Rev. Pennington Loses Father

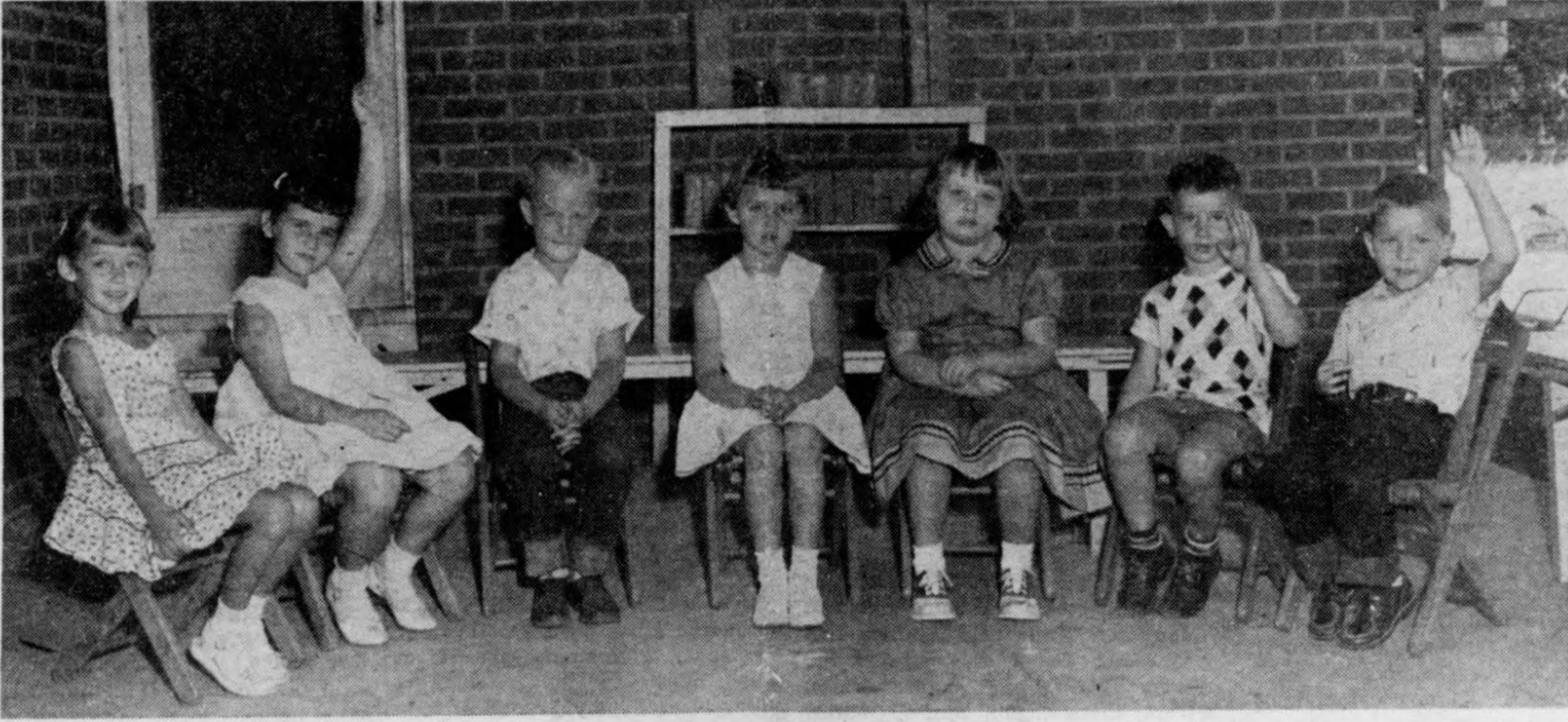
William Thomas Pennington, 89, father of Rev. L. C. Pennington, pastor of the Iowa Park Church of God, died Wednesday morning in a San Antonio hospital after being in ill health about 10 years. Funeral services are to be conducted at 10:00 a.m. Friday in the Seymour Methodist church with Rev. Hold officiating. Burial will be in the Seymour cemetery.

