Farm Bureau office in Iowa Park this week in an intensified drive for enrolment in the newly instituted Blue Cross medical-surgical service.

For more than two years members of the Wichita County Farm Bureau have had the privilege of taking out Blue Cross hospitalization service.

but now for the first time the members may also secure the Medical-Surgical service. During the past 10 days workers have been busy in all precincts offering these two Blue Cross services in order that the membership might get in on this enrollment period.

There is no commercial aspect to this program. The plan itself is a non-profit plan, sponsored and guaranteed by the hospitals. In the case of the Wichita County Farm Bureau, it is a farmers' program for

farmers, sponsored for the sake of individual security and good health. The Board of Directors serve without remuneration and the enrollment representatives serve without

In the various communities of the county, meetings have been held at night in order that more farmers may get information concerning the

new accommodation. In case anyone who is interested was unable to attend, that person may secure an enrollment card from the Farm Bu-

reau office in Iowa Park, or from C. A. Morgan in Burkburnett, Ed. Foster in Electra, Wymore Downing in Wichita Falls, or T. J. Pace or Loys Barbour in Iowa Parrk.





Statistics show that nine-tenth of all measles deaths occur in children under five years of age.
