## Hawks Lose First Game of Season At Chillicothe, 18-20

Playing their finest team effort and game of the season, the valiant Hawks succumbed to the Chillicothe Eagles last Friday night by a slim 18-20 margin.

Iowa Park had their backers agog as time and time again they ripped the vaunted Eagle line for long gains. Harvey Klinkerman scored the first TD of the game, going 2 yards over left guard. Our boys marched 67 yards for that TD and two 15 yard penalties didn't stop them.

Spears, the Eagle defensive wizard, recovered a Hawk fumble and Scott sped 5 yards to tie up the score.

Again and again the Hawks rammed downfield only to be stymied by fumbles and penalties. Finally Whisenhunt cracked over, and the Hawks regained the lead. The half found the score 12 to 6.

Spears, a thorn in the Hawks' side all evening, recovered another fumble and later plowed 12 yards to put the Eagles even, Scott boot-ed the point, and the Eagles led for the first time.

Then came the play that brought Green and White fans to their feet. J. C. Bridges broke over right tackle on a crossback on 4th down. He raced across and down and across and back, and finally wound up on the Eagle 8, some 60 yards from the scrimmage line. Klinkerman then passed to Marquart and put us ahead.

Chillicothe marched 53 yards to score the winning tallies.

The Hawks marched down the field until Marquart was jarred loose from the ball on what this writer thought should have been ruled an incomplete pass. The official thought Marquart caught the ball and then fumbled. That stopped the drive and the Eagles ran out the time.

Hawk gladiators really gave the Eagles a beating in everything except conversions. They out rushed and out blocked and out played them. Bridges and Whisenhunt ran like demons and it took 3 to 5 tacklers to stop them.

Bridges stole Scott's thunder with beautiful running. He reeled off two dashes of better than 60 yards and several times broke loose for 10 to 30 yards. Whisenhunt tore the left side of the Eagle line to shreds. His longest run was 28 yards.

Hawks close the season at home this Friday with Lockett as the opposition.



## Mrs. Gibbons Brubaker, English War Bride, Earns U.S. Citizenship

Mrs. Gibbons Brubaker of Iowa Park will take her final test and oath of allegiance to become an American citizen next Wednesday, the day before Thanksgiving, a holiday which didn't mean much to her until she came to the United States.

Mrs. Brubaker, known to her friends in this area as Dorris, came to Iowa Park in 1946 from her home in Ramsgate and High Whychem, County of Kent, England. Her meeting with a local boy, Cpl. Gibbons Brubaker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Brubaker, is like a real wartime story.

Before World War II, Dorris was training for nursing, but when the war broke out and all people of England were drafted for war work she was assigned to aircraft work. In Jan, 1944 she was working at High-Whychem in an aircraft factory as a machinist.

An American air force installation was nearby, and Dorris' aunt made it a habit to invite American servicemen into the home as guests. Gibbons was one of the boys who received this hospitality. Here Dorris and Gibbons met, and they were married the following May 5 in Ramsgate.

Before the war ended the Brubakers had a son born and they named him Martin. Later Gibbons was sent back to the States. Six months after he left, Dorris and Martin arrived in New York City on May 1, 1946.

After nine days of ocean travel and two days train ride they arrived in Iowa Park, the day after their second anniversary.

Dorris says her first impression of America was that it was so large. Her impression of her new home town was that it was the hottest place she had ever been in. Her home in England has a cool climate.

## Arthur Estes Dies In Wichita Falls; Burial Is Here

Funeral rites were conducted for Arthur H. Estes Jr., 46, of Wichita Falls, Thursday afternoon, Nov. 17, in the Baptist church here. The body lay in state at the church from 2:00 to 3:00 p.m.

Rev. Young Tucker, pastor of the Faith Baptist church, officiated. He was assisted by Rev. Wm. Lowry Walker of the Iowa Park Presbyterian church. Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

Arthur, better known to Iowa Park friends as "Tude," died Tuesday afternoon in a Wichita Falls hospital after a short illness. He was born Feb. 22, 1909 in Plainview. While a small boy he moved with his parents and family to Iowa Park. He attended school here.

At the age of 17, Tude enlisted in the navy and served 15 years in the service. He saw duty in Central America and the Virgin Islands, where he was attached to the Marine hospital.

