Jack Austin Dies of Heart Attack

Funeral services for Jack Austin,
34, of Wichita Falls and formerly of
Iowa Park, were conducted
Thursday morning in All Saints
Episcopal church of Wichita Falls.
Burial was in Crestview.

Jack died Tuesday evening fol-
lowing a heart attack at his home
in Wichita Falls. He was pro-
nounced dead on arrival at a hos-
pital.

At the time of his death Jack
was a special sales representative
for Welox Jet Services incorporat-
ed, where he had been employed
since Aug. 1954.

He served as manager for the
Texas-Oklahoma Fair here about
nine years ago. He and his family
resided on West Daisy and at-
tended the Baptist church.

Born April 22, 1922 in Wichita
Falls, Jack attended schools there
and NTSC in Denton and A & M
in College Station.

Surviving are the widow Betty;
two sons Jack Allen, 9, and Joe
Frank, 5; his mother Mrs. Ina
Austin of Wichita Falls, who also
suffered a heart attack the evening
her son died and was admitted to
Wichita General hospital for treat-
ment.

Don't throw away your 1955 pol-
tax receipt yet! There's more vot-
ing to be done. Although the time
of election is next year, it comes
in time to make your 1955 poll tax
or exemption the magic piece of
paper that begins to make you
eligible to cast a ballot.

Then, of course, there is the
small matter of owning taxable
and rendered property within the
city limits of Iowa Park, and fi-
nally having residence within the
city limits.

The election, which is scheduled
for Tuesday, Jan. 8 next, is being
conducted by Wichita County Wa-
ter Control and Improvement Dis-
trict No. 3, for the purpose of
electing two directors to the Board
of Directors.

By a strange kink in the law
regulating such affairs, two of
the requirements for voting in the
election are not present when can-
didates for the offices are to be
considered. From what we can find
out, the candidates for these of-
fices are only required to own tax-
able and rendered property in the
district to be eligible.

Anyhow, filing for these posi-
tions can be made anytime before
6:00 p.m. January 1. All you folk
who are itching for such jobs
are directed to John E. Barbour,
secretary of the board, where your
application for a place on the bal-
lot will be accepted.

The terms of Floyd White and
Dr. C. J. Simpson are to be filled
by the January 8 election; hold-
over members are F. E. Hill, John
E. Barbour and Herman Mitchell.

Incidentally, the boundaries of
WCWC&ID No. 3 are identical with
the city limits of Iowa Park.

TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:
When figuring your income tax
you want to remember that Texas
is a community property state. It
may come as a shock to your wife,
but she only gets half of what you
and she together made. For tax
purposes the wife can only have
half—not all.

If your wife worked and she
files a separate tax return, she
must show one-half of the commu-
nity income of both husband and
wife. She also takes credit for
paying one-half the withholding
tax. You can expect a tax audit if
the wife files a separate tax return
claiming a refund for the with-
holding tax she paid and then the
husband files a joint return and
does not include the wife's income
and uses the wife's exemption. You
can't do that.

Speeding Tops Violations

Patrolmen of the Wichita Falls
district of the highway patrol con-
tacted 2810 traffic law violators
during November. Capt. K. B. Hall-
mark jr., commanding officer, re-
ports, 780 of these were arrested
while 2,030 were warned.

Speeding was the leading cause
of arrest, with improper passing
and wrong side of the road were
second and third.

Counties in the district are Ar-
cher, Baylor, Clay, Cottle, Harde-
man, King, Knox, Montague, Wi-
chita, Wilbarger and Young.

In Wichita county the patrol in-
vestigated 33 accidents with the
following breakdown: 28 property
damage, 6 personal injury, and 1
fatal accidents.

Property damage was \$14,006,
with 7 persons injured and 1 killed.
This is an increase of 10 accidents
and 1 death for the same period
of 1955.

At a regular session of the City
Council, Monday night, members
voted to accept the Extended Area
Service offered by the Southwest-
ern Bell Telephone company. Ac-
ceptance is contained in Ordinance
271 which was passed unanimously.

ORDINANCE NO. 271
An Ordinance Regulating the Rates
and Charges of the Southwestern
Bell Telephone company.

