## Baird Boosts Liberty Bonds

Last Tuesday a hastily planned trip was made over the county to arouse interest in the sale of Liberty Bonds issued by the Federal Government. By request of the Federal authorities County Judge Ely suggested the trip, and Geo. Scott, Lawrence Bowlus and others attended to the details of the trip.

The main speakers were County Judge Ely, Judge Russell, T. E. Powell and County Demonstrator R. Q. Evans and the latter had charge of the program at the towns where stops were made. Rev. R. A. Scranton, Pastor of the Baptist Church at Baird, made a rousing patriotic address at Cross Plains and a better one at Putnam.

The Baird Fireman's Band in full uniform with pennants and banners, woke up the natives where ever we went. Prof. C. E. Strain had charge of the Band.

There were 14 auto loads, 60 people from Baird and one joined us at Clyde where the first stop was made. Judge Ely made the opening speech

followed by Judge Russell. Evangelist McIntosh who is visiting his brother, A. L. McIntosh at Clyde, made a short address that hit the mark.

The next stop was at Eula, then to Oplin where the largest crowd met the party except at Cross Plains, our next stop. A few miles out of Cross Plains C. S. Boyles and Uncle John Wagner with his Confederate battle flag and six or eight autos met us and escorted us into town where a very hungry bunch got dinner.

The School children paraded, sang songs and waved their flags. Cross Plains is a live town and if that bunch ever comes on an excursion up this way and will let us know in time we will meet them at the Mexia with our magnificent Band.

Next stop was at Cottonwood but rather a small crowd. Then to Putnam where there was a fairly good crowd though it was near night.

The trip was made solely in the interest of the government loan and all made the trip at their own expense

pecially to the girls and women of our land. For woman as mother is the aboriginal God appointed teacher. What hope is there of genuine progress in the religious life if we leave woman uneducated. Where woman is ignorant man are coarse and sensual. Where woman's religion is but a superstition man is skeptical and irreverent.

If you want enlightened, noble, brave men, give woman the best education possible. She has the same right as man to become all that she may and do whatever is fair, just and good. Let her mental power increase and more and more, she will stand by the side of man as a helper in all the struggles of life and make the will of God prevail. From the time the Virgin Mother held the infant Savior in her arms to this hour, woman has been the great lover of Christ and the untiring helper of his little ones.

The more knowledge and culture you give her the more effectively will she work to purify life and make justice, temperance and love prevail. She is more unselfish and sympathetic than man, increase her knowledge and you add to her sublime faith and devotion, and she becomes a more heavenly force to spread God's kingdom on earth.

Education prepares for usefulness—As I pass from this thought let me compliment you young ladies on the number in your class and the splendid work you have done. Young men I am proud of you, but where are your companions? Why have they dropped out before they came to this happy day leaving one boy to three girls. Some have gone to work because a little job offered—others to shun the work and discipline incident to the course, others simply failed for lack of energy and perseverance which is the great element of success. Henry W. Longfellow said: 'If you only knock long enough and loud enough at the gate you are sure to wake up somebody.'

Let me say to the young men and boys in the Junior Sophomore and Freshmen class, if you succeed and come to your graduation days as strong in numbers, and in scholarship as the girls you must be clean and studious like them. Why shouldn't you be as clean and as chaste as your sister. Society that has one standard for my boy and another for my girl, his sister, is as mean as hell. God has one standard for both and I say cut out your cigarettes and such things as are retarding you in your progress and be clean.

The educational advantages placed in the hands of the youths of our times is a great price. The opportunities for getting wisdom are such that none need go without a fair education. Common schools, colleges, seminaries and universities all with the best of appliances for getting philosophical, scientific and technical instruction. Good books can be had for a nominal sum; public libraries are accessible and the newspaper is everywhere. 'So' says a distinguished Divine, 'if a man has a heart for knowledge, if he has an ambition to acquire it and if he is quick to discern it, the ear, the eye and every one of the five senses becomes a minister of education to him. But alas that there should be so many that care nothing for it. They invest all this capacity and all this privilege in the most frivolous pleasure. They buy laziness, they buy frivolity, they buy enjoyment which means gratification of the lowest animal appetites and passions.

They buy everything but knowledge, they live to be 24, or 25 years old and are scarcely advanced at all and have laid up in themselves no competency of knowledge by which they can take gold from life's treasury.

Young people, my relation to you as pastor of one of the churches of our town makes me bold to say a word to you about your church life. What a price has been placed in your hands by the energies and sacrifices of those who have given us the church the greatest institution on earth

helpful to you and affording the greatest opportunity to help others, what a splendid field for active service for God and humanity. How will you use this great price in your hand? Jesus Christ founded the church and has made room for every one to do profitable, helpful constructive work in the kingdom of God. Jesus did not teach Literature, Philosophy, History or Science, neither does he expect His church to teach these things—yet His church needs every literary man every philosopher and historian in the world. The philosophy and science of Plato and Aristotle had been in the world for 3 centuries when Christ came but he made no allusion to them. He neither praised nor blamed these great masters of all who have a mind to know. He denounced sin of all kinds, greed, lust, intemperance, covetousness and idolatry—but not a word against the desire to know. Christ came to bring immortal faith, hope and love to man. Knowledge and faith both do God's work, both help to lift man's being into ever increasing likeness of God. What ever helps us to do God's will by serving more effectively our fellow man is sacred and of priceless worth—To give a cup of cold water in the right spirit is Divine service. And so is the earnest research which leads to knowledge or a better understanding of the vocations of life. A heart to his work!

We must be educated to think. Opinion rules men and opinion is nourished by beliefs and beliefs are created and sustained by ideas. If you permit yourself to fall out of the intellectual movements of the age, you shall lose influence over the minds that create opinion and shape the future.

You may win in life by putting your whole heart in the work that is intrusted to you, young people who sit before me, to live in the mind, to learn more and more, to develop intellectually you must strive every day, it is not easy. It requires a discipline, a courage, a spirit of self denial which only the few ever acquire.

I advise you to read! read!! but be careful what—One has said "Only one book in ten is fit to read." Don't forget your Bible, it is the book of life. God has given us the Bible, "A lamp unto our feet and a light unto our path," by which we may be made perfect, thoroughly furnished with every good word and work." Jesus Christ the Holy Spirit, the preached gospel, Sabbath school, home instruction, all work in perfect harmony to help you and me to be what God wants us to be, our very best.

No heart to it, no taste or desire for that which is good.

Ephraim feeding on the wind, a deceived heart has turned him away. The multiplying of gifts if abused only increases condemnation. In the case of the unused talent the Lord said 'take it from him and give it to him that has ten—for every one that hath shall be given and he shall have abundance, but he that hath not from him shall be taken that which he hath. He that does not improve his day and opportunity is a fool according to my text. This is illustrated by the parable of the wise and foolish virgins.

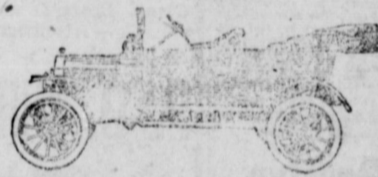

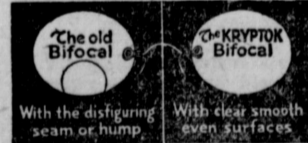