After receiving his discharge, he was married to Miss Mona McKinney of Iowa Park on Jan. 11, 1941 at San Antonio. They later moved to Dallas and then back to Iowa Park, where he was employed at Sheppard AFB in 1948.

Later they moved to Wichita Falls and owned a home on York street.

Arthur was warehouse officer attached to the SAFE supply organization. He had served as president of the National Federation of Federal Employees; and was a charter member of the SAFE Credit Union.

Arthur was a member of the board of deacons of Faith Baptist church.

Survivors are the widow; a 14 year old daughter Barbara Faye; his mother Mrs. A. H. Estes sr. of Iowa Park; three brothers: Reid of Snyder, Texas, T-Sgt. Joe of Biggs AFB, El Paso, James of Iowa Park; and two sisters: Mrs. R. E. Van Horn of Iowa Park and Mrs. Paul Griffin of Gainesville.

Active pallbearers were John Ebbert, W. P. Martin, Jack Terry, Orville C. Moody, all of Wichita Falls; Ted J. Freeman of Grand Prairie; Lt. Sears and Major Victor Dilsimone of SAFB; and Geo. Lewis of Iowa Park.

Honorary pallbearers were the deacons of his church and Ardis P. Jackson and Frank Young, both of Wichita Falls.

## Gym, Band Hall Voting Nov. 19

Earle Denny will be presiding judge for the school bond election Saturday at the high school building. He will be assisted by T. E. Gilbreath, Fred Parkey and M. E. Banks; and clerks will be Mrs. R. R. Brubaker and Mrs. W. M. Owens. Polls will be open from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m.

Drawings of the proposed physical education building and of the band hall to be built here during the next nine months can be seen in the east windows of the State National Bank.

As presently planned the physical education plant will have a seating capacity of about 1,000 spectators for indoor athletic events. It will be fitted for basketball and volleyball and a complete gymnasium for physical training of students of all ages.

The band building will be complete with several individual practice rooms and a large room for ensemble practice. There will be space for a small audience during band practice, but the building is not designed for public performances.

Estimates of costs of these two buildings are about \$100,000 for the physical education plant, and \$25,000 for the band hall.

At present the school district has a \$44,000 bonded indebtedness. In the election to be held at the school building Saturday, Nov. 19, voters will have opportunity to authorize the school trustees to issue new bonds to the extent of \$225,000 for construction of the two buildings we have described plus another complete elementary school building possibly two years later if conditions and growth of school population warrant the expansion.

Assessed valuation of property in Iowa Park Independent School district is over \$3,800,000 and these new bonds will represent a seven per cent indebtedness against the property.

One proposition to be considered in the election will determine if Iowa Park schools will be placed under provisions of Chapter 523, Acts 1955, 54th Legislature, Regular Session (Senate Bill 116).

Senate Bill 116, if voters decide to accept it as a guide for conducting the affairs of our school, gives authority to vote bonds up to 10 per cent of the assessed valuation.

Another proposition to be voted on Nov. 19, is authority for the school trustees to issue the \$225,000 worth of bonds and levy taxes to amortize them.

Third proposition reaffirms the maintenance tax which is already being collected by the school district.

Uriah Blum suffered a severe heart attack last Monday and was rushed to Wichita General hospital. He is reported slightly improved but still in a serious condition.

