatics, choral singing and some selected athletic activities.
The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce at its meeting last week voted to assist with the expense of such a program and placed responsibility for its co-operation on its civic committee. There was considerable discussion at the chamber of commerce meeting as to the advisability of attempting to have softball as well as baseball. The cost of lighting a field for night games was considered prohibitive, but there is every possibility that twilight games can be arranged for.

3 IOWA PARK MEN ADDRESS BUREAU IN WICHITA FALLS

Four headline speakers were presented at the meeting of the Wichita County Farm Bureau directors and officials in the courthouse at Wichita Falls, Tuesday evening when Wymore Downing, vice-president and precinct chairman, was in charge of the session.
L. E. Brooks, superintendent of the Agriculture Experiment Station at Iowa Park, gave a discourse on what visitors would see at the field day on April 16. He stated that the results of using phosphate, of grazing tests, of varieties of crops which resist winter freezing, of alfalfa rotation as a fertilizer, and clover as a soil builder will be shown by demonstration.
Using as a theme, "The rise and fall of a civilization is based on its soil," Fred Parkey, soil conservationist of Iowa Park, described the kinds of erosion and outlined the development of the soil conservation program. He exhibited maps and charts which depicted the work of the movement and showed how the records and plans were kept over a five year period for each farm. Parkey stated that during 1947, 147 miles of terrace lines were run and built in Wichita county, with 200 miles in prospect for 1948.





A portion of his statement is as follows: "We disapprove of the proposed breakdown of Clear Channel Broadcasting and join with our fellow Bureau farm members in other states in opposing this trend that would curtail broadcasting service for farmers and small town listeners."

"The farm and ranch people of Texas depend upon the clear channel broadcasting stations for uninterrupted radio receptions which are of a most valuable nature to the agricultural industry. I traveled the State of Texas extensively last year and at every opportunity I asked the farmer where was the most dependable reception for news, market, weather and entertainment on his radio dial. The great percentage of rural people immediately would answer one of our three clear channel radio broadcasting stations, namely, WBAP, Ft. Worth; WFAA, Dallas; and WOAI, San Antonio.

"Our Texas clear channel stations particularly have farm programs and news broadcasts at the customary meal hours for farm and ranch people. Many farmers prefer radio news in preference to a daily paper because this service can be obtained at the meal hour.

"Markets. Market quotations are of vital importance to our farmers and ranchers. Many farmers and ranchers will not market their products until they have received accurate market reports. Much of the marketing is done by telephone upon receiving market quotations by radio.

"Weather. Weather reports and predictions have taken a very vital place in the operation of the agricultural industry in Texas. Ranchmen depend upon weather predictions in preparing shipments of livestock for market and also as a warning against freezing weather. Farmers depend on the weather reports for planting, harvesting and marketing.

"Entertainment. Farm people are entitled to their share of radio entertainment, the same as city people. Entertainment by radio is very important to many rural farmers who are located great distances from any entertainment centers.

"The members of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation find that clear channel broadcasting is the most desirable and dependable means of receiving uninterrupted radio programs. We are firmly opposed to a reduction in the number of clear channel stations and insist that power be increased to allow com-

plete coverage to all areas and territories of respective stations. "Texas Farm Bureau Federation earnestly requests that Senate Bill 2231 be killed in committee."

Mr. Barbour is hopeful of success in the Farm Bureau's fight to give listeners in rural areas a chance to have good radio reception. This fight has been going on since 1943 and Senate Bill 2231 is a new attempt of Senator Edwin Johnson of Colorado to crowd the clear channels with more stations and limit the power of those now on clear channel status.


