Explained by Mayor In calling attention of the citizens of Iowa Park to the new traffic regulations, Curtis Sewell this week stressed especially the need for better and more thoughtful use of the business block on Cash Street In times past the congestion of double parking on both sides of the street has made for a real traffic hazard. The city council, in enacting Ordinance No. 130 felt compelled to eliminate the hazard. Hereafter car drivers must leave someone in the machine when they get out to transact a purchase, and even then the limit of five minutes double parking will be enforced. On no

New Rural Truck Sought By Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Dept.

Plans were made at a meeting of Iowa Park Volunteer Firemen last Monday night to finance the purchase of an additional fire truck. The one now in use is good and does a fine job, say the firemen but is so large and heavily loaded that it cannot get to distant r

ires as soon as it should With a smaller truck, loaded with 525 gallons of water, equipped with a small pump and a short hose, the firemen can reach a rural blaze

in short order and possibly have a fire under control when the larger ruck reaches the scene. The present truck carries water and long hose to be used in taking water from stock tanks, irrigation ditches pressure pump, and is therefore too heavy and unwieldy for many of the fast drives to country homes, barns and pastures





held in the W. F. George High School building of Iowa Park is as important an event to the entire community as anything scheduled for the entire year, is the opinion of the school board and of others who have the interests of our youth at heart. calling for issuance of \$65,000 in bonds for additions to the school property. Two first grade rooms are needed, a band room and vocational storage garage for the school buses

The Gilmer-Aikin minimum stan dards program is responsible for the good as accomplished, but there will third item on the school election. 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
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AMERICA AT PLAY

VACATION! They've picked time and place, and they've planned and saved for months. Now they're off!
