COAL IN CALLAHAN COUNTY.

MR. EDITOR: In furtherance of your views for promoting the fuel question of this county, will state that nothing in this line is ever accomplished except by constant agitation and investigation and I think you deserve great credit for the interest you have taken in the matter.

I have before me the Second Annual Report of the Geological Survey of the State of Texas, E. T. Dumble State Geologist, which is quite voluminous, and the letter of transmittal from Comm'r. Foster to Gov. Hogg is by no means the least interesting feature in it. So important do I consider it that I ask you to publish it in full, which is as follows:

Office of Comm'r of Agriculture, Insurance Statistics & History. Austin, Texas, May 1st 1891.

Hon. J. S. Hogg, Governor of Texas.
Dear Sir: I have the honor to transmit herewith the Second Annual Report of the Geological and Mineralogical Survey of Texas. The work of that branch of this Department has been in charge of Prof. E. T. Dumble from its organization up to the present time, and whatever of success has attended the inauguration and first two years' work of the survey is largely due to his skill as an organizer and ability as a geologist. Considering the limited means placed at the command of the Department for use in that branch of office, the character and extent of the work accomplished will in my

judgment, compare favorably with that done by other states. These reports have resulted in acquainting our own people with the mineral resources and wealth of the State, and attracting the attention of capitalists and investors, both at home and abroad, thereto. Indeed this is only a modest claim for the practical benefits to the people of the State, resulting from the work of the survey. Twice the Survey has demonstrated its right to live and its effect on the material development of the State is becoming better understood, it is to be hoped that more liberal appropriations will be made for the prosecution of the work, I have the honor to remain with great respect, your most obedient servant.

After giving a list of various expenditures shows a balance left of \$8340.68. This letter of transmittal and this financial statement accompanying this voluminous report shows what was done during the first two years of the existence of this branch of the States' Geological Department and as far as I know it shows also for the last two years of its existence. No more work could have possibly

been done in the same length of time than shown by this report, and as Comm'r. Foster stated certainly "demonstrated its right to live," yet succeeding administrations have permitted it to die. To the glory of these two men, Gov. Hogg and

Comm'r. Foster, who have since gone to their reward, let it be said that if they had done nothing else for the good of their State than this one act that it is enough to immortalize them in the memory of their countrymen. Every state in the American Union is mentioned in the various works on Geology and Mineralogy as producing coals, oils, precious stones and minerals of all kinds, save Texas alone, and why? Because they all have State Department of Geology and Texas has none.

Mr. Editor this seem to be a digression from the question of Callahan County's fuel supply but it is along the line of agitation and investigation that must be stirred up if any thing is done, it is a State enterprise, and no private party is able to carry it out. Private capital will develop what the State finds out. A hint from the Geologist and the vast oil district of Beaumont was developed, another and Brewster county rivals the Almedan mines of Spain, which had been furnishing mercury for the world since 700 B. C. Still another and Thurber, Bridgeport and various other places commenced furnishing the coal for commerce of Texas. So let us Mr. Editor, that the ripple you started will gain strength

AN UNKNOWN HERO.

We read in dusty tombs of the heroism displayed upon the battle field, when, amid the stirring music of the life and drum, the bugle's blast and the crash of muskets and cannon's roar, "men become iron, with nerves of steel;" we hear in story and in song of the "days of old when knights were bold," and their dauntless deeds of chivalry find admiration and applause within our hearts. But we look upon all such heroism and acts of valor as belonging solely to the past. The days of chivalry are over, we say, this is a commercial age and selfishness rules upon an undisputed throne. But often in these prosaic days, some great disaster occurs, and against the dark background of human wretchedness and woe, there shines with undimmed splendor, the steady light of magnificent acts of self-sacrifice and courage that take their place beside the most chivalric deeds of the Middle Ages. Such a scene was presented at a great fire which occurred in Texas City the other day, when the Chamber of Commerce building was destroyed. During the height of the fire a railroad man standing near the burning building heard a man in the second story window giving the signal of distress of the Brotherhood of Railway Firemen, of which he was a member. Finding a rope he threw to his brother fireman, who instead saving himself, passed it to a man in the window above him. A woman saved herself with the rope, but the man was killed. His name is not known, but on pages of history or in any lore can you find a grander chivalry and self-sacrifice than there can be no more horrible a than that in the consuming of the flames, and there is no anger and deeper instinct implanted in the human heart, than that of self-preservation, yet this railroad man, whose very name is unknown, with death in its most awful form surrounding him, with the means of safety placed suddenly within his grasp, at once places it in the hands of a woman in the window above and calmly sees his fate. Unknown his name, the dispatches state, but who can doubt that from the fiery ordeal through which he passed, his imperial spirit takes its place high on the list among all the dauntless heroes in Valhalla's walls, to be known throughout eternity.—The Democrat-Gazette, McKinney.

