Little Hawks Drop Title Game, 13-12

Failure to convert after touch-downs cost the Little Hawks the district championship Monday night at Hawk field, before a large and enthusiastic crowd.

Neither Crowell's Wildkittens nor the Little Hawks could muster a scoring drive in the first half, although Crowell pushed to the Iowa Park 5 once before fumbling the ball away. The teams pushed each other around in the center of the field with the defense doing most of the ball playing.

On the first play after the second half kickoff, Bob Barber of the Kittens took a handoff from Jackie Hickman and raced 56 yards with a host of Hawk tacklers in hot pursuit—for a touchdown. Big Gary Carpenter took the ball on an end around that fooled the Hawks for the PAT that was to be the winning point.

The Hawks took the kickoff and couldn't move the ball and were forced to kick. John Woodall got off a nice kick and Bob Barber took it on his own 35. He cut toward the left, got two nice blocks, and raced to the Hawk 25 before being pushed out of bounds.

Three plays later Gary Carpenter, left end, took the ball on an end around and scored. Hickman tried to run the point but was stopped by Jimmie Gard.

The Hawks took the ensuing kickoff and marched for a touchdown on a 2 yard end sweep. David Parkey's running attempt for the bonus point was foiled.

Hawks kicked off and held Crowell. Carpenter went back to kick. He got a bad pass from center and was never able to get the ball away as Jim Gard, John Williamson and Jed Simmons collared him on his 35. John Woodall raced 25 yards to the 10, and on the next play Herman Beavers crashed through the right side of the line for a score. Iowa Park, trying desperately to tie the score, sent Woodall wide to the left, but Crowell withstood the charge and nailed him for no point. Crowell soon fumbled but the Hawks couldn't move. They lost the ball on downs, and then John Williamson came up with another Kitten fumble, and still the Hawks couldn't penetrate the stout defense thrown up by Crowell.

Little Hawks played a great ball game, and it was a tough one to lose. Starring for the Hawks were Woodall and Beaver in the backfield, Gard and Glen Sampley in the line. Other Iowa Park players giving a good account of themselves were Bobby Gilbreath, John Williamson, Jed Simmons, Royce Caddell, Leroy Watts, Thomas McAnally, David Parkey and Burnam.

Dr. William Huddleston has been appointed Iowa Park chairman of the Annual Christmas Seal Sale by Oral Jones of Wichita Falls, general county chairman. A bangle sale will be conducted throughout Wichita county on Dec. 5, 6 and 7.

93,000 pounds of TB-killing materials are going through the mails in Texas this month. By itself the material will not kill tuberculosis, but it provides a means of controlling the disease which yearly causes more deaths than all other infectious and parasitic diseases combined. That disease is tuberculosis.

Those 93,000 pounds are Christmas Seals.

In the 50 years since the first Seal appeared, much has happened to tuberculosis control. Tuberculosis associations are now working slowly but tellingly against the nation's No. 1 killer. The death rate from TB has been cut 68 per cent in the last 10 years.

But not enough has been done to keep the disease from pulling down new patients. Last year more new cases of TB were reported in Texas than were found the year before. Tuberculosis is still a threat, so welcome your Christmas Seals, your own individual package of TB-killing materials.

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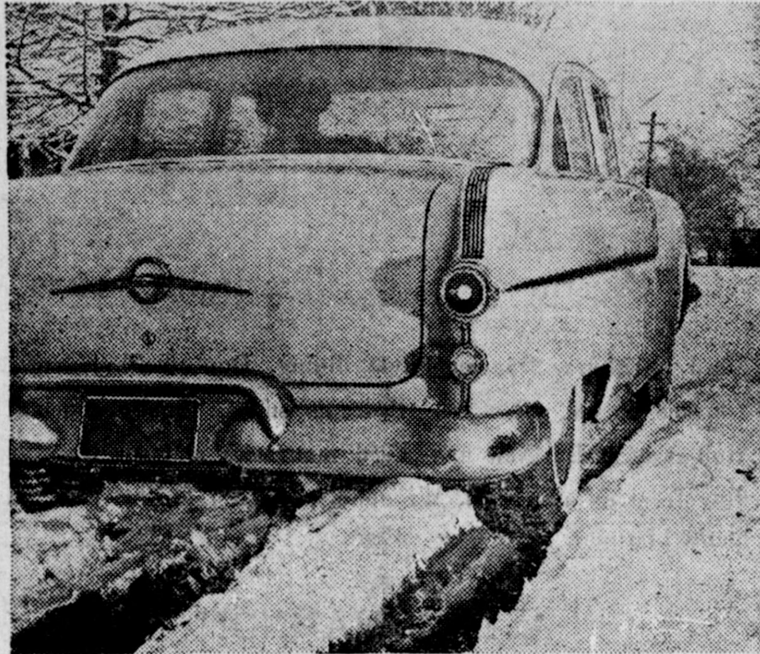
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Survey Shows Use of Winter Tires Has More Than Doubled in Last Four Years



NEW YORK—More than one in every four of the nation's farm trucks and passenger cars rolled on winter tires last year, according to the Rubber Manufacturers Association. Farm drivers led all other segments of the economy in the use of these special tires for bad weather driving.

The RMA, basing its report on a special Crowell-Collier survey, reported that 27 percent of all registered farm vehicles in the truck-passenger classes—used winter tires last year, and predicted even greater usage in the winter ahead.

