

Certain changes in charges and practices pertaining to long distance calls within the State of Texas will be made effective September 1, 1951.

#### Basic Station-to-Station Day Rates

There will be increases on only 124 of the 815 mileage distances. In no case will the increase amount to more than 5 cents for the initial period of conversation on day stationto-station calls. There will be no increases in the station-tostation day rates over 202 miles.

#### Station-to-Station Night and Sunday Rates

A discount of approximately 20 per cent from the stationto-station day rate will continue to apply on all station-tostation calls costing over 50 cents completed during night hours and all day Sunday.

#### Person-to-Person Day Rates

Rates for person-to-person calls, which cost more to handle. are based upon the station-to-station rates. The differential will be 50 per cent instead of the present 40 per cent. The minimum differential of 15c will be continued.

#### Person-to-Person Night and Sunday Rates







proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shail have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are needy assed persons over the age of sixty-five (55) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (530,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (542,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (530) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United State of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions, restrictions, and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmute of any State-supported institution, while such immate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediation; provided, that if such propert

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years: provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the Stats for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth: provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal Indis; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children