Mr. Pennington was born Feb. 12, 1867 in Monroe, Tenn. He was married to Miss Lula Greer in Mississippi and came to Texas in 1890, settling in Fannin county. In 1903 they moved to Comanche county and later to Seymour.

Mr. Pennington was a retired farmer.

Survivors are two sons: L. C. of Iowa Park and John H. of Rusby; four daughters: Mrs. R. L. Miller of San Diego, Calif.; O. L. Hurst of Seminole, Mrs. Pete Whitten of Knox City, Mrs. C. G. Crutcher of Lamesa; 36 grandchildren and 18 great-grandchildren.

Several Iowa Park friends plan to attend the funeral.

Water Board Closes Lake To Public

In a meeting Wednesday, the board of trustees of Iowa Park's water control and improvement district voted to close Lake Iowa Park to the public until further notice.

Cause of the action is the complaint of some citizens because the lake has been used for fishing, water skiing and swimming this summer.

Realizing the lake was furnishing recreation for citizens of the town, the water board hesitated to take any action to stop use of the lake for fun. But to take prudent action concerning the city's drinking water, the board sent a letter to the county health officer asking his advice.

The letter read in part:
August 10, 1956
Dear Dr. Huff:
On behalf of the Wichita County Water Improvement and Control District No. 3, which is the water supply for the City of Iowa Park, I have been asked to get your opinion as to whether or not the practice of water skiing and swimming in our water supply creates a health hazard.

This lake covers an area of 517 acres when at spillway level, or about 5,500 acre feet. At present it is less than one-third full. It has never been full. It is a soft water supply and is somewhat muddy in its natural condition. In all cases the water is settled, filtered and treated before going into the main. It is never used raw.

The issue is becoming somewhat controversial with sentiment for and against the practice fairly evenly divided. Since this board will have to rule on whether or not to let it continue we are desirous of having an authoritative opinion as to what is or is not a public health problem.

Eighteen days later, Dr. Mark E. Huff of Wichita Falls made the following reply:
"I am of the opinion that swimming and skiing in a water supply does create a health hazard.

The main concern are the virus infections. This organism is not destroyed by treating the water. We are having more Virus Hepatitis this year than we have had in past 5 years. I blame this on the swimming in our water supply."

Mrs. Lochridge became ill Saturday night but insisted on attending Sunday School and worship service the next morning.

Her daughter Mrs. Joe Lindsey found her dead about 7:30 Monday morning. She had eaten breakfast and gone back to bed.

Born Sept. 5, 1869 in Paducah, Ky., she was married and widowed before she married the late L. N. Lochridge of Iowa Park in 1924. She is survived by the daughter at Quannah; three sisters, three grandchildren and 6 great-grandchildren.

High Schools

The opening of Iowa Park junior and senior high schools has been set for Tuesday, September 4, according to Prin. James Elms.

Last year we had an average of 790, and when school opens Monday morning, well over 800 are anticipated.

The school lost its special education department as it was unable to secure a qualified teacher and had not enough children for that type of study.

All school buildings have been improved and redecorated. A new water and steam system has been installed. Much painting has been done this summer to make the rooms more attractive and lighting more effective.

The new band hall and gymnasium are under construction. New bleachers have been constructed for use of visiting team fans.

Keith D. Swim, superintendent, reminds patrons they are always welcome to visit our schools.

Elementary

When the doors open in the Elementary school Tuesday morning, everything will be in readiness for the expected 500 children. Teachers have been working since Monday making preparations for the beginning of the school term.

As a matter of fact, never in the history of the school has there been so much activity in advance of the opening of school. If the pupils are as eager and enthusiastic as the teachers, a good year is already assured.

