



Mr. Belote was celebrating his 95th birthday and Mrs. Belote her 84th. The Belotes moved to this area in 1901 and settled on Mrs. Ferguson ranch southwest of town. In 1907 they moved to town and established residence where the Texas-Oklahoma Fair grounds is now located.

In 1908 Mr. Belote purchased a farm east of town from the late Rev. J. W. Morgan, pioneer Baptist minister. They and their two daughters Alma and Ruth moved to the farm. Archer City managed only four first downs, while Iowa Park was piling up 15, but had to be content with a 7-0 victory.

Hawks had a rushing total of 325 yards and completed 9 of 20 passes for another 104. Iowa Park was never forced to punt during the game. Valley View allowed Windthorst a 6-point bulge before tearing into their guests with a 28-point outburst. The Warrior-Trojan contest was a 9-B conference game. Donald Young, Hardy Gage and Jerry Wright figured in the VV scoring, while Richard Wachsmann pushed 4 yards through guard to erase Windthorst's goose-egg.



she had been with their mother Mrs. T. C. Burnam, who is ill.

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
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
