

Among the things seen was the first land irrigated under assistance furnished by the Wil-District, and fall seeded wheat on land having previously been cropped to three years of alfalfa. It will be worthwhile to check the yields on this crop next June.

This year about 19,000 bales of alfalfa were produced, along with about 140 tons of sorghum ensilage. At this time a seeding of oats and alfalfa for next year's hay crop is good and has enough growth to furnish winter grazing.
