

The poll tax is divided into three funds. Of the total \$1.75 you pay, \$1 goes to state schools, 50 cents to the state, and 25 cents to the jury fund.

Mrs. Brigham can take the information here at her office for an exemption certificate and will send in in and the exemption will be mailed.
