Plane Crash Kills Rev. Lowry Walker; Carolyn Wittenberg Dies of Injuries

The hearts of Iowa Parkans and all the area were saddened by the tragedy that befell the community Wednesday morning.

Rev. Wm. Lowry Walker, minister of the Presbyterian church, was instantly killed when the airplane he was flying fell near the Gilchrist flyg field two miles east of town.

Carolyn Ann Whittenberg, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Whittenberg of Valley Farms, was fatally injured and died late that evening in a Wichita Falls hospital after undergoing surgery for several hours for head injuries.

Mr. Walker, a licensed pilot and member and chaplain of the Civil Air Patrol, had rented a plane and was treating his daughter Dorothy Ann and two friends: Jane Waters, 15, and Carolyn to pleasure rides.

He had just completed a flight with Jane as passenger and would have made a third trip with his daughter. The two girls were sitting in Mr. Walker's automobile parked on the field when the plane crashed.

The plane fell shortly after it was airborne from a distance of 60 to 75 feet. Officials of the Civil Aeronautics Administration investigated the wreckage and have not released a report.

Dorothy Ann did not see the plane crash, but Jane did, and screamed.

Roland Longhill, an official on duty at Gilchrist airport, assisted by B. J. Mills, who saw the plane shortly after it had crashed, got Carolyn out of the wreckage.

Tanner's ambulance from Iowa Park rushed Carolyn to the hospital, where efforts were made immediately to save her life.

Funeral services were conducted for Mr. Walker at 11:00 a.m. Thursday, May 31, in the church he had served one year. Dr. Earle Crawford of Wichita Falls First Presbyterian church was assisted by Rev. Forrest Whitworth of Federated Presbyterian church of Vernon.

In addition to his daughter Dorothy Ann, Mr. Walker is survived by his widow Dorothy; his parents Mr. and Mrs. T. R. Walker of Cleburne; a sister Mrs. A. B. Brown of Big Spring; two brothers Melvin R. and Dr. Ewel D., both of Dallas; two aunts and two uncles.

Tanner Funeral Home took the body to Dallas from where the family will leave by train for Georgia. Another service will be held in Decatur, Ga., Saturday afternoon at 2:00 with Rev. J. B. McKibben, Methodist district superintendent, and Dr. M. G. Gutzke, professor of Columbia seminary of Atlanta, officiating.

Burial will be at Decatur beside a daughter Carolyn, who died in 1942.

Survivors are two sons: George of Wayside and Leslie of Bartlesville, Okla.; a brother Webb Love of Fort Worth; a sister Mrs. Lynn Troutman of Dumas; four grandchildren: Mary Kate and Mike of Wayside and Mark and Nancy Kay of Bartlesville.

She was married in Iowa Park in October 1913 to Walter Denny, son of another pioneer family, the late Mr. and Mrs. L. C. Denny.

Mr. and Mrs. Walter Denny moved to Panhandle in 1927 where he was in the hardware and implement business until his death in 1931.

Mrs. Denny has been employed in the gas office at Panhandle for many years. She was found dead at home by a neighbor Friday morning. She apparently had suffered a heart attack sometime during the night.

When Mrs. Denny did not report for work Friday and did not answer the telephone, the neighbor was asked to investigate. Mrs. Denny had attended a party in a friend's home early Thursday evening.

Mrs. Denny had worked in the children's department of the Sunday School for approximately 29 years.

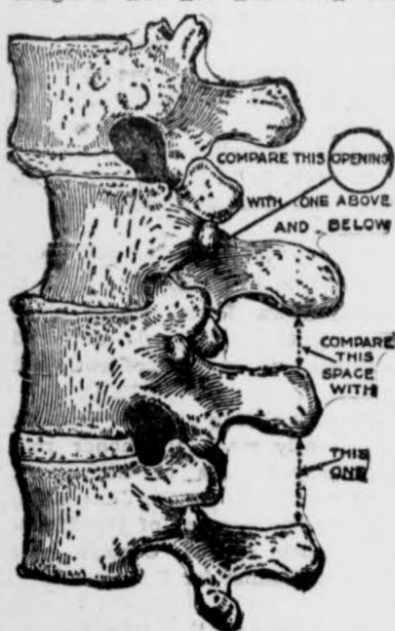

Texas Longhorn Cavern, the world's third largest cave, is one of the nation's most impressive natural wonders. Over eight miles of its labyrinthian splendor have been explored without an end being reached and the lowest point on the guided tour is an eerie 120 feet below the surface. Solesbees Report on Phillipines; Due Home Soon on Furlough

March 28, 1956

Dear Friends,

Your letters, greeting cards and prayers have been a constant source of joy to us. As the time draws near for us to leave here for furlough, we look back over these past past years of service on Mindanao island and share some of our thoughts and feelings with you.

In 1953, there was only one Southern Baptist church in Cotabato Province and one national pastor. There were two Southern Baptist churches in Davao Province and no national pastor. We were the only couple doing full-time evangelistic work among the Filipinos in the two provinces. The Jacksons were on furlough. There was also one Chinese Baptist church in Davao City with the Jowers working with it, and Miss Crowell was helping in both the Filipino and Chinese work.

In 1956, there are two missionary couples in Cotabato Province, with five national pastors, nine churches, and many mission points. In Davao Province there are three churches, 12 mission points, one ordained national preacher, three full-time lay preachers, one missionary couple, and one missionary lady for work with Filipinos. The work with the Chinese church continues, with three missionaries giving part time there. Unless some one comes to relieve while we are on furlough, the burden is going to be very heavy for those missionaries who remain here.