Among the many children returning will be the 75 first graders who have already "been to school," as they put it. They, perhaps more than any other group, will be eager to meet their teachers, Mrs. Alva Warrington and Mrs. Roy Smith, again. Completely at home in their rooms, since they enrolled in the pre-school last May, these pupils will settle down to all the activities of the first grade without the weeping and wailing that sometimes occurs on the first day of school, because this will be their fourth day.

Some will come gladly Tuesday morning. Some will come reluctantly, and others will fail to appear. Nevertheless, we are hoping to make this year the best ever, even for the reluctant.

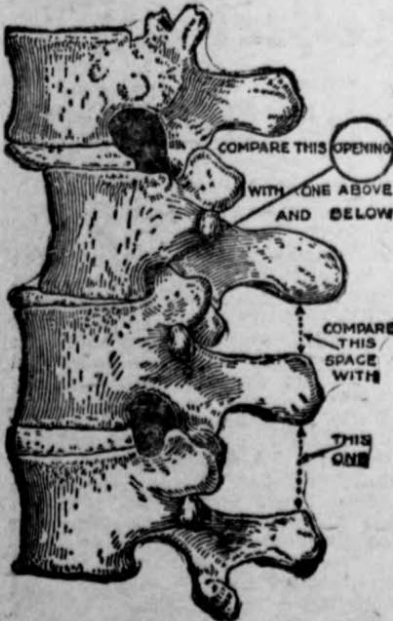

Plaintiff further alleges that it has had peaceable and adverse possession of the lands and tenements described above, cultivating, using and enjoying the same for more than ten years preceding the filing of this petition, during which time such lands and tenements have been actually enclosed and plaintiff has been using the same openly, adversely, and notoriously as owners during all of such period and has paid the taxes on said property and has had open and actual claim of said property using the same as its own, with no adverse claims of any kind during said time.

Wherefore, premises considered, plaintiff prays that the defendants be cited to answer this petition and that plaintiff have judgment for title and possession of the above described premises, for its damages, for costs of suit, and for such other and further relief as it may be entitled to, either at law or in equity, as is more fully shown by Plaintiff's Petition on file in this suit.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

New Style Insurance

A new family automobile policy providing broader protection at no additional cost and featuring a special "Speedclaim" service will be introduced September 1 by the Aetna Casualty and Surety company, according to Carroll Duke Insurance Agency, the company's representative in Iowa Park.

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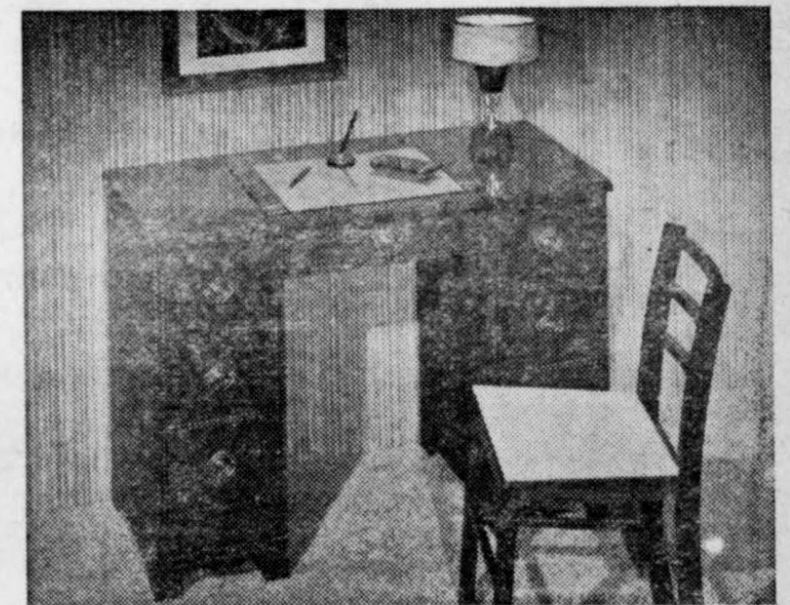
