Heavy Rains Bless Iowa Park Area

Last Sunday found this area receiving a large amount of rain. It seemed the skies had opened up and poured.

In a 24 hour period Iowa Park reported between 4½ and 5 inches of precipitation. Oldtimers say it has never before rained so much in that length of time.

Anyway it put water into our two city lakes. In fact Lake Iowa Park is at its highest level, being 1030½ feet above sea level. Clifford Roberts says the rain added 5½ feet of water. He says there is now 13½ feet of usable water in Lake Iowa Park.

The city lake has had more water in the earlier days, but that was before so many stock tanks were constructed on the watershed.

Wichita river was brimful and Buffalo creek got out of banks, but traffic on Kamay road was able to get through. Water covered the highway to Wichita Falls in several places, but not deeply enough to be serious.

Hawks Outlast Burk In Scoring Duel, 18-12

Iowa Park Hawks are working at the Fair this week instead of playing football. They will return to combat next Friday night at Crowell.

Iowa Park has the best prospective season on tap for many years, having played three and won by convincing scores.

Hardest game of all was the Burk tilt last Friday night in the Bulldog stadium, where they fashioned an 18-12 victory.

The first quarter was strictly a defensive period, with neither side having an advantage. Midway in the second period the Bulldogs got the ball on downs on the Iowa Park 25. From there they carried over in 8 plays.

Hawks evened the score shortly with an 11 yard pass play from Harvey Klinkerman to Lynn Hensley, and the halftime saw the score 6 to 6.

Burk and Iowa Park scored in the third quarter, with Don Daugherty taking another Klinkerman pass to tie up the game.

With less than four minutes to go, Klinkerman sneaked through the Bulldog line for the clincher. No conversion attempts were successful for either team.

Coaches Covington and Reese and a large crowd of fans gave unstinted praise to the Hawks for their fine showing. The coaches said "Every boy on the team played good ball and gave his best."

Iowa Park volunteer firemen arrived on the scene and brought the fire under control, but the explosion had damaged the house so badly there was no saving it from a total loss.

The Warrens were building the house and living in it and the house trailer. The location is at the junction of Pleasant Valley road and the Wichita Falls farm to market road in the Valley Farms.

Dr. Carter pronounced the benediction.

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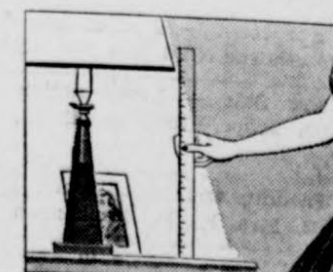

