W. L. Browning, 85, died after a heart attack at his home in the Samnorwood community near Wellington last Saturday morning.
Funeral services were held Sunday in the Samnorwood Baptist church with burial in Plymouth cemetery.

Mr. Browning was born in Pano-la county on Sept. 21, 1870 and married Miss Emily S. Mount at Rhome on July 21, 1896.
The family moved here about 1910 and lived northeast of town close to the old City Lake. He operated a farm implement and hardware business and served on the local school board. Mr. Browning was a former member of the Plymouth school board and was a deacon in the Samnorwood Baptist church.

He is survived by his widow, who is critically ill; two daughters: Mrs. W. L. Scott of Canyon and Mrs. R. W. Hodges of Houston; three sons: Nolan L. of Samnorwood, Ernest W. of Litaque and Paul M. of Temple; seven grand- and one great-grandchild.

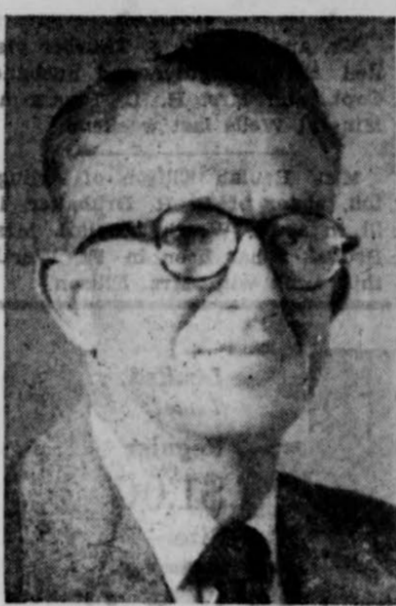


Eddie Whittenburg Coaches 6th Graders

Progress Reports Made At NTSOADA Meet Here Wednesday

Agriculture, transportation and water are three items that affect economic conditions in North Texas and southern Oklahoma. This fact was clearly brought out Wednesday at the Area Development association meeting in the State National Bank in Iowa Park.

With Keith D. Swin directing the business session, committee reports were heard on what NTSOADA is doing about these three factors.
Sam Harrison of Graham reported on a recent meeting at Knox City where lawmakers and federal employees discussed with a group of citizens feasibility of a flood control project on the Brazos river.

Glenn D. McGee of Waurika disclosed that work is being done to place a multiple purpose dam and reservoir on Cow and Beaver creeks upstream from Waurika. Water from this project probably can be had at Wichita Falls to supplement present supplies.

Raymond Lunn of Olney brought to the attention of other association men the difficulties facing his town in the transportation of merchandise to stores. Olney and many other cities in the area have no railway service and have to depend on motor trucks and motor express service.

Further study of this problem will be made by committees, with a possibility that new legislation can help solve the problem.
Tab Dowlin of Temple, Okla., asked that each city in the area appoint an agriculture committee to advise with and work with the agriculture committee of the area development association.

Temple was chosen as site for the next meeting of the association, the second week in December.
At noon the visitors were guests of State National Bank at a joint meeting of the Lions club, the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce and the NTSOADA. Following the meal Tab Dowlin made a talk about the agriculture business as it concerned not only the farmer and rancher, but also on the city dweller.

A group of the visitors made a bus tour of Iowa Park, visiting the Thompson Tool company, John B. Barbour Trucking company, Jack Martin's Hereford farm and Underwood's Quarterhorse ranch.

Fine Blocking, Defense Bring Hawk Victory Over Holliday; Chips Down at Chillicothe

Spectacular blocking for the running of halfbacks Bridges and Whisenhunt was the main factor in Iowa Park's clean-cut triumph over the Holliday Eagles last Friday night on the home field.

Gordon Griffith recovered a Holliday fumble to get the Hawks going in the first period. Then Klunkerman followed his blockers Low and Daugherty over for the TD. Whisenhunt's try for PAT failed as Hubbard stopped him a bit short of the goal line.

To start the second period, Klunkerman again followed beautiful blocking for 16 yards and the green and white team's second touchdown. Jerry Morgan rammed the bonus point over behind Eddie Whittenburg.

In the third quarter guard D. O. James intercepted a pass and returned it 8 yards set Coach Covington's lads up again. Whisenhunt rammed 28 yards for a first down and then slammed right tackle for the extra point.

The two halfbacks changed roles on the next assault on the scoreboard. Bridges cut around left end for six points and Whisenhunt tackled on the bonus.
Then Coach Covington sent in his younger boys to gain experience and they didn't fare too badly. They gave up two touchdowns to the Eagle regulars, but had a drive of their own going when the "A" stringers came back with about 1 1/2 minutes left to play.

Bridges took the handoff and cracked through right tackle behind beautiful blocking and swept 33 yards for the final marker of the game, which ended 34 to 13.

This Friday night the Hawks will go to Chillicothe for the big game of the season for them. This game will probably unveil the District 9-A champion, Chillicothe is one of the three undefeated, untied teams in Texas 1A competition.

Everybody is going to the game. Sheriff Jones warns all persons to be sure their businesses and homes are securely locked and cared for. And since practically the whole volunteer fire department will be at Chillicothe, it would be wise for each home owner to inspect his fires and stoves and ashtrays before he leaves in the caravan at 5:30 Friday evening.

