A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit: This is a trespass to try title suit wherein Plaintiff alleges that on July 30, 1956, they were the owner in fee simple of Lots: Twenty Two (22) Twenty Three (23) and Twenty Four (24) in block lettered "W" original townsite of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas.
That on the day and year aforesaid, defendants unlawfully entered upon said premises and ejected plaintiffs therefrom and unlawfully withhold from them the possession thereof to its damage in the sum of \$100.00. Plaintiff further alleges that it has had

peaceable and adverse possession of the lands and tenements described above, cultivating, using and enjoying the same for more than ten years preceding the filing of this petition, during which time such lands and tenements have been actually enclosed and plaintiff has been using the same openly, adversely, and notoriously as owners during all of such period and has paid the taxes on said property and has had open and actual claim of said property using the same as its own, with no adverse claims of any kind during said time.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.
The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

Experts Tell How To Reduce Cost Of Water Heater

To keep the operating cost of a water heater down, the Coleman Company, a heater manufacturer, makes these suggestions to householders:
1. Set the operating temperature no higher than 140 degrees Fahrenheit. Excessive water temperature is a principal cause of scale formation inside the tank, and this reduces the efficiency of the water heater. The rate of scale formation at 160 degrees is 3 1/2 times as great as at 140 degrees.
2. Every two weeks, draw water through the heater drain cock until the water runs clean. This removes sediment. Whenever sediment accumulates at the bottom of the tank, it builds up a layer of insulation. For the heat of the burner flame to penetrate this layer, the burner must operate longer. Coleman engineers point out that this increases gas consumption.
3. Insulate long runs of pipe. After hot water is drawn from a faucet, some remains in the pipe. In a non-insulated pipe, this cools rapidly. Insulating the pipes reduces the loss.

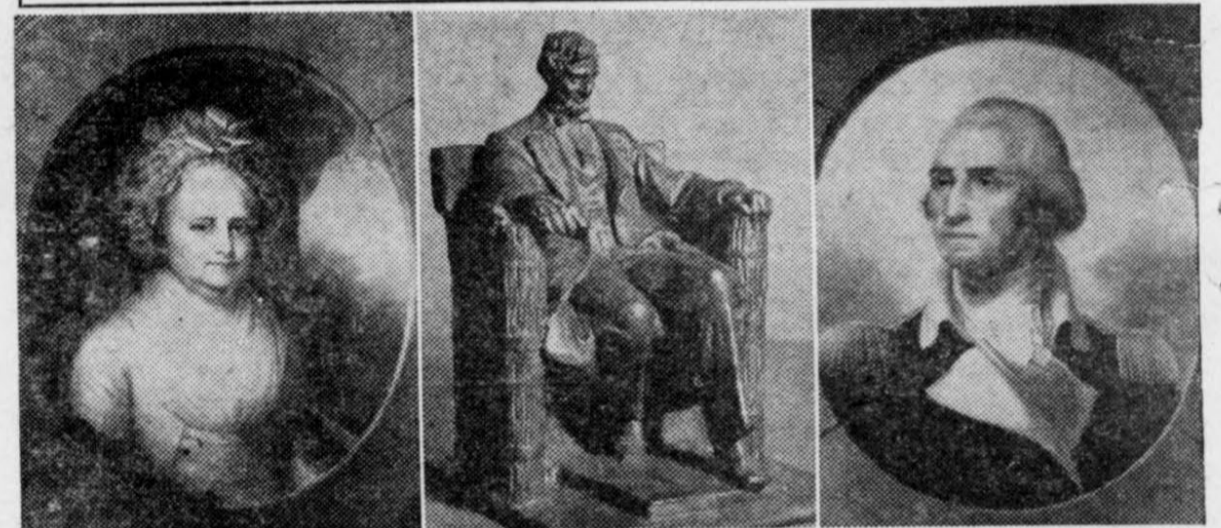
