### Gayle Park, Civic Business Leader, Dies Sunday Morning

Funeral services for Gayle Park, 56, were held Monday afternoon, Dec. 1, at 3:00 from the First Presbyterian church with Rev. M. C. Yeargan, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.  
 Gayle died at his home on the Wichita highway Sunday morning at 9:30 after being in ill health for about a year. He suffered a stroke two weeks ago from which he never recovered.  
 Mr. Park was born in Oxford, Miss., on May 15, 1896 and lived there until he entered the armed service in the first World War. He moved to Iowa Park in the fall of 1919, and in 1926 he married the former Miss Beth Lowrance, a member of a pioneer family here.  
 He was associated with the John B. Barbour Trucking company for about 12 years. At the time of his death Gayle was a dirt construction contractor.  
 Mr. Park was active in church and community affairs until illness caused him to give up most of his activities. He was a charter member of the Iowa Park Lions club and was on the Presbyterian church board of deacons. He has served on the city council and the Chamber of Commerce.  
 Everyone that knew Gayle often remarked how devoted he was to his family.  
 Pallbearers were Burk Scott, Leys Barbour, Tom Corridon, Forrest Bates, John B. Barbour, all of Iowa Park, Herman Mitchell of Wichita Falls, and Graham Purcell of Archer City. Classmates of his daughter Mary Gayle formed an honor guard.  
 Mr. Park is survived by the widow, two daughters Frances and Mary Gayle; three brothers R. T. Aranas Pass, James of Oxford, and Wade, formerly of Iowa Park and now of Sardas, Miss.; and one sister Mrs. Lalla McIntosh of Hernandez, Miss.

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 Funeral services were held on Thursday at White Deer with burial in the Pampa cemetery.  
 Mr. Culbertson moved here from Waxahachie in the early 1890's. In 1899 he was married to Miss Maggie George, sister of J. N. and W. F. George. He farmed north of town until 1919, when he moved to White Deer. Each year he has been an enthusiastic pioneer at Texas-Oklahoma Fair.

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### Leonard Luckett, Son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Luckett, Awarded an All-Expense Trip to Chicago for the 31st Annual 4-H Stock Show

Leonard Luckett, son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Luckett, was awarded an all-expense trip to Chicago for the 31st annual 4-H stock show. His party left last Saturday.  
 Jay Bryan, assistant county agent, and Mrs. Bryan accompanied Leonard from Wichita county, Gerhardt Jentsch from Archer county and Gabe Davis of Clay county. The City National Bank of Wichita Falls presented these three boys the trip on their projects, record books, leadership and citizenship.  
 These awards were presented at a banquet held in October at Midwestern student center.  
 Young Luckett started his 4-H work in 1948 with 50 chickens given him by the Chamber of Commerce. He returned six of these to T. J. Paces, who was his sponsor.  
 In 1949 his father gave him a beef cow. She brought a calf that year and he sold it.  
 In 1950 his beef cow brought another calf. He also bought a dairy cow. That year Leonard attended a stock show in Houston, where he almost won a calf in a calf scramble. The calf got away and Hubert Turner of the United Gas company in Houston gave him the money to buy it back. He sold this calf the next year when he returned to Houston for the stock show.  
 In 1951 Leonard owned the beef cow, two calves, two rabbits given him through the 4-H, two beef calves. He bought one of the beef calves and Hubert Turner gave him the other. Leonard showed one of these calves at Houston and one at Wichita Falls.  
 By 1952 his herd was growing. He now has a beef cow and two calves, two commercial steers, two dairy cows, a dairy heifer, two baby beef calves and one rabbit (one of the rabbits died).  
 Two of his calves placed 5th and 8th at the Texas-Oklahoma Fair this year.  
 Leonard was born in Iowa Park and has lived here all his life except while his father was serving in the See Bees in World War II. He and his mother lived in Richmond, Calif., during that time.  
 The family moved back in 1947 and Leonard entered the 6th grade. Leonard has been a member of the Hawk football and basketball teams and is now a junior in high school. He is president of the 4-H club which meets at the Community House in Valley Farms.  
 While in Chicago these boys and Mr. and Mrs. Bryan will attend the stock show and will take sight-seeing trips. They will return some time next week.