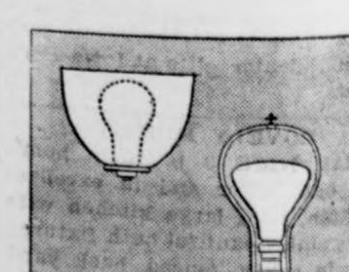

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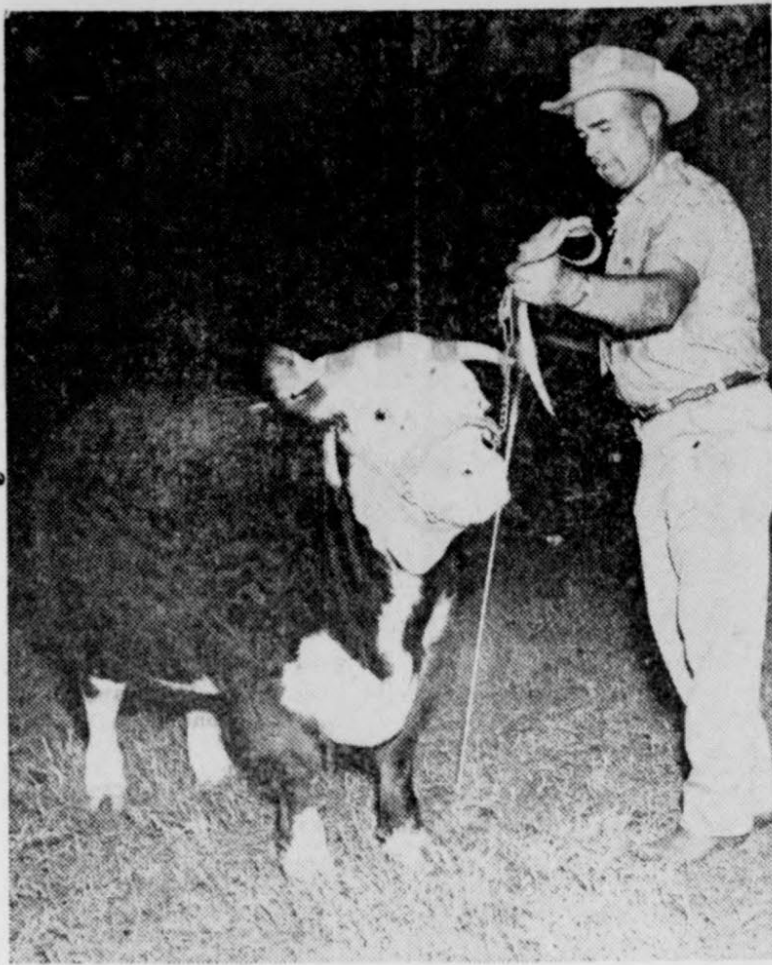
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Parade Was Crowd Pleaser

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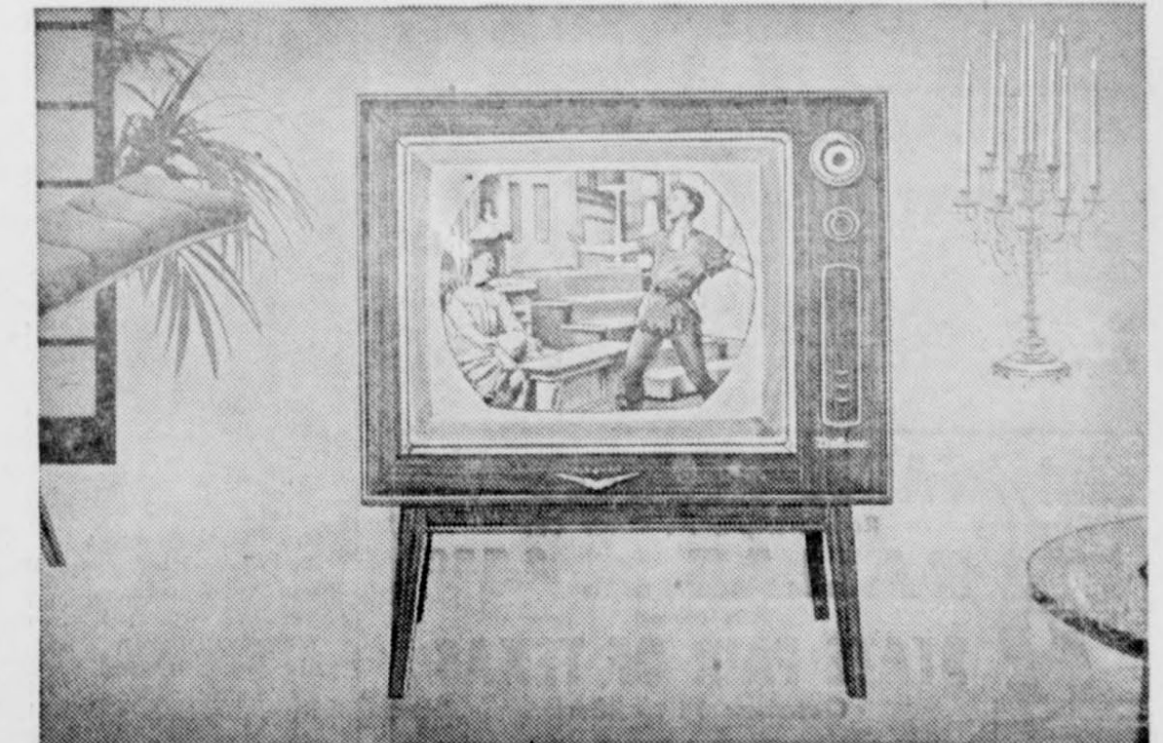