The first year of operation for the Davao Baptist Bible School (a branch of the Baguio Seminary) has just ended. The six students from Cotabato Province and the seven from Davao Province have all helped to carry on the preaching and teaching responsibilities in Davao Province on weekends. The spirit of the entire school was wonderful, and the dedication of the students was thrilling. Bill had charge of the field work for the Bible School, and Ella Ruth taught music theory. One of the young Bible School men was giving his testimony on a Youth Night Program. He said, "I was the black sheep of the family. But one day I attended church and the message convicted me of sin. I went forward and was saved. I'm so happy because I know that I am saved!" In addition to the day students, there were 13 evening students, most of whom were older men and women.

The work at Lasang has grown very slowly because of the strong Catholic hold on the town and the great wickedness there. Recently, however, a little girl from Lasang was brought to the Davao Provincial Hospital in a very sick condition. When her life began to ebb away, the father, being a Roman Catholic, sent for the priest. As the priest stood in the sick room, he was surprised to hear the dying girl singing the chorus, "Walking with Jesus." After the girl died, the priest asked the father where the girl had learned that chorus. The father replied, "There is a Protestant (Southern Baptist) chapel next door to us. Daughter attended the services and learned many choruses there." The father, returning home, found his neighbors and told them joyfully of his daughter's singing about Jesus just before she died.

Last August, Bill was in a party of Baptist workers who made a survey of the east coast of Mindanao to see what the need was there. Town after town had no Protestant worship service. In one place, the priest rode around the town on his motor bike to tell the people to refuse to provide shelter for the Baptists that night. Regardless of the warning, the people gave a warm welcome and shelter. They were hungry for the Gospel and wanted to have worship services. Thus far we have had no one to go there to witness. The mission work in that area would be all PIONEER work. Transportation is inadequate and

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time-consuming. The press of duties here has not permitted our returning there.

We have been happy to devote more time to activities in Immanuel Baptist church this year and feel that many of the members have grown in a remarkable way spiritually. Miss Cleo Morrison directs the Friday evening Youth Night each week and that has been a real blessing to the young people. In addition to the regular pastoral duties, Bill has conducted a Story Hour and Fellowship Period for the children—beginner through junior age—each Saturday morning. That time is being taken over this week by the Woman's Missionary Society, which was organized five months ago. We hope that the Sunbeams, GA's and RA's will be organized soon from the Story Hour group. There were approximately 80 members of Immanuel church when we arrived in Davao in August 1953. Now there are approximately 225 members, many of them living on Talicud Island, in Calinan, Lasang, Bucana, and Matina. With so many members living in the out-stations, our record attendance for Sunday School has been only 175 and for Training Union 145. There has been unusual interest in the Training Union. All of those who have come for church membership by baptism have first studied the Baptist doctrines for several weeks. The witnessing done by the lay preachers and many volunteer workers has made this growth possible.

At last reservations are definite and we can tell you when we shall leave for the States. We plan to fly from Manila to Hong Kong on May 24 and take an Italian boat on May 28 to Naples, Italy. From there we will go overland through Italy, Switzerland and France to England, leaving England on July 5 aboard the Queen Elizabeth for New York. The Foreign Mission Board will pay the usual cost of our direct trip across the Pacific to San Francisco and Texas, and any extra expense will be our personal expense.

Our permanent mailing address is care of J. R. Enloe, Route 4, Box 258, Vernon, Texas. We hope to reside in Fort Worth and shall probably study in the Seminary. We shall look forward to seeing you during our stay in the homeland.

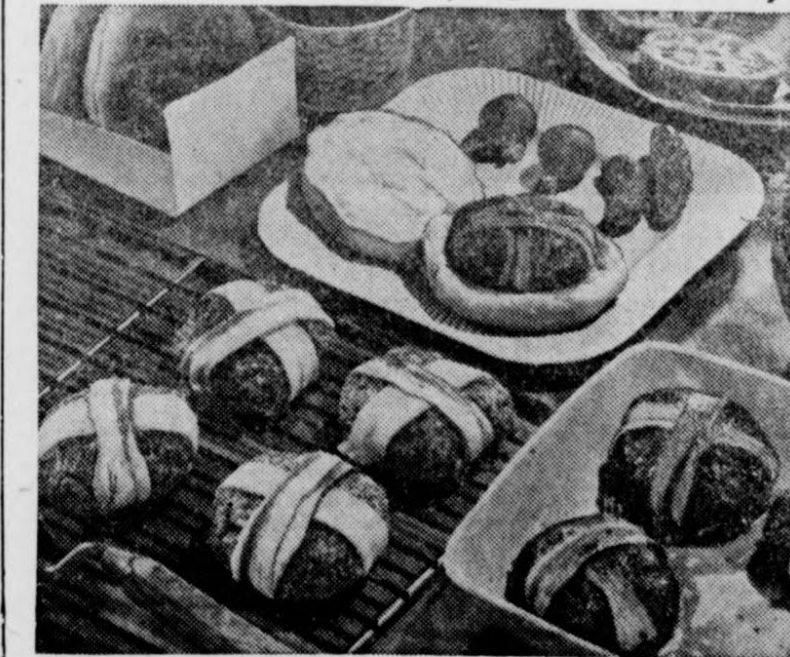

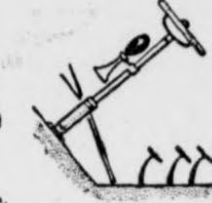
