Ready Reserves

"Now is the time for all good men to come to the aid of their country." These familiar words are applicable to the young men of today, says Maj. Gen. Lewis S. Griffing, chief of the Texas military district. "Armed Forces Reserve has a program whereby all the qualified young men can come to the aid of their country," he explained, "and with the least interruption

to their civilian careers." The army is implementing a program designed especially for the youths of America. This program permits a boy to fulfill his military obligation while completing his education or while working at a civil-

ian job. Here's the way it works-he joins a Ready Reserve unit or a National Guard unit, He can finish high school (if he doesn't reach the age of 20 first), then go on six months active duty for training. He is then prepared for Ready Reserve.

Normally he will have 71/2 years left. During this 71/2 years if he trains satisfactorily, he will not have to worry about a draft call. In most instances he can train with a unit in his own hometown. The only time he is called away from home is for two weeks each summer to attend training camp. All of this is designed to interrupt to the smallest degree his schooling

or his work. "Every young Texan should think seriously about his future military obligation," Griffing said. "If he doesn't, Uncle Sam is likely to point a finger at him sooner or later. He should consider this program from a standpoint of how it benefits him as an individual. But most important of all, he should consider it from a patriotic point of view."
