Dr. Henry A. Sholle, state health officer, reports that the second inoculation of first and second grade pupils against poliomyelitis has been completed in most areas of Texas. About 70 per cent of those receiving first shots were on hand to receive the second round.

It is hoped that vaccine will soon be available for use by private 4p physicians to immunize those not eligible under the national program. Under this plan, use of the vaccine has been limited mostly to children in the first two grades.

Most men think of reserve training as a change in activity-and going off to a distant base. Not so with M-Sgt. Lowell D. Short of Iowa Park and Sheppard AFB.

Mr. Short is taking his reserve training at Sheppard, where he works the remainder of the year. Member of the 9826th Air Reserve squadron, Wichita Falls, h is assigned for a 15-day training period to the Periodic Inspection Aircraft Maintenance, 3750th Field Maintenance squadron.

As a civilian he works in this outfit as an aircraft maintenance instructor. He checks all flyable craft after periodic inspection and major repair, maintenance inspecting forms, record systems and the over-all flight line function for management and safety. All reports are submitted to chief of maintenance for evaluation.

The air force reserve honors both his military and civilian experience for up-grade in AFSC. He is one of four master sergeants in the reserve squadron at Wichita Falls and assists reservists in training. Lowell attended the A&E school at Sheppard for special courses in '50, '51 and '52. He began his military career when he came to Wichita Falls in July 1941 with the








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New Soil Pipe Standards Mean Better Quality and Lower Costs

C .- Lower ultimate building costs and home-owner protection from inferior sanitary plumbing are being pre-dicted by the Cast Iron Soil Pipe Institute with the announcement of its new 'C. I.' standards. Henceforth, the Institute's 'C. I.' seal on soil pipe and fittings of member companies will indicate that they meet these rigid regulations.

The Institute represents about \$80\% of the industry's production

80% of the industry's production.
Soil pipe is the basic artery of cleanliness in all modern buildings. It carries away soil and wastes from the bathroom, kitchen and other locations. This sanitary disposal system includes the waste, vent and sewage lines in-side a building and the house or


building sewer to the street. Reduced costs will be possible, say Institute officials, because 'C. I.' regulations standardize soil pipe and fittings in only two

weights, service and extra heavy Four weights were common in the past. They claim that two weights are bringing about savings in pipe manufacturing and distri-bution. These savings are bene-

fiting homeowners.

The Institute expects additional savings from the nationwide savings from the nationwide standardization of cast iron soil pipe and fitting dimensions under the new 'C. I.' program because according to industry spokesmen products made by different manu-facturers will be interchangeable. They also advise that the new specifications are improving quality.

"Final success of the program depends on whether homeowners, plumbing contractors and inspectors, architects and engineers request cast iron soil pipe and fit-tings with the 'C. I.' seal," emphasized Homer E. Robertson, Institute executive vice-president,

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

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


