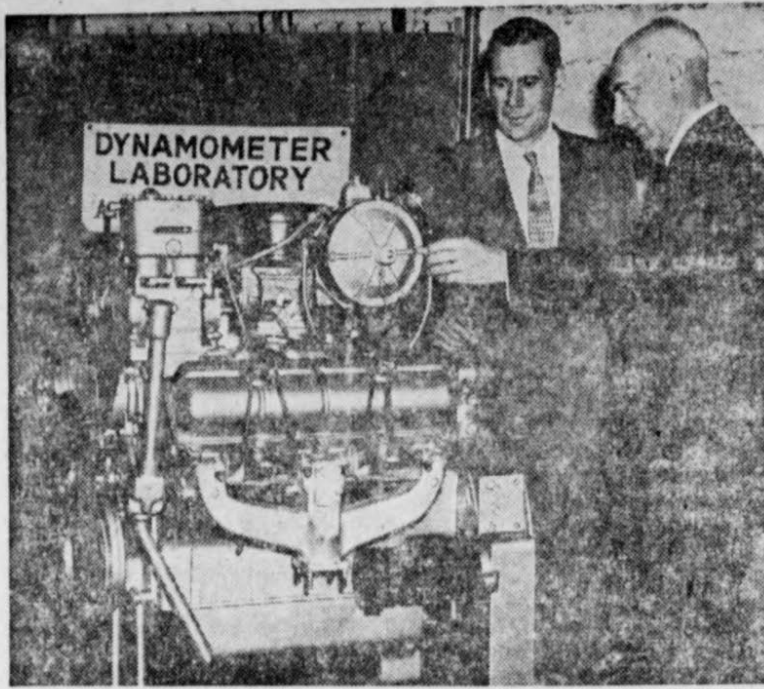

### New Powerful L.P. Gas Engine

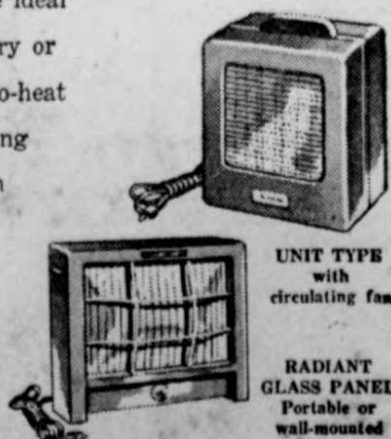

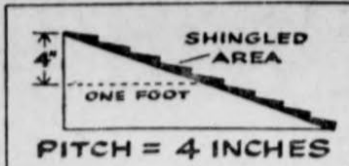

### Asphalt Shingles Can Give Color To Low-Slope Roof

A key task of the roofing contractor is selecting the appropriate material and application method for the type of roof to be covered. In recent years, one of the most important considerations has been



the roof pitch. Many of the low-pitch or low-slope roofs that are so popular nowadays require special shingle application.

What is pitch? Look at the roof from a side view and think of a shingled slope as the hypotenuse of a right triangle. The pitch is the height of the triangle in inches per horizontal foot.

Roofing experts say that any type of asphalt shingle can be used on a roof with a pitch of 4 or more inches. Below 4 inches, but not less than 2 inches, square-but asphalt strip shingles may be used, but with special application.

An important advantage in using asphalt shingles is that color is made available to the low-slope roof. The shingles come in a wide variety of colors, light to dark. This is the shingle application procedure for a roof pitch between 2 and 4 inches:

1. Under the shingles lay two layers of "15-pound" felt.
2. Cement two layers of felt together from the eaves to a point 24 inches inside the inside wall line of the building.
3. All shingle tabs should be cemented down with a spot of quick-setting asphalt cement.

### Notice to Long Distance Telephone Users

The following changes in the charges for long distance calls within the State of Texas will be made effective December 27, 1955:

- Rates for night and Sunday calls between points more than 82 miles apart will be increased 5¢ in some cases, 10¢ in other cases.
- Rates for person-to-person calls between points less than 23 miles apart will be increased 5¢.

Eighty per cent of the long distance calls in Texas are not affected by this rate adjustment. There will be no changes in any of the day station-to-station rates. Likewise, there will be no changes in the night and Sunday station rates on calls over 83 miles. There will be no changes on day person-to-person rates on calls over 22 miles.

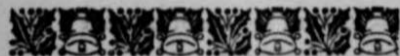
