An election of importance to Valley View and Eagle Bend communities is scheduled for Saturday, April. On that date voters will have an opportunity to decide whether the two school districts shall be consolidated.

Eagle Bend is a common school district with classes only up to the eighth grade, while Valley View is an independent school district with the full 12 grades of elementary and secondary education. According to Supt. Clark C. Wilkes, the consolidation, to be effected, must be favored by a majority of voters in each of the school districts.

FIGHT CANCER WITH A CHECKUP AND A CHECK



April 1 will be the deadline for most Texans to render their property to certain taxing agencies. State laws require all real and personal property to be rendered for taxes on or before prescribed dates. Those who fail to comply can blame only themselves for the money loss they may consequently suffer.

Some Texas cities set their own tax deadlines. These are the cities of more than 5,000 population which have incorporated under the "Home Rule" provisions of our statutes. All other cities are governed by the general laws of Texas.

In towns operating under the general laws property must be rendered for taxes between January 1 and April 1 each year. A number of home rule cities set up their own time.

In some localities a third taxing unit is involved—the independent school district. In other places school taxes are collected by the city or county. In addition, some localities have water, irrigation, or levee districts which assess and collect taxes. Make inquiry as to where these various taxes are assessed, and as to applicable deadlines for rendition.

What property must be rendered for taxes? If Texas laws were strictly enforced, we would be required to render to all taxing units nearly every piece of real and personal property which we own, down to the very clothing on our backs. An exception is the constitutional exemption of \$250 worth of household furniture. However, no taxing unit carries their requirements this far, and it will be necessary to inquire of each tax assessor when rendering your property whether specific types of property are ordinarily rendered in that locality.

Some cities and counties collect ad valorem taxes on automobiles, television sets and other personal items, while others ignore practically all personal property. Business and professional men are generally required to render all merchandise, furnishings, and fixtures, business automobiles and equipment.

If property is not rendered by the tax payer, it may then be placed upon the unrendered tax roll, and the taxing agency places such valuation thereon as it considers fair. One advantage of rendering your property is that you can set your own valuation. Then, if the county or city decides a higher valuation is in order, you will be given an opportunity to appear before a board to explain why the higher figure should not be used in computing your taxes. Thereafter, an appeal to the courts is possible in some instances. Generally speaking, however, the courts are unable to strike out a valuation unless the agency or board has acted arbitrarily and placed on the property a valuation higher than that placed on comparable property owned by others. If you do not render, the valuation set by the taxing agency is final.

Remember these facts: You may need to render your property at three or more different tax offices. Ask each tax assessor if in doubt concerning the deadline or the rendering of specific personal items. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform—not to advise. No person should apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who knows the facts because the facts may change the application of the law).

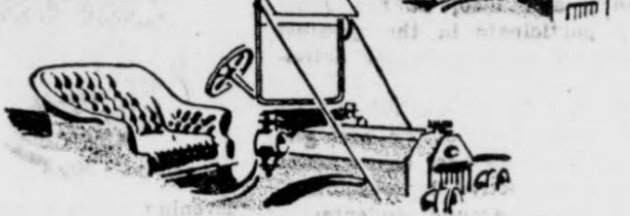

Decorations consisted of spring flowers and appropriate wedding appointments.

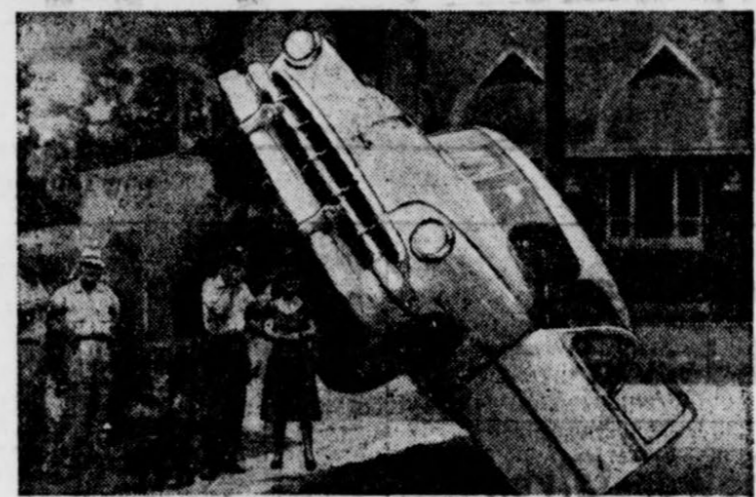
Punch and cookies were served. The table had crystal punch bowl, crystal candleabra, pink candles, with centerpiece of assorted spring flowers.