The survey, first ever made public, showed that winter tire use more than doubled in the past four years. More than 20,000,000 such casings were used during the winter of 1955-56, an estimated 3,743,000 on farm vehicles. The winter tire is an accessory designed to put "automobility" on a year-round basis. It gives added traction and safety under mud and snow driving conditions and eliminates the annoying and time-consuming job of applying other traction aids.

RMA Tire Division Chairman George Flint has noted a significant increase in the use of these special tires in the tier of states bordering on the snow belt where mud rather than snow presents difficult driving problems.

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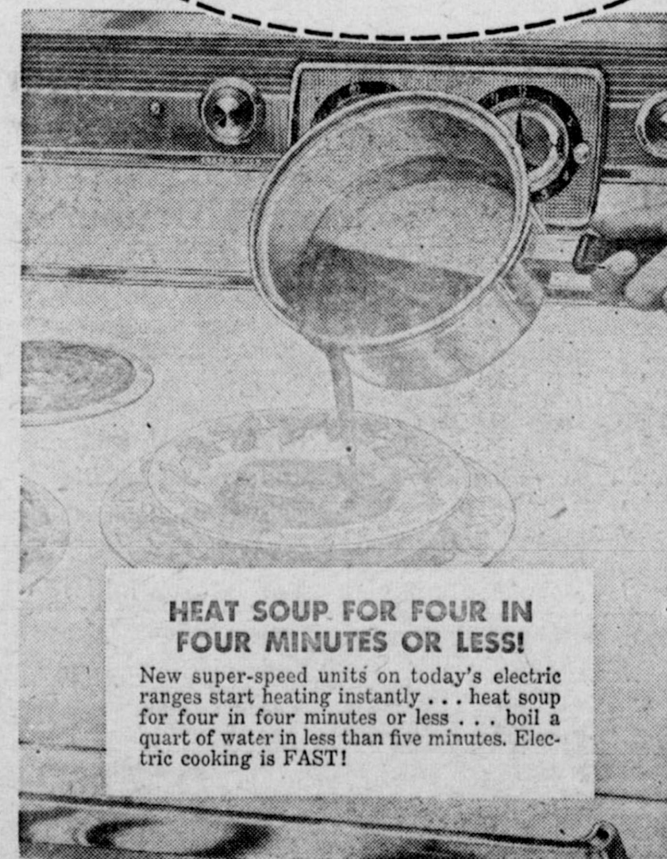

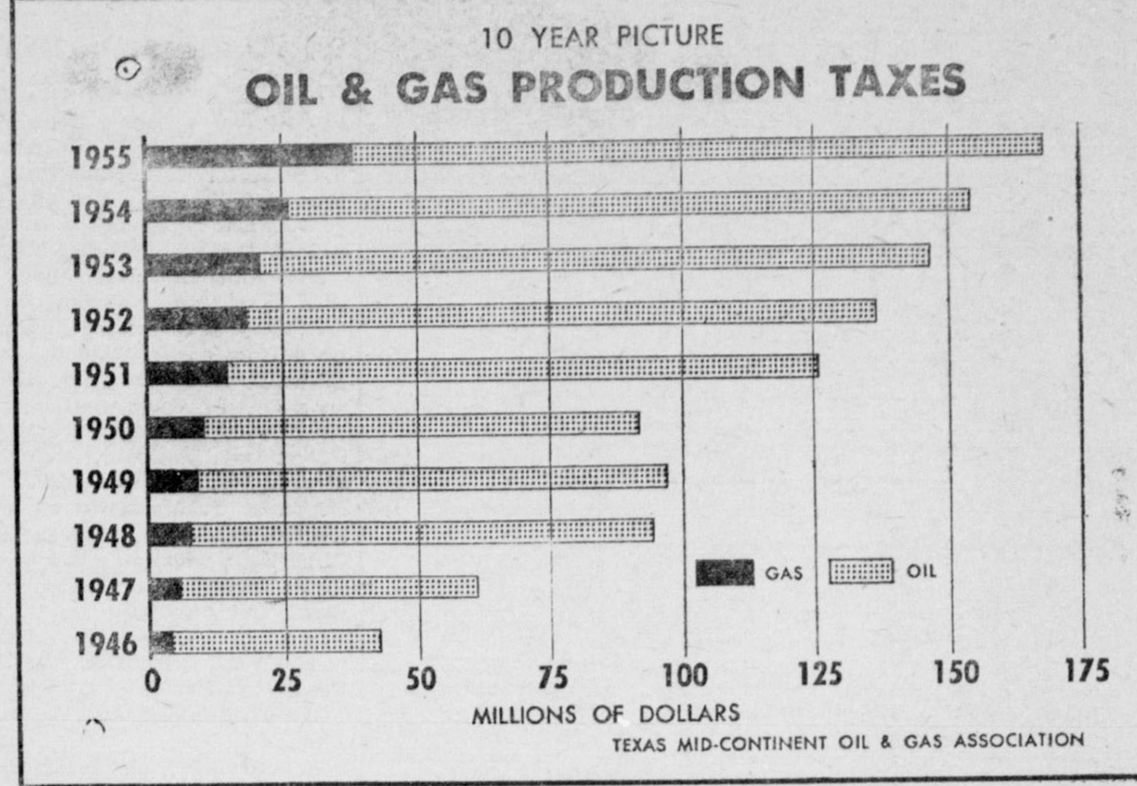
