Fire Prevention Week to Be Observed Here

Oct. 7-13 Iowa Park will join other towns and cities in observing Fire Prevention Week.
A planning committee with Earle Denny, local insurance agent, as chairman, met Thursday afternoon in the Chamber of Commerce office.

Those who will assist in the important week are:
J. W. Thomas, fire chief
James Elms, school
George R. Huckaby, publicity
Dr. LeRoy Carter, ministers and churches
Mrs. Mike Livingston, C of C
Herman Kight, citizens
C. C. Wilkes, Valley View school and community.
Every day 800 homes are damaged by, hundreds badly and many totally destroyed. A large number of persons die or receive painful burns or are maimed for life.
Most fires in the homes are the result of carelessness. Major cause are matches and smoking.

- In our community grass fires cause most of the fire alarms.
- Here are some rules for keeping such fires from getting out of control:
 1. Never start an outdoor fire on a windy day.
 2. In burning trash or leaves, use a wire-mesh basket or a metal container. Provide a cover to keep the sparks from blowing.
 3. Don't start a fire near a fence or building.
 4. Keep children away from bonfires or other open fires.
 5. Never leave an outdoor fire unattended.
 6. After putting out an outdoor fire, don't leave until ashes are cool enough to test with your bare hands.

Here are some precautions for parents to take:
Instruct all responsible members of your family how to act in case of fire, and how to call the firemen.
2. Never leave matches where children can find them. Put them out of reach—on a high shelf.
3. Never leave children unattended or locked up in the house. Arrange for a mature, dependable baby-sitter and give specific instructions on what to do in case of a fire.
4. In selecting clothing for your children, avoid flimsy, fast-burning fabrics.
5. Never use lighted candles at children's parties.
6. Never permit children to play near bonfires.

- When fire strikes, do immediately these two things:
 1. Get everybody out of the house.
 2. Call the fire department.
 If you live in a place where the public fire department can reach your home quickly, don't attempt to put the fire out. Concentrate on getting the fire engines there in a hurry—because little fires become big fires within a matter of minutes.

You can help the firemen by closing doors behind you as you leave the house—making certain that everyone is safe.
If you live in an area where you and your neighbors have to fight your own fires—at least during the first few minutes while waiting for the firemen—you should begin now to improve your area's fire protection. In the meantime, keep the following supplies on hand:

- Fire extinguishers
 - Water supply
 - Ladder
 - Garden hose
 - Buckets
- The school plans one or two fire drills next week.
Volunteer firemen are responsible for placing placards and other material in the business houses.
Dr. Carter will have all the ministers of local churches to announce Fire Prevention Week.

The chapter had a soil conservation booth, which won first place. Forester Robertson.



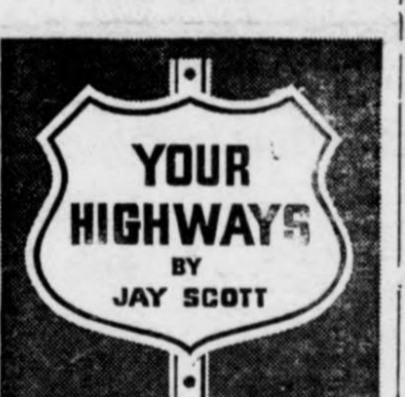
Kitchen Expert to Demonstrate Electric Cooking Methods