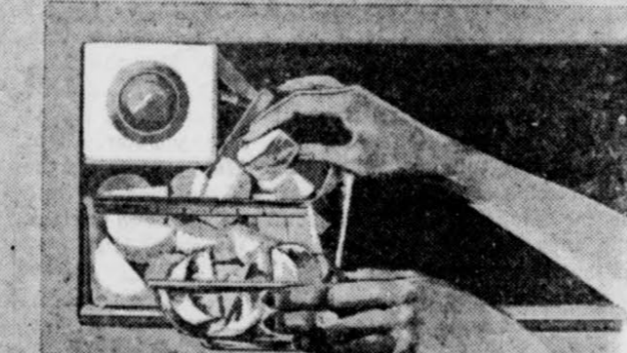

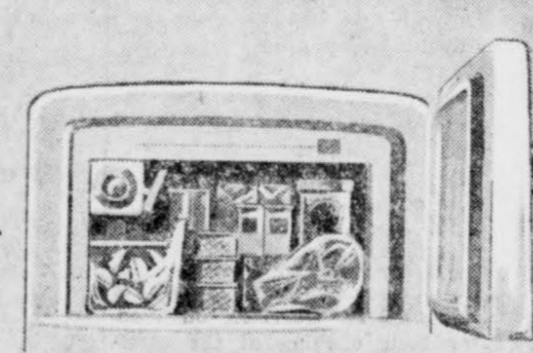

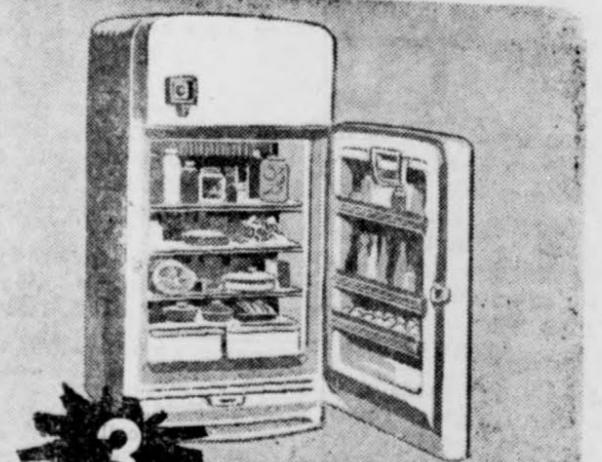

COUNTY AGENT SUGGESTS....

Summer temporary pastures should form a very important part of the year-round grazing or pasture program on the farms and ranches of the state. B. T. Haws, county agent, says good summer temporary pastures just don't happen. They must be planned well in advance and the same care given to seedbed preparation, seeding the right plants and fertilization as is used in connection with other cash crops.

Such pastures will permit a resting period for permanent pastures, provide grazing when permanent pastures are on the decline, and provide a means for building up feed reserves.

Sudangrass, says Haws, is the best bet in most areas of the state. It can be planted any time after the danger of frost is past and until the supply of moisture becomes short in the summer. From one to two acres should be planted for each animal unit. Row plantings are best for grazing but broadcast or close drilled plantings will produce the most hay if it is to be cut only once.

Row plantings should be made at the rate of 7 to 10 pounds of seed an acre, while 20-25 pounds is recommended for broadcast or close drilled plantings. Staggered plantings made at intervals of two to four weeks may extend the grazing season until late fall. The different plantings should be fenced separately in order to get maximum production.

Two varieties of this old favorite are generally available in the state. Common is widely grown but may be damaged by leaf diseases in the humid regions of the state. Sweet carries some leaf disease resistance and may outyield Common in humid seasons.

Haws recommends rotation grazing for getting the most from summer pastures, but this should be planned for now. Production can be increased and quality of the forage kept high by rotation grazing. Old stems should be moved after grazing to keep new growth coming. Growth not utilized by grazing should be used for hay or silage.

A soil test made well ahead of planting will show what plant foods should be applied at seeding time. Side-dressing with 30 pounds of nitrogen an acre after each time the sudan is grazed down or cut, for as long as the plants are growing and moisture is available, will produce big dividends.

Haws says pearl millet may on the sandy, acid soils of Texas out-produce sudan. He recommends a visit with him for those who desire detailed information on summer pastures for their particular section of the state.

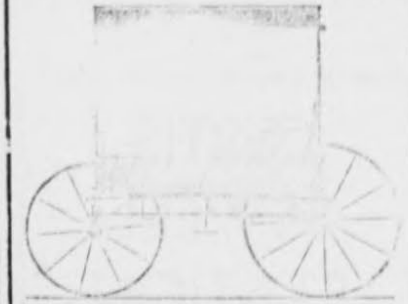

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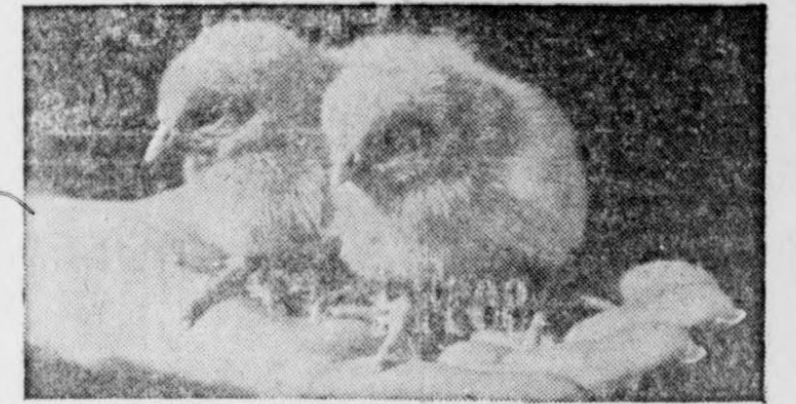
