On Monday, October 6, we are going to do something about getting rid of rats all over the county and we need your co-operation.

The Wichita County Farm Bureau is directing this drive with the co-operation of all Chambers of Commerce, 4-H Clubs, Veterans Ag Classes, FFA Boys, Demonstration Clubs and County Agents.

The Warfarin-treated Rat and Mouse Bait will be made available during the campaign at a non-profit price of 25 cents per pound. This poison comes to us through the facilities of the Rodent Control Service of the Texas A & M College System and its preparation is supervised by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. This is an excellent opportunity to get good results in controlling rais because the bait has been specially blended for use in this part of the country. Furthermore, best results are obtained when everyone puts out bait at the same time.

For your convenience the ready-to-use bait will be available at several points over the county.
