First Year School Children Should Have Health Check-ups

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer, urges parents of children who will respond to the school bell for the first time in September to be sure the child is physically ready for school duties.

"First and foremost is the need for vaccination against smallpox. Parents should see that children are vaccinated before they are one year of age; if not done previously, at school age vaccination becomes absolutely necessary," Dr. Cox said. "If your child has not been vaccinated, have it done immediately for his own protection and that of others."

Immunization against diphtheria is also highly important, Dr. Cox declares. This disease which causes serious illness and deaths among young children can be prevented with toxoid. The child who has never been protected should be given this safeguard against a dreaded, killing disease. Even though he may have been immunized as a baby, doctors and health officers usually recommend an additional dose of toxoid to strengthen immunity before entrance into school.

"In addition, before you send the child to school you are urged to take him to your family physician and dentist for a thorough examination," Dr. Cox says. "You will want to know that he is in good physical condition and can compete with the other children on equal terms. If the check-up reveals any weakness or defects they should be corrected at once. Don't let your child start his school life with an avoidable handicap."

Farmers Union speaks

The Department of Agriculture has extended the COC loan program for financing construction of new farm storage facilities for another year. The program was started in 1949, following the storage crisis of 1948 when the 80th Congress barred COC from acquiring storage space and farmers were forced to dump their bumper crops on the market at less than support prices because many could not store them under price support loans.

Total storage capacity of over 122 million bushels has been provided by farmers under the program since 1949. Loans will be available up to 80 per cent of the cost of structure, payable in four annual installments or earlier, with interest at 4 per cent, from local lending agencies or PMA county committees.

The drought is beginning to be felt here in our county, but as most of our cotton farmers are in the irrigated districts and the wheat farmers are not suffering at present, the cattlemen and dairymen are feeling the pinch more than in recent years. This shortage of water, grass dying and the price of feeds is a major problem with them at present.

The drop in cattle prices, rising feed costs and sharp rises in operation expenses make it pretty tough bedding for the farmer-stockman right now.

Our neighbors in the southern states have been designated as disaster areas. The drought in Arkansas was recognized after NFU Pres. Jim Patton in a letter to President Truman called attention to the long-run damage being done to foundation livestock herds when farmers were forced to sell valuable stock because of the feed shortage.

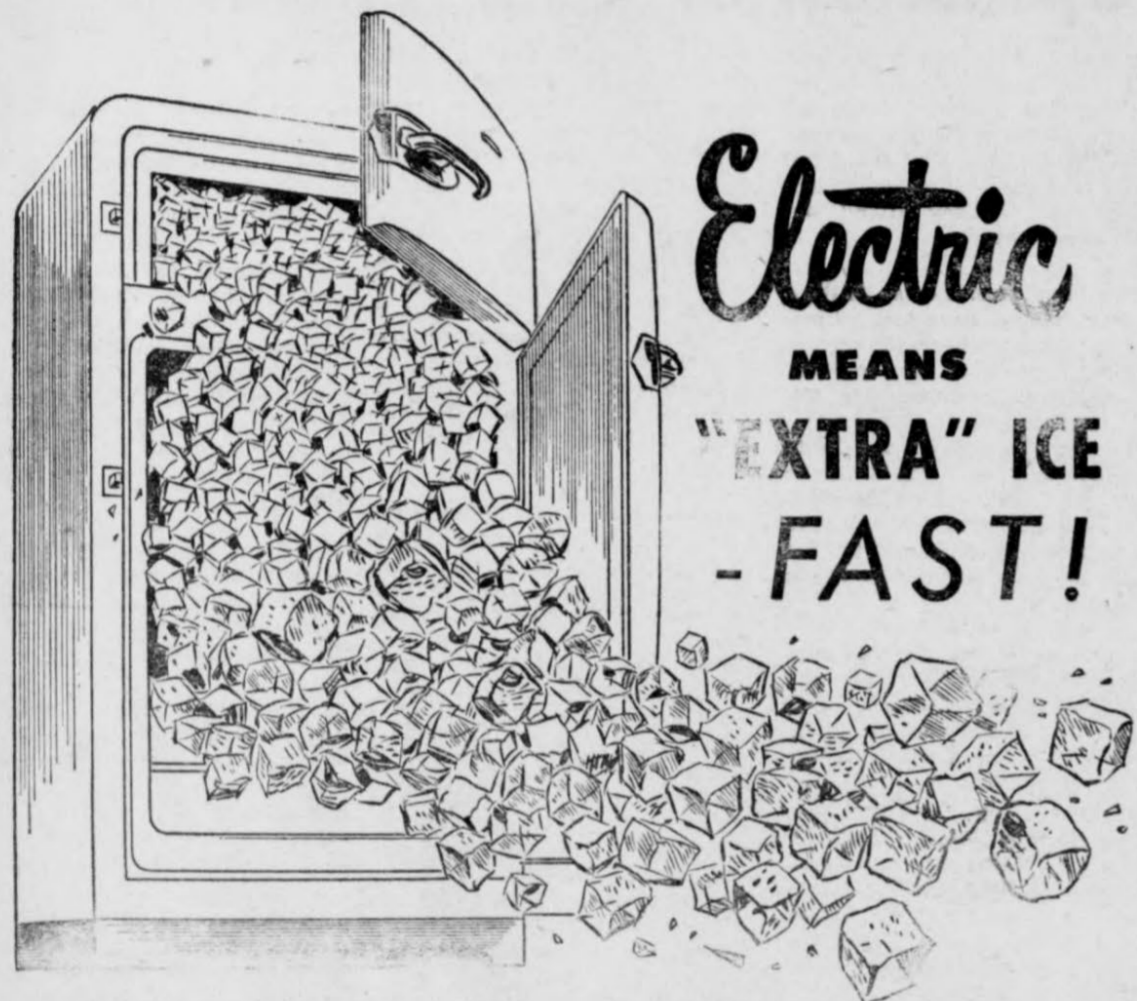
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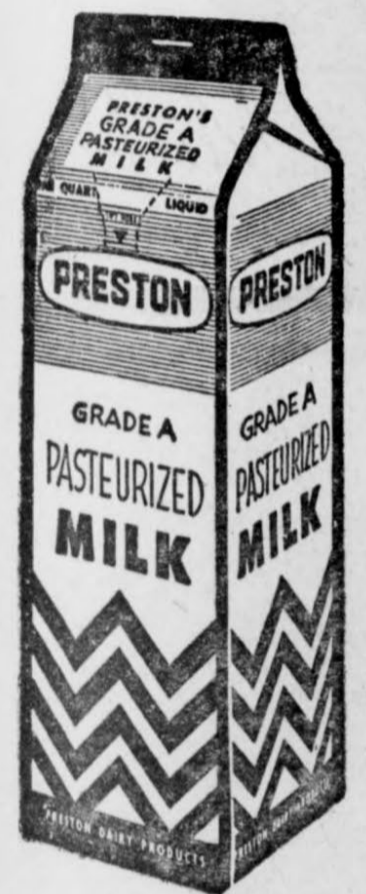
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Baxter Family Meets For Reunion Supper