TEXANS PERSISTENT.

Are Keeping After the Rivers and Harbors Committee of House.
 Washington, Dec. 10.—Sabine Pass, Port Arthur, Beaumont and Orange are hanging unitedly on the trail of the rivers and harbors committee to get \$550,000 for a series of projects that will be the making of that section. One-quarter of a million dollars is asked for deepening and widening the Sabine Jetty channel, \$80,000 for digging an outlet and turning basin in front of Port Arthur and extending the barge canal half a mile, and the other is wanted for deepening Sabine Lake canal from nine to eighteen feet. The delegation, which is working in harmony for the projects, consists of A. L. Ford of the Orange Progressive League, George N. Craig of the Port Arthur Chamber of Commerce, W. S. Davidson of Beaumont and R. P. Clarke of the Bowers Dredging company of Galveston.
 Congressman Randell introduced a bill specifically prohibiting United States senators and members of congress from serving as officers, agents or attorneys for any trust or public service corporation under penalty of fine, imprisonment and forfeiture of office.
 Congressman Gillespie, as well as Congressman Smith, is at work on laws giving the interstate commerce commission power to compel railroads to furnish sufficient cars to handle freight. This is in answer to the appeal of Texas cattlemen to the commission demanding the roads be made to furnish them cars to move cattle to market. The commission is helpless in the matter.

BELL'S REPORT SPICY.

Deals at Length With What He Terms Species of Graft.
 Austin, Dec. 10.—State Revenue Agent Bell deals at length in his biennial report, which has been made public, on a species of graft, which he claims exists as to fees of district and county officials. He declares that in some instances dead men and fake property are placed on the rolls so that tax assessors may get additional fees. He calls attention to many evidences of local option law, and, according to the report, saloons in many counties are escaping taxation. The report is quite spicy.
 Secretary of State Shannon announced that receipts of his department for November were \$8,042.
 Attorney General Davidson left Monday for Georgetown to visit his aunt, Mrs. Benton Strange, who is critically ill there. Before leaving he said that he would have nothing further to say regarding Senator Bailey's last statement. The incident is closed as far as he is concerned, he said.
 Dallas Art Glass company of Dallas: capital stock \$30,000, has been chartered.
 H. C. White and H. P. Schoch, a committee from the Switchmen's union at Galveston, had a conference Monday with the railroad commission regarding the strike situation. The committee laid the grievance of the union before the commission.

Canning Plant For Tulsa.

Tulsa, I. T., Dec. 8.—A \$25,000 canning plant, to employ 115 people, will be built here.

Killed by Train.

Sapulpa, I. T., Dec. 6.—Frank C. Yates, a brakeman, was killed here by a train.

J. E. Loyd of Italy, Tex., shipped two carloads of turkeys, nearly 500 to the east, to northern markets.

Seymour Taylor and Clara White had their brains beaten out at Garyville, La., while they slept.

While blasting for a well at Alpine, Tex., the skull of J. L. Bailey was fractured and he soon expired.

It is reported the Kansas City Southern railway will erect at Texarkana a three-story \$50,000 office building.

George Collins, a negro, was called to his door at Georgetown, Tex., and shot. An aged darkey was badly beaten.

It is definitely decided that the union station at Oklahoma City will cost \$300,000, and work will soon begin.

By the accidental discharge of his shotgun the top of the head of Whitt Drennan of Mabank, Tex., was blown off.

During November fifty-eight babies were born in Red River county, Texas, and forty-three marriage licenses issued.

The Comanche Mercantile company of Comanche, Tex., has increased its capital stock from \$50,000 to \$60,000.

Katy employes have filed at Bastrop, Tex., fifteen suits against the road, alleging they had to work sixteen hours per day.

Peter Merriman was killed near Kingston, I. T., by Britt Hardwick, his stepson. The latter claims self-defense.

In the Oklahoma hotel at Dustin, I. T., Tim Corr was probably fatally shot. George Posey, the proprietor, gave bond.

Rachael Lamphie, a negro, was killed on a trestle at Dallas while crossing, by a train. The little daughter of Judge H. W. Finley and Fred P. Shiny, accompanying her, narrowly escaped.

President Roosevelt has Congress on his hands, also former ambassador to Austria, Hon. Bellamy Storer. The latter seems to be annoying him more than Congress.

The war against Senator Bailey has broken out afresh. Attorney General Davidson, The Galveston-Dallas News and San Antonio Express are the latest accessions to the ranks of the opposition.