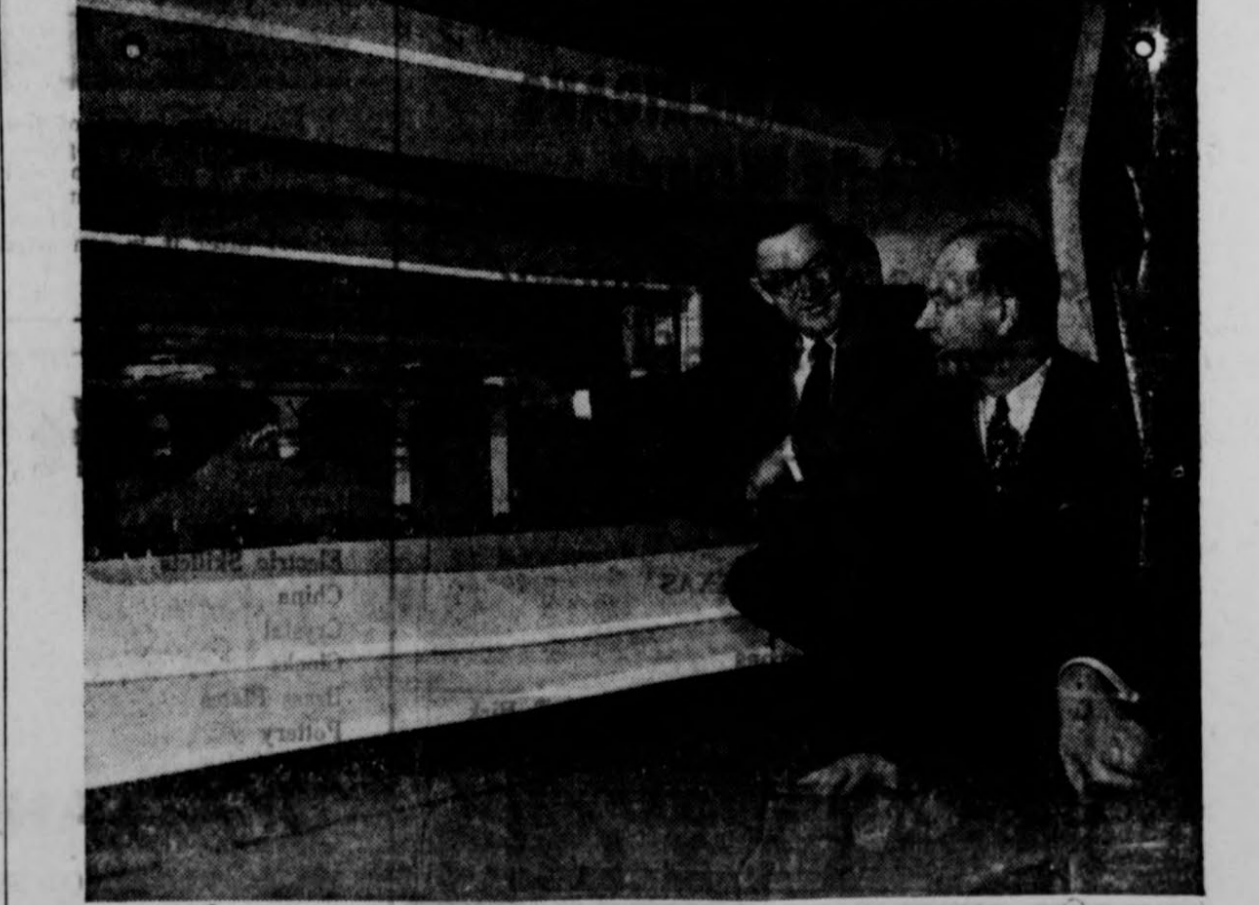

At the present time there is no satisfactory vaccine against TB.

