

The Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors met at the City Hall on Tuesday evening for their final regular meeting for this year. President J. C. Horn was in charge of the meeting. Others present were O. R. Kelly, Carl Walsh (successor to L. C. Minich), Fred Parkey, W. R. Pastusek, Sam H. Hill (successor to I. A. Campsey), W. A. George, Edd Hiesermann, Curtis Sewell, R. R. Brubaker, and the secretary Mrs. M. C. Yeargan. W. A. George, chairman of arrangements for the banquet committee, made a report in detail. Sam H. Hill, chairman of the merchants committee, made the report on the Christmas Party. W. R. Pastusek reported on the visit of Santa Claus. All bills were paid.

A report on the Christmas street lights was made by the secretary. Whether to rent the lights from year to year or buy them outright was a matter for serious discussion. Christmas lights for West Park Avenue were also planned. The directors voted to buy outright the Christmas street lights.

The City of Iowa Park agreed to pay the street light bills and for the master switch.

The resignation of M. L. Hines was accepted and Richard Hill was elected to succeed Mr. Hines. The director-at-large to be elected by the directors at their December meeting, according to the new constitution, was Arch Hughes.



to prevent a flood on the kitchen

Take the problem of mass hunger in Europe today. Men will work out the long range solution to enable the countries of Europe and Asia to once again become selfstaining food producers for their populations. But, while they are busy working out over-all plans for the next five to twenty years, a lot of kids are going to starve or contract a lot of crippling and deadly diseases for lack of essential foods.
