





If property is not rendered by the tax payer, it may then be placed upon the unrendered tax roll, and valuation thereon as it considers fair. One advantage of rendering your property is that you can set your own valuation. Then, if the en an opportunity to appear be-

fore a board to explain why the Good luck, and we still wish we higher figure should not be used in computing your taxes. Thereafter, an appeal to the courts is possible in some instances. Gen-

erally speaking, however, the courts are unable to strike out a valuation that placed on comparable property owned by others. If you do not render, the valuation set by the taxing agency is final.

Remember these facts: You may need to render your property at three or more different tax offices. Ask each tax assessor if in doubt concerning the deadline or the rendering of specific personal items. (This column, based on Texas law, is written to inform-not to advise. No person should apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who knows the facts because the facts may change the application of the law).

# Study Compares Beef Prices

FARM VALUE OF BEEF DROPS FASTER THAN RETAIL VALUE

During the last quarter of 1953 the farm value of choice grade bee was down an average of nine cents a pound, while the retail price dropped on 3.5 cents per pound. A beef study by the U.S. Department of Agriculture shows that the difference between what the farmer receives for U.S. choice grade beef on the hoof and what the consumer pays for the meat has flucturated widely during the seven years 1949-1955.


Retail prices remained relatively stable during the latter half of 1954 when farm cattel prices were rising, and during 1955 when farm prices generally declined. Marketing margins, therefore, narrowed substantially below the long - run average in the latter half of 1954. In 1955, however, they widened markedly, exceeding the high levels of 1953. The comparisons are based on the price of a pound of beef at retail and the price of its equivalent weight of 2.16 pounds in the live animal.

Marketing margin is the difference in price received by the livestock producer and that price paid by the cnosumer.

During 1955, the spacead between the farm marketing price and the retail marketing price was about five cents a retail pound more than at the start of the seven year period. In the last quarter of 1955, the margin was 27 percent wider than in the same quarter of 1954.

A series of studies is now under way in the Department of Agriculture dealing with the cost of processing and distributing food. This particular report, Beef Marketing Margins and Costs, publication 710, analyses the trend of prices and margins for U.S. choice grade beef at different stages in marketing process.

The report states that fluctations in dollar margins come about because cattle and beef prices do not maintain a fixed relationship to one another at any point in the marketing channel.