**CAMP FIRE GIRLS PLANNING DOLL SHOW**

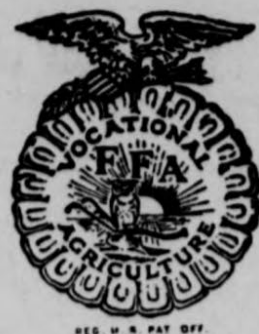

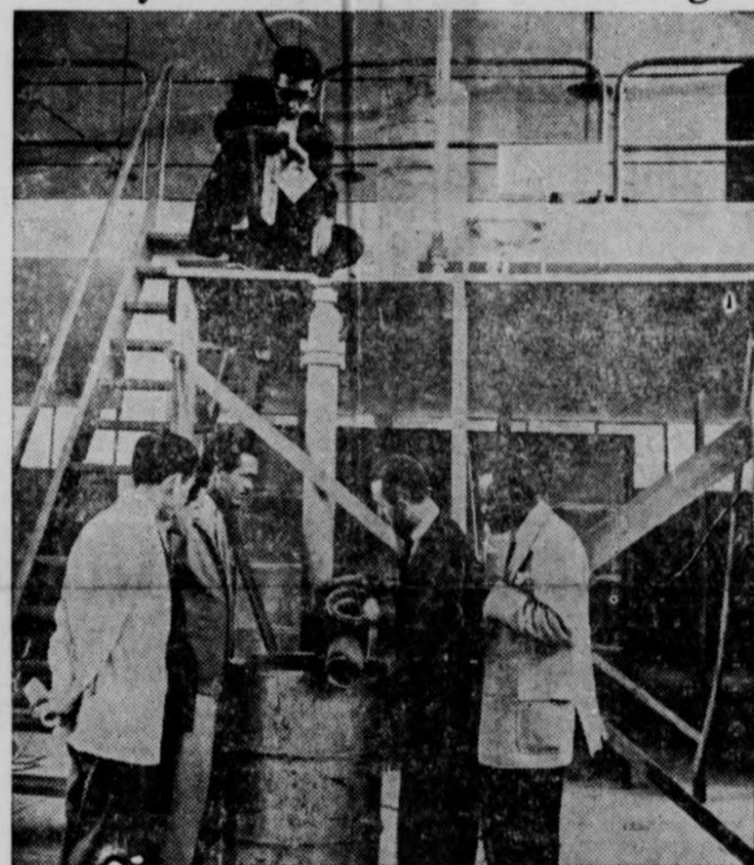

## HOME OWNERS' QUESTION BOX

Q—Is there any way to remove squeaks from stairs?

A—Yes, usually one or more nails through the tread into the riser will stop the squeaking. Screws will do a more permanent job.

Q—How can I replace old windows and still maintain the authenticity of an early-American house?

A—Ponderosa pine double hung windows come in a wide variety of different styles. Among these are a number of early-American type windows, with small "mul-lioned" panes. All ponderosa pine windows are chemically treated to keep them from sticking and warping.

Q—How can I prevent cold water pipes from "sweating"?

A—Cover them with insulation. Insulating warm water pipes gives another benefit. It prevents heat loss and protects adjacent wood-work.

Q—The lights in my kitchen occasionally dim. What does this mean?

A—This probably means there is not enough electricity coming into the kitchen. When the lights dim, this indicates that an appliance is taking some of the electricity needed for keeping the lights bright. The remedy is to have an electrician install an additional electric circuit in the kitchen.

Q—Is there any reason a thermostat must always be in the living room? I'd like to move mine somewhere else, where it won't be so noticeable.

A—The room that is most frequently occupied by the family is recommended by the Coleman Heating and Air Conditioning Institute, Wichita, Kan. The living room, dining room, or den might be equally satisfactory places. The thermostat should be at least two feet away from an outside wall and not more than four feet above the floor. Don't put it in the kitchen, for heat from the range or oven might affect it. Keep it away from lamps, the radio, or the television set.

## Family Economics to Be Demonstrated

The Louis Maloney family of City View are the first family to begin work as family economics demonstrators. Mrs. Eula J. Newman, home management specialist for Texas Extension Service, and Miss Thelma Wirges, Wichita county home demonstration agent, have just completed their first visit to help the Maloneys start their work. Purpose of the program is to encourage families to plan the best use of their income and to have well organized business procedures in the home. With this purpose in mind the Maloney family is working on Farm and Home Records and Providing a Place and Plan for keeping Records. They are also making a study of Transferring Property and the Use of Credit.

Home demonstration clubs in Wichita county will begin their study of Family Economics in January. At that time other families will begin work, in their homes, as demonstrators.