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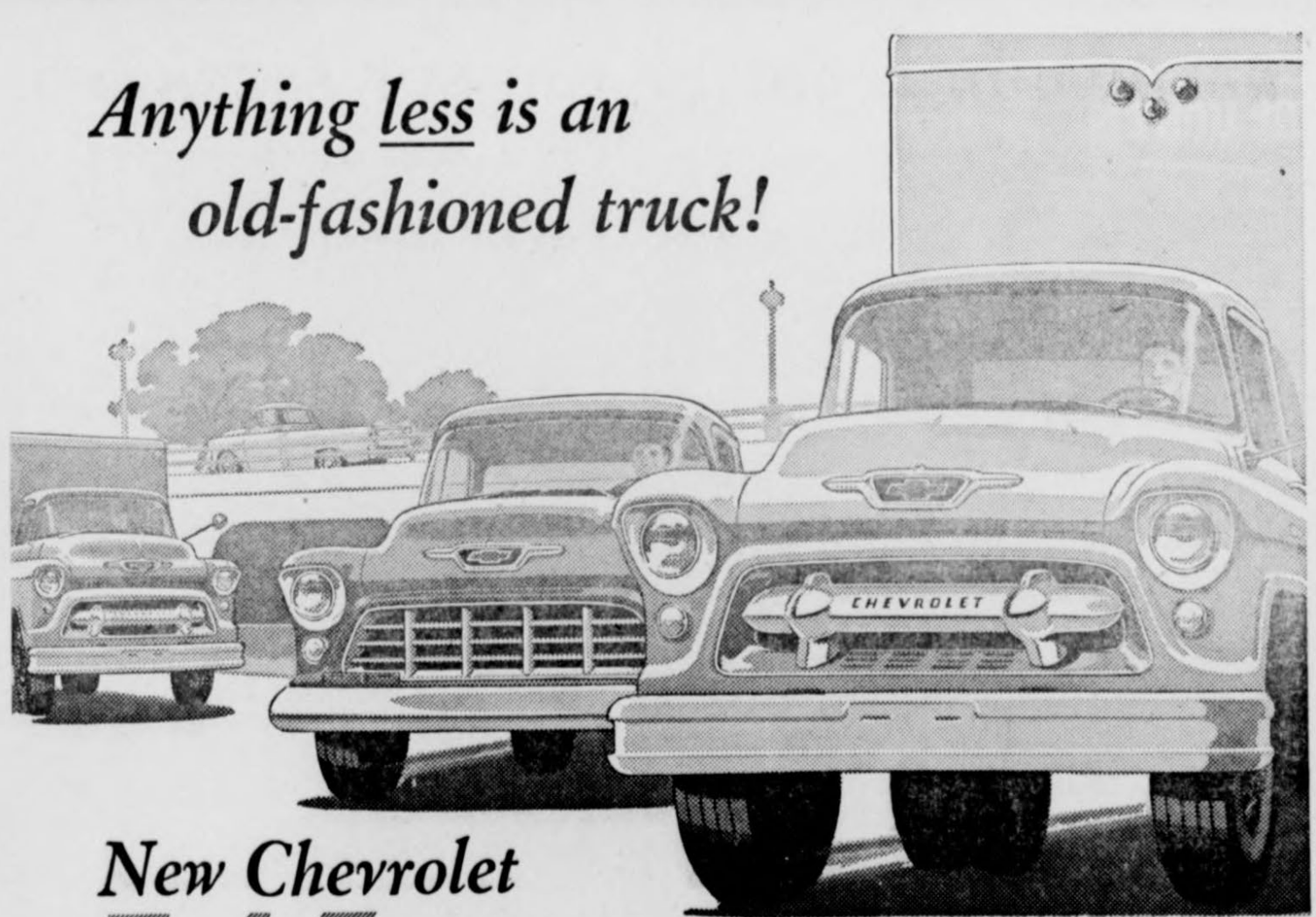
