Born in Grand Prairie, Harry was raised chiefly on a farm near Arlington, where his parents still live. He came to Wichita Falls as assistant manager of the State theater in 1939. That year he married Willie Etta Alexander of Burkburnett.

The couple have three sons: Joe Pat 3, David 11 and Frank 13, and live in Wichita Falls at 2121 Garfield, where they have resided since 1947. They are members of Highland Heights Christian church.

Educated in public schools of Arlington, Joiner attended the University of Texas four years.

Principal problems facing Texans, according to Harry, are water, lobbyists, and more pay for teachers and other improved conditions for the public school system. He is opposed to sales taxes and will fight to keep further such taxes from being imposed on the people of Texas.

Joiner has pledged, if elected, to return to Wichita county periodically during the sessions—while the legislature is in recess—to be available for consultation with the people of the county, so they can express their desires on legislation before the legislature without such a great expense as is met with in going to Austin.

For several years Harry Joiner was an agent in Iowa Park for the American National Insurance company, and has many friends here.

Electrans Petition Against By-Pass

Citizens Highway Committee for U.S. Highway 287 Present Route, recently organized at Electra, has done more than object to the proposed new expressway which is planned to bypass that city.

Members have circulated a petition, secured about 306 signatures of Precinct 4 taxpayers, and filed them with the Wichita county commissioners court.

Addressed to members of the commissioners court individually and collectively, the petition reads: "We the taxpayers and citizens of Electra Precinct 4, Wichita county, do respectfully submit to you the petition attached objecting to the proposed route of the Electra bypass on U.S. Highway 287 in Precinct 4.

"We propose that you re-evaluate and consider the following facts. We voted the bonds in our precinct for the development of the precinct route on Highway 287. We were informed at a meeting by L. B. Dean, district engineer of Texas Highway Department, that 287 right of way was sufficient in width. Maps were circulated by mail showing the route on U.S. 287 route, newspaper publicity, letters and at meetings we were told by those in authority that the route would be the present route paralleling FWDC railroad.

We Object to the Diversion of Our Tax Money of Precinct 4 Being Used to Build a Bypass Around Electra.

1. The present route follows a straight line between the borders of Precinct 4.
2. The right of way cost of the proposed route would be excessive, and the route would have curves, overpasses, underpasses, cloverleafs, and would increase the distance of travel, and does not conform to good practice of engineering and safety.
3. The cost of 17 homes, cutting circular and diagonal through farms, oil leases and ranches, would cause relocation of oil, gas, City water, sewer lines, and vacuum lines for two gasoline plants, and paying for lease equipment on both sides of the bypass.
4. The proposed route will create a serious problem in the secondary recovery of oil by water flooding, and if we have to pay damages to the operator for underground reserve it will be expensive.
5. We propose to you that passage of the \$33 Billion Interstate Expressway program has changed the situation. We ask you to investigate the Houston-Dallas-Amarillo-Denver expressway that is now being planned. We feel like the Federal Bureau of Roads will not duplicate and appropriate money to a proposed route of bypasses, and other features that do not conform to limited access of Federal Interstate system. They will pay 90 per cent of the right of way and construction cost; the state, 10 per cent.
6. We propose that our money be spent on lateral roads and the present route of Highway 287 for its improvement, and that a bridge be built across Red river located at a point where Texas Highway 25 is paved to the river, and a bridge be built between Burk Burnett and Grandfield, Okla., at the old bride Town Site on the river. We ask you to get the Highway







New on Top—Old Below



The theory that some good practically always can be salvaged from an old house has been proved anew by a Chestnut, Ill., family who demolished all of their big, old home above the first-story flooring and then modernized by building an up-to-date house on top of what was left.

They saved money in the bargain. They say their home cost thousands of dollars less than if they had built a brand-new house on a different site.

Michael Drake, the owner, and his wife and children arranged temporary quarters in the basement and were able to live there comfortably while their new house was being erected over their heads.

Thoughtful scheduling made this possible. They picked August, a dry month, as the time to start work. Then demolition and framing in of the new dwelling were rushed. Sixteen days after the first board was ripped from the old three-story house, the new home was up and roofed, protecting the Drakes from the weather.

Always annoyed by the insufficient closet space and the inconvenient layout of the old house, the Drakes finally decided to rebuild when their mounting bills reached \$600 a year.

Total living area is about 20 percent less than in the old house, but there's three times as much closet space. Ponderosa pine cabinets were installed in the kitchen, where a particular emphasis was placed on storage.

The new house look tetter and more imposing than many one-story homes because of a striking hip roof with deep overhangs. Covered with bright-color asphalt shingles, the roof draws attention upward, giving the illusion of additional height.

Windows are plentiful. A big ponderosa pine picture window brings the countryside into the living room. Other windows in the house are smooth-operating, pine double-hung sash with horizontal panes. All window trim is painted white.

The Drakes, mindful of their heavy fuel bills of the past, insisted on thick mineral wool insulation. The insulation not only keeps heat inside during the winter months, but will cut operating costs of air-conditioning, which the owners plan to install. Forced warm air was installed as the new heating system.

The drive will begin July 27 with a kick-off supper for church members, to be held at Faith Baptist church at 7:30.