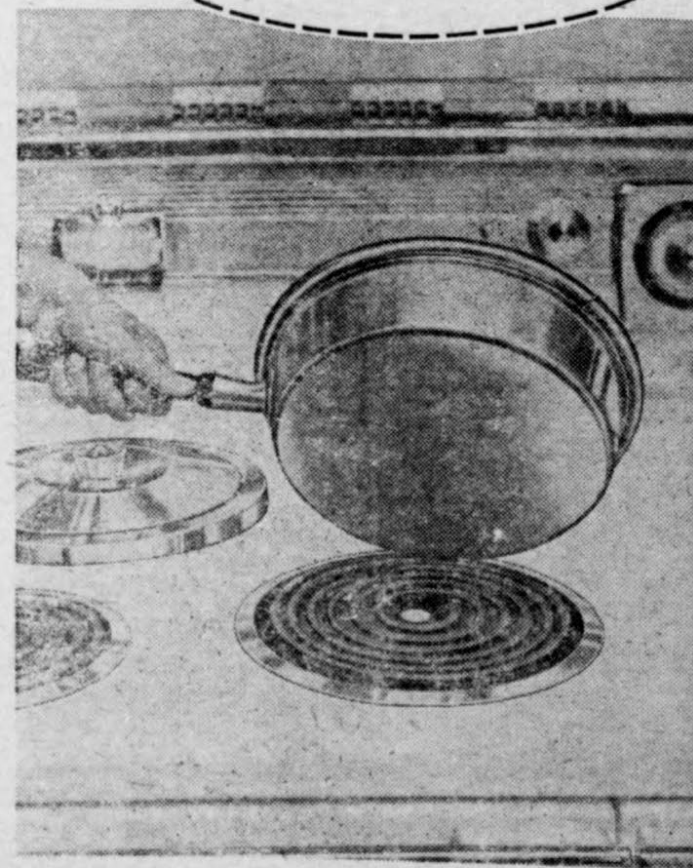

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HOME OWNERS' QUESTION BOX

Q—The cherry wood top of our most treasured table was dented during moving. Can it be repaired?

A—Slight dents can be restored by placing a damp blotter over the damaged area and applying a warm—not hot—iron to the blotter. Repeat until the dent disappears.

Q—I've noticed damp spots on the deck boards and rafters under the roof of my house. I'm sure these are leaks. What's the best method of finding the leaks and patching them?

A—From a practical standpoint, there isn't any "best method" for this job since patching an old roof generally is a mistake, according to the U. S. Bureau of Standards. Roofs wear out uniformly and chances are that if you have one or two leaks in an old roof, more are coming. The wisest thing you can do, and the most economical in the long run, is to put on an entire new roof of asphalt shingles in the color of your choice. The new roofing generally can be applied on top of the old, eliminating the expense of tearing the old material off.

Q—Sometimes it's very difficult to remove old putty from a window frame. Is there any easy way to get it off?

A—One fairly easy way is to run a hot soldering iron across the putty, just ahead of your putty knife. The heat will soften the putty and it will come off more easily.

Q—The aluminum strips along the edges of our kitchen counter tops make black marks on clothing. What can we do about this?

A—Oxidization is the trouble. Coat the stripping with a layer of flanned-out shellac. This will have to be done about once a year or when the shellac chips off.

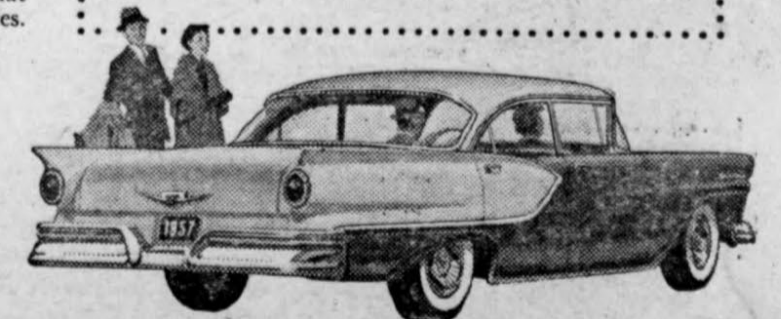

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Ways to Prevent Fires in Home Listed by NFPA

Death by fire in the home is one of the commonest yet most avoidable of all family tragedies, says the National Fire Protection Association. During Fire Prevention Week, the NFPA urges all members of the family to take preventative measures against these main causes of home fires:

1. Careless smoking and handling of matches. Put out cigarettes and matches carefully. Keep matches away from children.

2. Defective chimneys and heating plants shoot out dangerous sparks. A clean chimney and a fire-resistant roofing material such as asphalt shingles is the best way to protect the home from chimney sparks or from trash fires.

3. Overloaded or defective wiring circuits. Only a qualified electrician should install wiring.

4. Trash accumulation. Remove rubbish regularly from basements, attics and closets.

5. Improper handling of gasoline and kerosene, and the use of flammable liquids for dry cleaning and paint removing.

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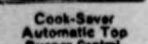

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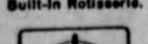
