Bob Crocker, ASC office manager, told the county agent recently there had already been between 4500 and 5000 acres of winter legumes signed by farmers to be planted in Wichita county. He said there will probably be an additional 700 acres planted. Principal legumes being planted are Austrian winter peas, Dixie wonder peas and vetch. Pat Morrison reports his 50 acres of Austrian winter peas are already up. He had dusted them in.

Annual 4-H Achievement banquet will be held at the Kemp hotel on Tuesday, Dec. 4. Chancellor M. T. Harrington of A & M college will be principal speaker.

Lice will become a problem on cattle in the near future. Recommended for control measures is 0.5% methoxychlor as a spray. One application is usually sufficient.

He also asserts wise builders build on Christ only (1 Cor. 3:10).

Which foundation are you building upon? Those on the rock believe: Scripture inspired (2 Tim. 3:16-17). Gospel is God's saving power (Rom. 1:16). Salvation is conditional (Heb. 5:9; 11:16). Lord adds saved to church (Acts 2:47). Saved are in the church, not outside (Eph. 2:16). There is one church (1 Cor. 12:20). Unity is commanded (John 17:21, 22; 1 Cor. 1:10). Wear God-given name (Acts 11:26; 1 Pet. 4:16). Must live right (Tit. 2:12). Must meet on first day of week. (Acts 20:7; Heb. 10:25). Maintain true worship (Acts 2:42; Eph. 5:19).

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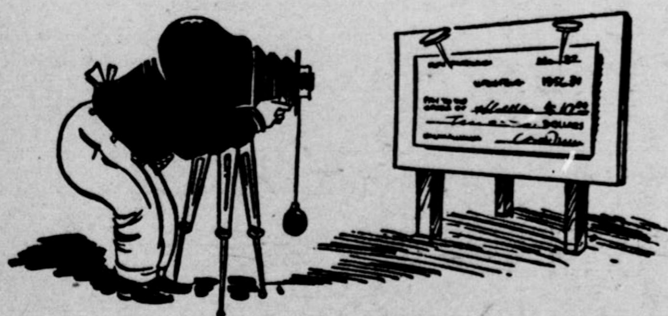

Gas dropped from 14th to 16th in the list of 24 building fire causes, despite an 8.9% increase in gas use. Gas was listed far below any other fuel, including electricity, used in home, business and industry.

While I was there a fussy little guy—a spectator, like me—came up to the foreman on the job and started making all sorts of suggestions: "Shouldn't it go a little farther left there? . . . Why don't you bank the curves more? . . . Those ditches are awful close" . . . and so, on and on.

The foreman took it as long as he could, then asked politely, "How does she look for length?"

From where I sit, free advice is called "free" because it's usually not worth much. That little fellow was typical of the kind of "expert" who can't resist getting in digs—about how you work, what you wear, why you happen to prefer a glass of beer with your supper. People like that don't mean to be troublemakers . . . but the road to real intolerance is paved with their good intentions.