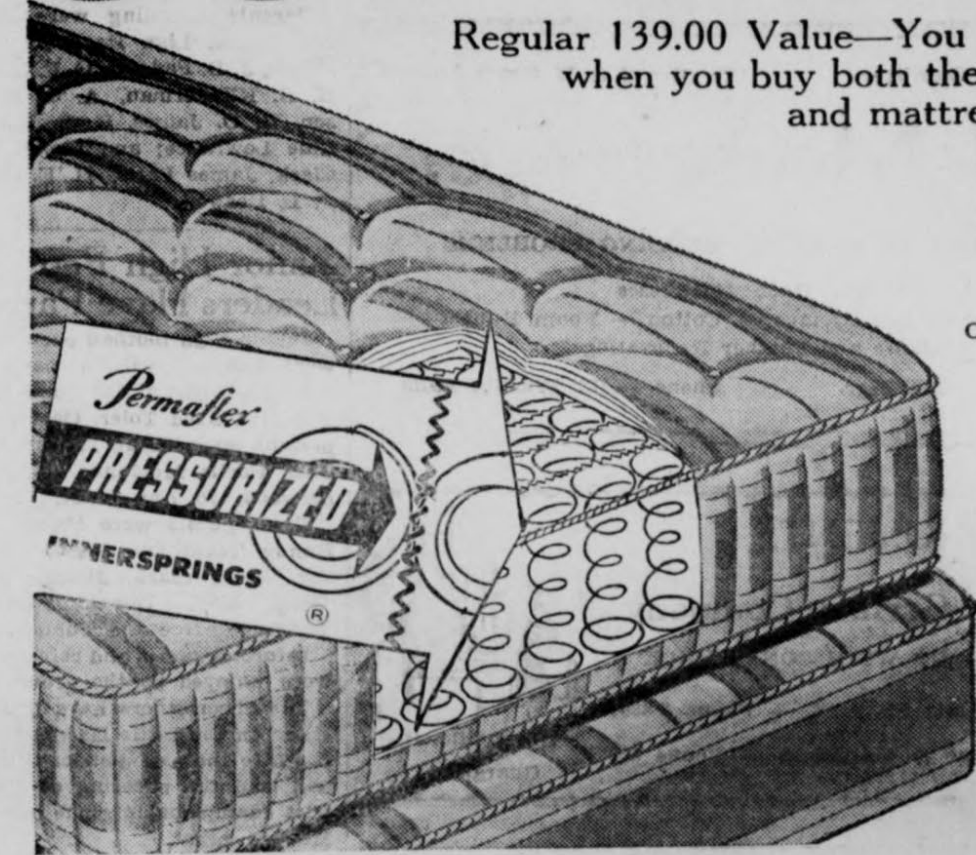

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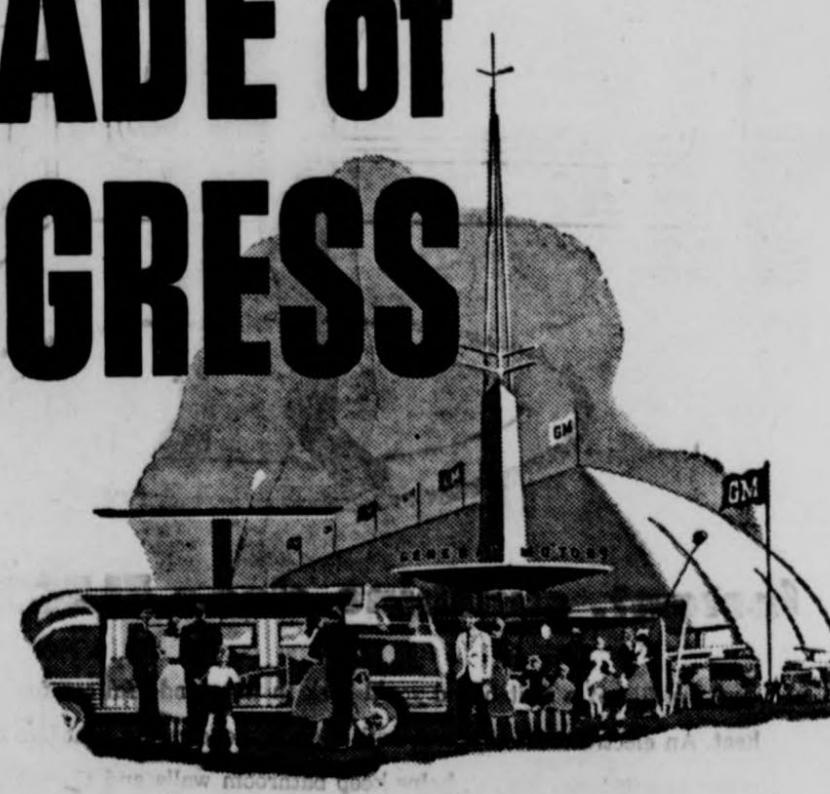


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
