Billy Jo and small son Cecil were in a pickup pulling the family house trailer, with Mary Ann and the other two children following in their car.

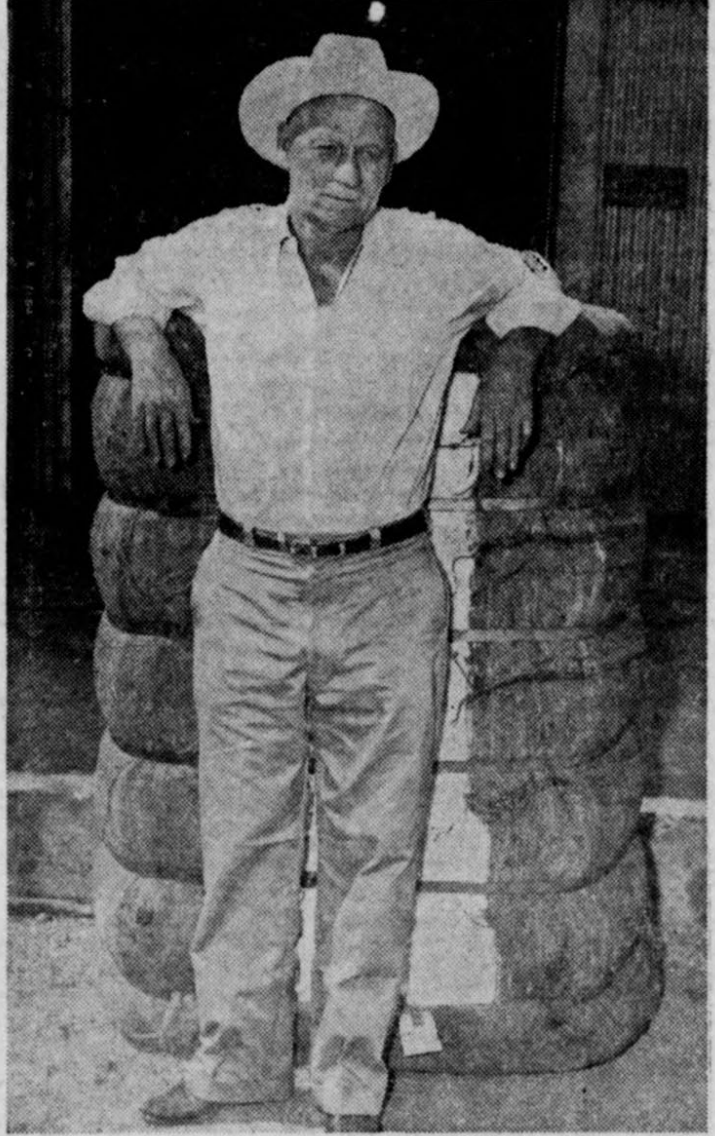

## Iowa Park Man, B. J. (Red) Mills, Produces First 1955 Bale of Cotton in Wichita County

The honor of producing the first bale of cotton for the 1955 season in Wichita county goes to an Iowa Park man, B. J. Mills, who lives about 3 1/2 miles east of here on Highway 287.

Mr. Mills planted his Half and Half cotton on April 17 just north of Gichrist airport about 3 miles from Iowa Park. He finished picking the bale Tuesday of this week and took it to Burkburnett for ginning.

The 1890 pound load turned out 460 pounds of strict middling lint and 860 pounds of seed.

In honor of the first bale received this season, the Burkburnett chamber of commerce gave Mr. Mills a check for \$25.

The first bale ginned in the county this year came to Wichita Falls but was produced in Clay county.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon at Terrell with interment at Elmo.





## Air Force Reservist Trains and Works in Same SAFB Outfit

Most men think of reserve training as a change in activity—and going off to a distant base. Not so with M-Sgt. Lowell D. Short of Iowa Park and Sheppard AFB. Mr. Short is taking his reserve training at Sheppard, where he works the remainder of the year. Member of the 9828th Air Reserve squadron, Wichita Falls, he is assigned for a 15-day training period to the Periodic Inspection, Aircraft Maintenance, 3750th Field Maintenance squadron.

As a civilian he works in this outfit as an aircraft maintenance instructor. He checks all flyable aircraft after periodic inspection and major repair, maintenance inspecting forms, record systems and the over-all flight line function for management and safety. All reports are submitted to chief of maintenance for evaluation.

The air force reserve honors both his military and civilian experience for up-grade in AFSC. He is one of four master sergeants in the reserve squadron at Wichita Falls and assists reservists in training.

Lowell attended the A&E school at Sheppard for special courses in '50, '51 and '52. He began his military career when he came to Wichita Falls in July 1941 with the first cadre from Chanute AFB in Illinois.

These men lived in tents pitched south of Wichita Engineering until barracks were built. They moved into Building 865, the first barracks completed. Several of the original company are still living in and around Wichita Falls. Mr. Short later toured South America with the Sixth Air Force. He recalls the excellent flying safety record at Sheppard since 1948, remembering only two fatal and five minor accidents.

He was married to the former Miss Tinky Van Horn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Van Horn, on May 3, 1942, and they have made Iowa Park their home ever since. The Shorts have three children: Jimmie, Suzy and Bobby.

Lowell is originally from Atlanta, Ill., where he graduated from high school in 1940. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Short of Atlanta.
