Crocker was notified several weeks ago in a letter from the state ASC in College Station of the high honor. He was cited for his "initiative, leadership and co-operativeness with other farm agencies, which have been responsible for improved agricultural production and soil and water conservation in the Northwest Texas area."

Last year Bob was honored on the state level with the Outstanding Performance award and received a \$300 cash reward.

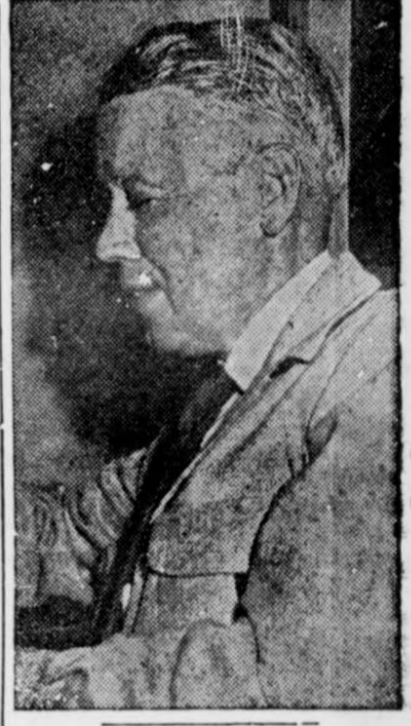
Mr. Crocker was the only member of the ASC branch from Texas to receive the Superior Service rating.

Farm Building Can Be Reroofed During Winter

A farmer does not have to wait 'til spring to replace a leaky roof. Winter, the traditional fix-up season on the farm, is a good time to replace a bad roof that can endanger stored crops and the health of farm animals.

Asphalt roll roofing, frequently used for farm utility buildings, can be put on at any time of the year.

The roofing job can be done easily and efficiently if the farmer will remember that the roofing material tends to become hard when cold.

Roofing manufacturers suggest that the roofing material be left in a warm room for 36 to 48 hours. Then it will be warm enough to unroll without cracking.

After being unrolled, the roofing should be cut into 12-foot, easy-to-handle strips. To insure that the strips will lie flat on the roof when they are applied, they should be stacked on a flat surface and left that way overnight in a warm room. If the roofing material is mineral surfaced, the strips should be stacked with the mineral surface down.

The roofing should be molded to the contour of the roof while the material is warm.

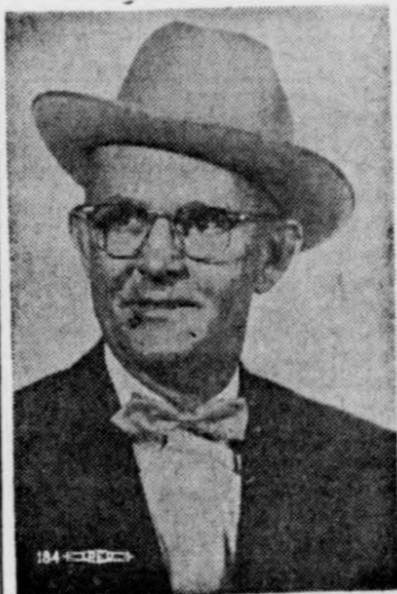

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Soil Conservation

Field terraces are constructed by farmers to intercept the flow of water across cultivated land. After flow has been reduced, it is carried to a safe outlet for disposal.

Soil Conservation Service technicians cite the following advantages of terraces:

1. reduce length of slope
2. reduce soil and water loss
3. permit more intensive use of the land
4. properly constructed terraces are an effective supporting conservation practice.

Terraces are not a complete conservation treatment for the land and need supporting practices such as contour tillage, stubble mulching and crop rotation.

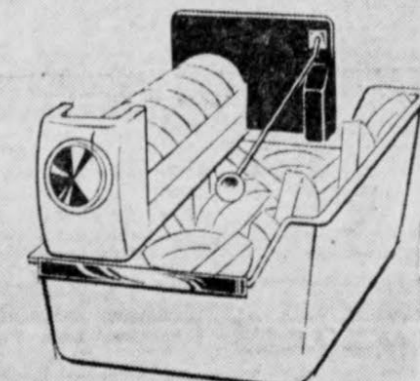

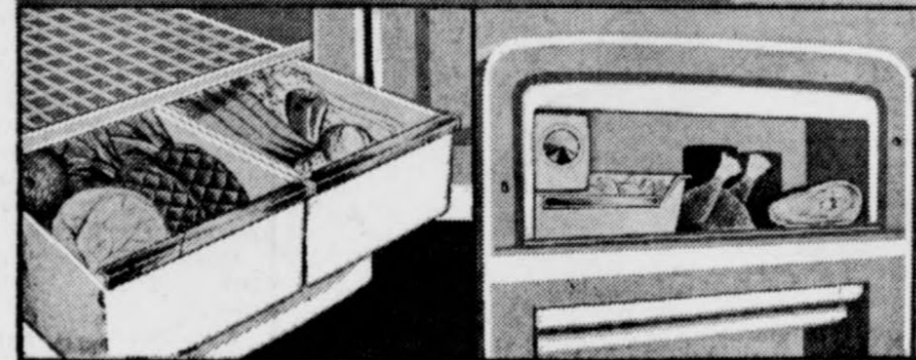

Remodeling Helps Couple Maintain Big House Alone



Finding a home with enough living space is a key problem when the family is young. Later, when the family is grown, the problem is reversed. The husband and wife cope with the difficulty of maintaining a large house alone.

This problem faced Frank Brehm of Cadillac, Mich.

Two of his three children were married and living away. Looking ahead to the time when the last child would also leave, he wanted additional first floor living space in his 7-room cottage so he could close off the second floor and enjoy "bungalow living." But he wanted the second floor to remain available for visits from the children and other guests.

The home, itself, was very similar to thousands of other houses across the country. Mr. Brehm wrote to A. B. Campen who heads a mail remodeling consultation service in Peoria, Ill. Campen suggested tearing down an old woodshed that adjoined the house and replacing it with a new wing. Specific plans were drawn by Campen and a local contractor was engaged to carry out the work.

The new wing contained a large bedroom, a utility room, a first floor bath and added closet space—the necessary ingredients for first floor living.

A new main entrance was built at the side of the house. It opens into a hall from which the kitchen, dining room, bath, bedroom and utility room can be entered without crossing any other living area.

Interlocking asphalt shingles, which give good protection in high-wind areas, were applied to the new wing. These were similar in appearance to the shingles on the main roof. As a further unifying feature, the roof line of the wing was extended across the front of the house to join the roof of the main porch. This also helped to "cut" the height of the house, improving the appearance.

Mr. Brehm reduced costs by doing some of the remodeling work himself under the guidance of the contractor. Labor was saved by using easy-to-install ponderosa pine window units, with sash and frame fitted to each other at the factory.

By insulating the wing's ceiling and exterior walls, Mr. Brehm reduced its heating requirements to a point where the existing heating plant could handle the added load.
