Our heart bleeds for the Republican party! Its members deserve our greatest sympathy.





Cut each pear in half and finish it up before cutting another pear. Drop the prepared fruit into weak salt water (2 tablespoons salt to 1 gallon water) until there is enough to fill 8 or 4 jars. Then take pears out of the salt water, rinse and drop into boiling hot sirup (1 cup sugar to 2 or 8 cups water). Cook until pears are boiling hot throughout. This takes 5 or 10 minutes.
