## 'Martin Luther' To Be Shown Here 4 Times

"Martin Luther," the half-million dollar feature film produced in western Germany, will be shown in Iowa Park on Saturday, Sunday and Monday evenings, Nov. 5, 6 and 7.

Based on the life of the 16th century monk who defied excommunication and the stake in his demand for religious reform, "Martin Luther" provides the first motion picture portrayal of the beginning of the Protestant Reformation.

This full length sound feature has been made available to churches by the Lutheran Church Productions. The print shown here is made possible by the presbytery of Dallas and Rev. Wm. Lowry Walker of the local Presbyterian church will be in charge of the showings.

The picture will be shown at the Church of God at 7:30 p.m. Saturday. It will be shown at the Presbyterian church at 7:00 p.m. Sunday and twice on Monday, at 6:00 and 8:00 p.m.

Mr. Walker says this schedule has been worked out to make it possible for everyone in Iowa Park who wishes to do so, to see "Martin Luther."

"There will be no charge for any of the showings," says Walker. "On Sunday and Monday, receptacles will be placed in the vestibules of the church if anyone desires to make a contribution. All money will go to the presbytery of Dallas to defray expense of purchase and upkeep of the film. We want to emphasize that no one is asked for a contribution. We are interested only in having as many as possible to see the picture."

Mrs. Dedeke was graduated from San Marcos high school in 1933 and is now a junior elementary education student at Southwest Texas State in San Marcos.

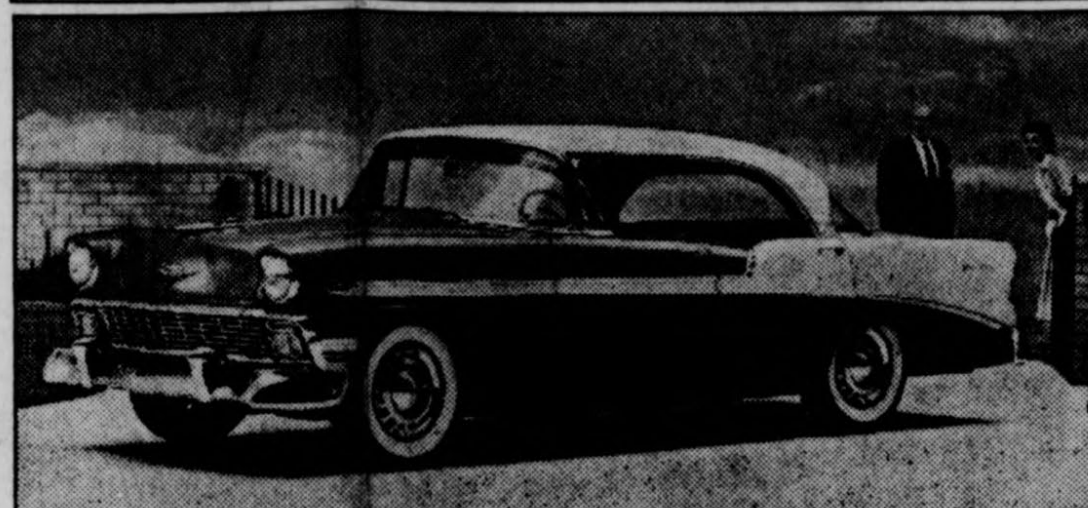

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## School Board Sets Date, Nov. 19, For Vote on Building Bond Issue

The board of education of Iowa Park schools met October 28 to consider a petition presented to them by some 45 qualified tax-paying voters of Iowa Park Independent School District, petitioning them to call an election for Saturday, November 19, 1955, to vote on a bond issue for a total of \$250,000 for the purpose of constructing a new physical education plant, a new band hall and a new grade school building.

It is planned now to sell only enough bonds to build the physical training plant and band hall immediately, and plan to build the new grade school building at a later date.

By voting the bond issue all together it is expected that the school will effect a saving on interest rates to aid the taxpayer.

The school board has visited all of the new school buildings in our general area of North Texas and southern Oklahoma. The members after having visited these other schools realized anew how inadequate our present physical training facilities are.

Mrs. Gilliland reported attendance award winners for the meeting were: Mrs. Wernington's 1st grade, with 26 per cent; and Mmes. Mrs. Cecil Marquart was named alternate to Mrs. Brubaker to the state convention.

Parents were reminded of observance of American School Week which will begin Nov. 7, and were urged to visit classrooms, eat in the cafeteria and consult with the teachers about any matter that will promote better understanding of duty and responsibility between parent, child and teacher.

### ORDINANCE NO. 94

State of Texas  
County of Wichita  
City of Iowa Park.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas, on this the 31st day of October, 1955, with all members of the Council being present with the Mayor, that Ordinance No. 94 be, and the same is hereby amended to read as follows:

1. It shall be unlawful for any Minor person to be upon the streets of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, after the hours of eleven o'clock p.m., unless such minor is accompanied by a parent or legal Guardian, or is enroute to or from a place where such minor is employed.

2. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars.

3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.

4. Passed by unanimous action of the City Council of the City of Iowa Park, Texas, on this the 31st day of October, A.D. 1955.

## Soil Conservation

Joe Cunningham of Wichita Falls and owner of an 875-acre ranch 3 miles west of Iowa Park has been selected as the farmer or rancher doing the best job of Wildlife Conservation in the Wilbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation district.

Supervisors are sending his accomplishments to the Wildlife Awards program sponsored by Frank M. Wood in co-operation with soil conservation districts.

Wildlife conservation has been accomplished by sound land use and range management, according to district supervisors. A system of mesquite control by dozing and chemical control has provided large amounts of woody cover. Range and control of grazing have provided large amounts of grass cover. Use of manure and grass seed on diversions and dams have provided cover and feed for game.

There are eight ponds on the ranch, six of which have been stocked with fish. A cultivated field between pastures provides a border of feed and additional cover.

Quail have been harvested in quantities that left eight birds per covey.

Cunningham's program can be summed up as having sound land use and good range management that, with stocking of farm ponds, provide a balance in nature between native plants and wildlife.

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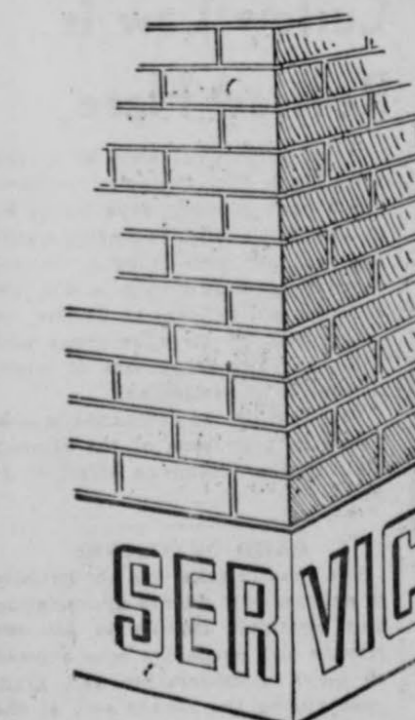
