Reta Gail Capehart, 5 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Capehart, died in Wichita General hospital early Saturday morning after a few days illness.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon, July 1, in the First Baptist church of Iowa Park. The body lay in state for an hour before the services. Rev. Homer Thompson, pastor, officiated.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Bud Mitchell, Al Reed, Tom Barnett, Carl Walsh.

Reta was born Jan. 27, 1952, at Wichita General. She and her parents lived here until August of last year, moving to Taft, Calif.

The family moved back in January to their home on West Magnolia. Billy is employed with the Cox Drilling company.

Recently Bob Carpenter of the Mineral Detector company of Wichita Falls appeared as guest speaker for the Evening Lions club. Jack Payne and Don Hatfield, students at Midwestern university, assisted Carpenter in the mineral display. He spoke on "Uranium."

He told what uranium is, where it is found and how it is used. One of the largest known deposits is in the Colorado plateau country. Here lies one of America's greatest power reserves. It now has some 600 uranium mines in operation with over 3,000 people engaged in their operation.

Carpenter said Texas is known to contain large reserves of low-grade lignite. Uranium is used for atomic energy, in the oil industry, for medical purposes and to operate electric power plants. "Within 20 years," said Carpenter, "about twice as much electric power will be furnished by the atom as now is generated by water power."

He gave a demonstration of radiation instruments for locating uranium, for oil exploration and for laboratory and civil defense use. These instruments are used in airplanes, cars and carried on foot by uranium prospectors. They can be strapped to the body while locating the ore or metal.

Martin and Price Begin Experiment on Beef Fattening

For those of us who are interested in grass and cattle here in the Irrigated Valley, it might be interesting to watch an experiment being conducted on the Martin Hereford ranch 1½ miles south of Iowa Park on Kamay road.

The ranch is owned by Jack H. Martin of Wichita Falls and is managed by Joe C. Price Jr. They became interested in pounds of beef per acre instead of relying on clipping tests. Elvy Sargent of the Soil Conservation Service, and Dr. Carl Gray of Midwestern university, are assisting in water and fertilizer recommendations.

Martin and Price are interested in learning how many pounds of beef can be produced per acre on coastal bermuda grass under irrigation, with application of fertilizer and under proper management-grazing rotation.

They have 27 steers on 8.1 acres of coastal bermuda. The pasture is divided into three tracts and the steers graze each tract seven days, while the other two are being fertilized and irrigated, and are then transferred to the next tract.

The steers were weighed when they went on the grass and will be weighed again this fall when they come off. Complete records are being kept, and when the experiment is completed will reveal if it is practical.

Butch, son of Mr. and Mrs. Finis S. Tidwell, was dead on arrival in Wichita General hospital at 2:50 p.m. He was carried to the hospital by Tanner ambulance from the W. E. Karstetter residence in Iowa Park. He would have been 17 years old on July 4 and was to be a senior in Wichita Falls high school this fall.

Surviving are the parents, a brother Guy; sister Mrs. Raymond Taylor, all of Wichita Falls; and grandparents Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Weatherly of Plainview.

G. H. Montgomery is Editor of our ABUNDANT LIFE magazine. Before joining the ABUNDANT LIFE staff he had this experience.

About 25 years ago, while he was quite a young man, Mr. Montgomery discovered that he was suffering from an inflammation of a large nerve in his hip. His disease was diagnosed as sciatica. In his own words, the story follows:

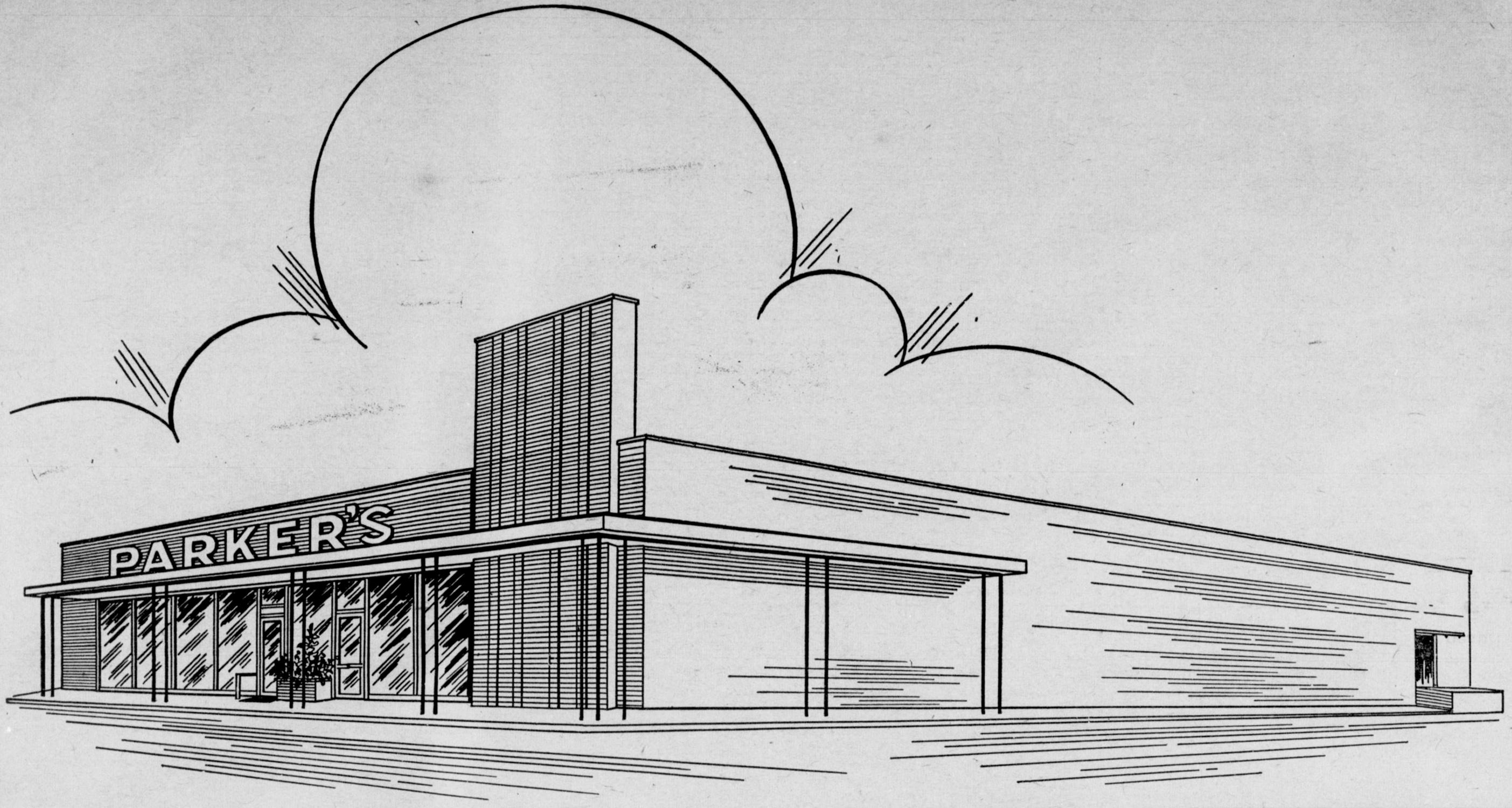