Word came from Paducah high school that they will be backing the Hawks all the way for a victory. A scroll signed by 150 Paducah people was received this week at Iowa Park school stating they would be in the stands cheering for the Hawks. Paducah lost to Chillicothe last week by one touchdown.

Miss Ethyle Kidwell, principal, announced this week the elementary school has its new opaque projector in full operation now.
A gift from the local PTA, this machine uses post card scenes or any picture of post card size.

Some of the geography classes are making their own slides to go with their lessons.
Each room in the school is fitted with steel holders at each window for blackout shades, so the projector can be used at any time.
The school also owns a portable motion picture projector. This has been paid for by the grade school students by selling candy. At present they have \$90.50 in the fund to pay for more films.

In the near future the grade school plans to start the candy sale again for this year.

Gym, Band Hall Plans Displayed, Voting Nov. 19

Drawings of the proposed physical education building and of the band hall to be built here during the next nine months can be seen in the east windows of the State National Bank.

As presently planned the physical education plant will have a seating capacity of about 1,000 spectators for indoor athletic events. It will be fitted for basketball and volleyball and a complete gymnasium for physical training of students of all ages.

The band building will be complete with several individual practice rooms and a large room for ensemble practice. There will be space for a small audience during band practice, but the building is not designed for public performances.

Estimates of costs of these two buildings are about \$100,000 for the physical education plant, and \$25,000 for the band hall.

At present the school district has a \$44,000 bonded indebtedness. In the election to be held at the school building Saturday, Nov. 19, voters will have opportunity to authorize the school trustees to issue new bonds to the extent of \$225,000 for construction of the two buildings we have described plus another complete elementary school building possibly two years later if conditions and growth of school population warrant the expansion.

Assessed valuation of property in Iowa Park Independent School district is over \$3,800,000 and these new bonds will represent a seven per cent indebtedness against the property.

One proposition to be considered in the election will determine if Iowa Park schools will be placed under provisions of Chapter 528, Acts 1955, 54th Legislature, Regular Session (Senate Bill 116).
Senate Bill 116, if voters decide to accept it as a guide for conducting the affairs of our school, gives authority to vote bonds up to 10 per cent of the assessed valuation.

Another proposition to be voted on Nov. 19, is authority for the school trustees to issue the \$225,000 worth of bonds and levy taxes to amortize them.

Third proposition reaffirms the maintenance tax which is already being collected by the school district.

Wichita County-wide Recreation Program will have its first session Nov. 19 at the 4-H Club Center from 7:00 until 9:30 p.m.

Wichita County Farm Bureau is sponsoring this program for 4-H club members of the county. The 4-H County Council voted unanimously to accept the Farm Bureau proposal for such a project. There will be folk games, square dancing, singing and other games for 4-H members and their parents. In fact, parents are urged to attend and join in the fun.
These programs are planned for the third Saturday of each month.
There are plans for a county-wide Christmas supper preceding the December program. Also, plans for the future include amateur programs for participation of talented 4-H club members.

County agents Thelma Wirges, B. T. Haws, Allen Turner and Nellie Cobb will help supervise this recreational project.

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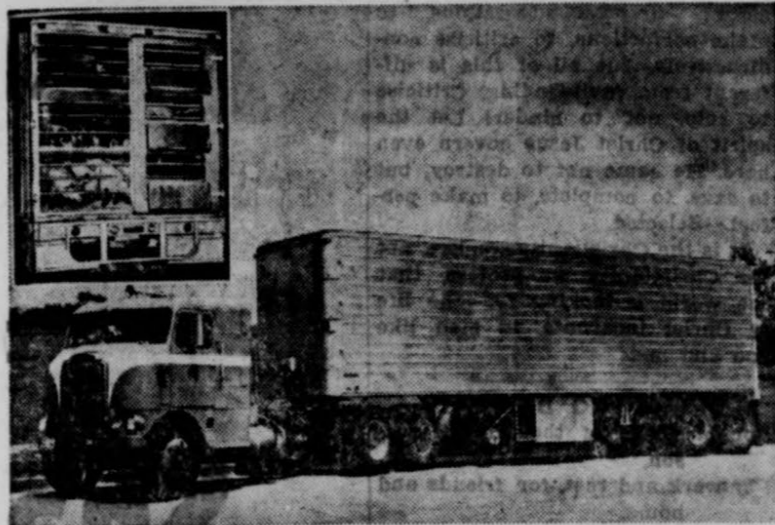
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Deluxe Transportation For Hogs



Nothing is too good in the way of transportation for top quality hogs being hauled from Omaha, Nebraska, to cities on the West Coast. Shown here is a Fruehauf Volume Van semi-trailer with special refrigerated and air-conditioning unit and triple decks designed by Harry Campbell and Sons in conjunction with the Service Department of the Omaha Branch of the Fruehauf Trailer Company and Sterling Refrigeration & Engineering Company, also of Omaha. Two trailers of this type are successfully in operation at present.

Putting it mildly, this is an unusual hauling operation. The purpose of these trailers is for live hog haul to West Coast and capable of handling perishable and frozen products on the return trip.

The special five-ton capacity Sterling refrigeration unit is capable of changing air in the trailers three times each minute, thus furnishing fresh air flow with temperature control for live animals. Desired temperature can be maintained on the return load for perishable or frozen cargoes.

Because of the triple deck installation the operator can carry such highly perishable products as cut flowers. Needless to say there is quite a contrast between the outgoing and returning loads.