Glacier National Park is known to have more mountain trails than any other park. The highest peak scaled by Ernest and Bobbie was Mt. Seyih, altitude 10,007 feet.

They found it most interesting to spot Rocky Mountain goats and watch them in their capers. One goat got so interested in Ernest and Bobbie that it skidded down the snowslope about four feet from them.

Social Security Checks Increase

Nearly every family in Wichita county area now getting old age and survivors insurance from the federal social security administration will receive more money beginning with the September payments due about October 3. If the increase does not show on a check when it arrives and an increase is due, a later check will make up the difference. It is not necessary for people already receiving benefits to apply for the increased payments. Erton F. Tate, manager of the Wichita Falls social security office, stated this week.

Recent amendments to the law will mean monthly monthly payment increases ranging from \$5 to \$8.50 for practically all retired insured workers in this area. The average increase for retired workers will be about \$6. In general, benefit payments to wives, widows children or parents will be increased proportionately. Increases for dependents and survivors would be less than those for retired workers. In most cases, these increases will be about \$2 to \$5.

If you have any questions in connection with the 1952 amendments to the social security act, you are urged to visit or write the Wichita Falls office in Room 425 of the Post Office building.

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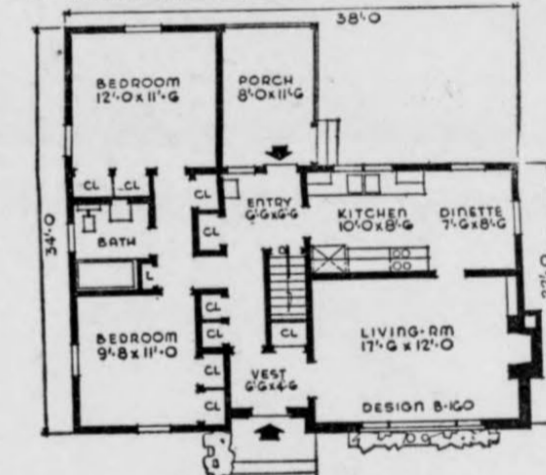
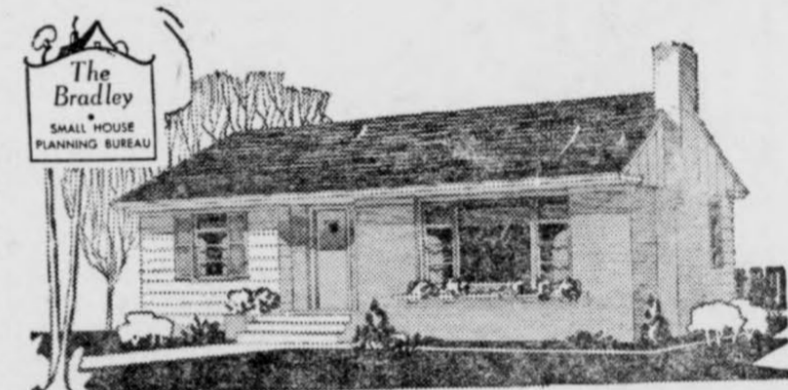
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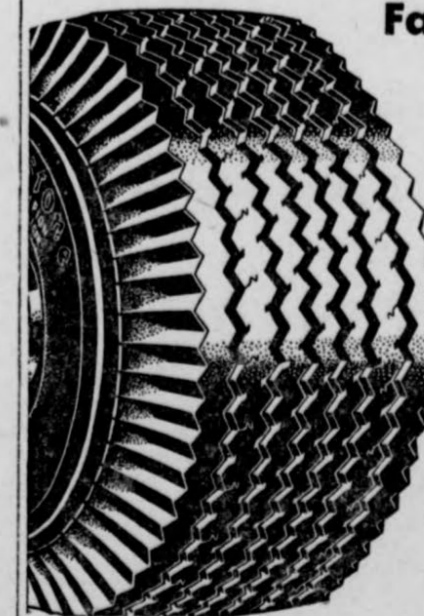
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