Funeral services for Mrs. Georgina Wells, 79, were conducted Wednesday morning, Dec. 3, at 10:30 in the Methodist church with Rev. Guy E. Perdue, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Riverside cemetery in Wichita Falls under direction of Tanner Funeral Home, Iowa Park.  
 Mrs. Wells had been in ill health about five years. She suffered a heart attack Sunday night and was rushed to a hospital in Wichita Falls, where she died Tuesday at 1:20 a.m.  
 Mrs. Wells was born July 18, 1873, in Dayton, Mo., one of eight children of Mr. and Mrs. George Bush. In 1910 she moved to Chanute, Kans., where she owned and operated the Georgina Wells Ladies Apparel Shoppe, a store of exclusive and original wearing apparel.  
 After suffering a slight heart attack in 1941 she sold her shop and moved to Iowa Park. Here she was a member of the Methodist church and of the Suzanne Sunday School class, Order of the Eastern Star, and was a member of the 23 Study club until she became ill and resigned.  
 Mrs. Wells is survived by one son Frank Wood of Holsington, Kans.; one daughter Mrs. Charlie Coppock of Iowa Park, and a sister Mrs. Fannie Freeman, Catalina Island.

### Soil Conservation

Believe it or no, there is a Wichita Valley dairyman selling hay.  
 Upon entering the Rufus King farm located a mile north of Kamay, lightly grazed Kentucky fescuegrass on your left and common bermuda on the right raise the question, "Why doesn't he graze it?" The answer is down the farm road: another field of fescuegrass is furnishing all the grazing need by King's dairy herd.  
 Recently Fred Parkey, Lester Brooks and Elvy Sargent toured the farm with Rufus explaining his operation. Among the things seen was the first land irrigated under assistance furnished by the Willbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District and fall seeded wheat on land having previously been cropped to three years of alfalfa. It will be worthwhile to check the yields on this crop next June.  
 This year about 19,000 bales of alfalfa were produced, along with about 140 tons of sorghum ensilage. At this time a seeding of oats and alfalfa for next year's hay crop is good and has enough growth to furnish winter grazing.  
 Fescuegrass and alfalfa mixture showed good response to an application of 200 pounds per acre of 16-20-0 fertilizer.  
 King pointed out to his visitors the corrections and additions he expects to make in his irrigation system between crops next summer.  
 How much outside feed would be needed in the county if all similar land produced as the King land does?

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### Indoor Golf Course At Wichita Falls Built by Park Men

The Vermont Street Indoor Golf just off Iowa Park highway in Wichita Falls offers something new in the way of recreation for the winter months.  
 The golf course is housed in a fireproof masonry building with everything painted in bright cheerful colors. Golf course rugging is on the fairways and greens.  
 The building is heated to a comfortable temperature, and golf can be played on the course in all kinds of weather.  
 The proprietors, W. G. Shipman and Joel Spruill, formerly of Iowa Park, say, "We have been asked where we got the idea of an indoor golf course. It was from expressions that different people made last summer on the outdoor course we operated. Golf is played the year round in tropical climates, so why not make it possible to play it here in any kind of weather by building it indoors?"  
 "That called for a lot of planning and building gadgets that would make the course interesting. By asking for suggestions, we came up with more than we could use on an 18 hole course. Then there was the question of playing on a concrete floor. We knew that would not be practical, so we decided rugs on the fairways and greens would solve that problem, and it did."  
 "We've finally wound up with one of the most complete and up-to-date 18 hole courses that can be found, and so far as we have been able to learn, it is the only indoors golf layout. At least it is something new in this part of the country."  
 The course is one-half block south of Iowa Park highway, two blocks west of Sheppard Access signal light and across street from the M and V Tank company.  
 "We invite you to bring your parties and join the fun," concluded the partners.

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### Film Explains Fight Against Tuberculosis

Introduced by Curtis Sewell, Miss Margaret Hall, secretary of the Wichita county Tuberculosis association, presented the program for this week's meeting of the Lions club.  
 A film, "The Inside Story," was shown by Miss Hall, which revealed means of transmitting the tubercle bacilli, ways of detecting infection in early stages before fatal damage is done. The film also explained modern treatment of the disease, pointing out that rest is still considered most important.  
 Dr. John L. Steele, Iowa Park chairman of the Christmas Seal sale, urged that people send in their money for seals. He stressed the importance of preventive work being done with funds received through sale of the seals.

### Government Will Aid In Legume Program

Wichita county farmers desiring to plant Austrian winter peas or hairy vetch may do so until Dec. 21 under the 1952 program, Bob Crocker, administrative officer of the county Production and Marketing Administration, announces.  
 Planting cannot be done under purchase order now but the farmer can get prior approval and if he gets a good stand will receive payment through PMA.  
 Bob said if winter legumes are planted late the farmer must take the entire risk of getting a good stand. He added, however, that this is ideal weather for planting of the two legumes.  
 Pea and vetch seed are available in the county and farmers probably can get all the seed needed locally. Those who wish to plant are asked to contact the PMA at Iowa Park and get prior approval. They will also be advised where they can get seed.


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