Whereas, the service requirements
of the citizens of Iowa Park may
best be served by extending the
local calling area to include the
Wichita Falls exchange, and

Whereas, the City Council of the
City of Iowa Park has requested
that Southwestern Bell Telephone
company so extend said local call-
ing area of the Iowa Park exchange
and the telephone company has so
agreed,

Now, therefore be it ordained by
the City Council of the City of
Iowa Park:

Section 1: That Southwestern
Bell Telephone company shall con-
tinue in effect the following sched-
ule of rates for local exchange tele-
phone service:

Class of Service — Monthly Rate
One Party Business Flat Rate \$8.00
Business Extension Station Flat \$1.50

One Party Residence Service \$4.50
Two Party Residence Service \$4.00
Residence Extension Station \$1.00
Commercial PBX Trunk (a) \$1.50
Commercial PBX Station (a) \$1.50
Semi-Public Service (Guarantee) per day, \$0.25

Local Messages under Guarantee each \$0.05(b)
Local Messages over Guarantee each \$0.04(b)

Coin Telephone Charge per Local
Message \$0.04(b)
Extension Semi-Public—Coin \$1.50
Extension Semi-Public—Non-Coin \$1.00

(a) The rate for a flat rate PBX
trunk is 1 1/2 times the rate for one
party business flat rate service.
(b) See Section 3.

Section 2: That upon and effec-
tive with the extension of the local
calling scope of the Iowa Park
exchange to include the Wichita
Falls exchange, the telephone com-
pany shall be authorized to charge
basic rates for One-Party Business
Flat Rate Service \$1.75 higher, for
a One-Party Residence Service \$50
higher, and for Two-Party Resi-
dence Service \$70 higher than the
respective rates then in effect or
thereafter authorized for the Wichi-
ta Falls exchange.

Section 3: That authority to in-
crease the charge for local mes-
sages from coin box telephone to
ten cents per message is hereby
granted, to become effective when
the Telephone Company completes
equipment modifications necessary
to the due rendition of telephone
service from such coin box tele-
phones on this basis. With the
making effective of a charge of
ten cents for local messages from
such coin box telephones, the rate
to the subscriber to semi-public
coin box telephone service shall be
8 1/2 cents per message for calls
over the daily guarantee and 10
cents per message for calls under
the daily guarantee.

Section 4: All ordinances hereto-
fore passed by the City Council of
the City of Iowa Park establishing
rates and charges for telephone
service are hereby repealed.

Section 5: Nothing in this ordi-
nance contained shall be con-
strued now or hereafter as limit-
ing or modifying, in any manner,
the right and power of the city
under the law to regulate the rates
and charges of Southwestern Bell
Telephone company.





Thelma Wirges

says...

All game birds should be cooled thoroughly before cooking, reminds Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent.

To roast duck—clean, wipe and dry. Sprinkle generously with flour, salt and pepper. Place whole peeled onion or apple inside each duck. The onion or apple will not be eaten—they are used to absorb some of the wild "gamey" taste. Fasten two or three strips of bacon across each bird with toothpicks. They add juiciness and flavor.

Place bird on rack in roasting pan. Do not cover or add water unless it is an old bird. Bake in moderate oven until done. Young birds will roast in about 90 minutes. Baste frequently, and remove from oven as soon as tender. Ducks may be stuffed with wild rice dressing made by boiling the rice and seasoning with salt, pepper and chopped onion, or you may use your favorite bread stuffing.

Dove and quail are considered a delicacy in many families. They have food value equal to that of domestic birds, and a flavor that is unusual and exciting as well. They are delicious fried, braised, roasted or made into meat pies.

Game meats, like domestic meats, are best when properly dressed and cooked, says Thelma Wirges, county home demonstration agent. The family judges meat chiefly by tenderness and flavor.

Natural tenderness of any meat is influenced by the kind of animal, age, finish or fatness, and cut. Tenderness as served depends upon natural tenderness and method of cooking.

Carcasses of larger game animals are cut in much the same manner as beef carcasses, and the cuts are cooked by the same methods used for beef of similar grade. As with beef, loin cuts are most tender. Roasts and steaks from the loin can usually be cooked nicely by dry heat. Moist heat is considered more satisfactory for other cuts.

Loin will give the best roasts and steaks (sirloin or porterhouse). Chuck and rump are good for pot roasts and ground meat. Round will make good steaks unless the animal is particularly tough. In this case, it can be ground or used as swiss steak. If the leg is small it can be roasted all in one piece in the manner of a leg of lamb.

Shank, neck, flank and spare-ribs can be best used for soup, stew and ground meat. The neck will be tender if tendons are removed. It will make a good roast. Venison is a rather dry meat. Addition of suet, butter or bacon fat when roasting, broiling or frying will improve this condition. Characteristic venison flavor is concentrated largely in the fat. Removal of the bulk of fat will make it less "gamey." Spices and herbs help to bring out its good flavor.

Mrs. Harold Staber, foods and nutrition demonstrator for Valley Farms HDC, is busy these days improving her kitchen storage. The improvements include: arrangement of work centers, addition of step shelf space for spices, etc., better arrangement of cooking utensils and improved eating area, with small electrical equipment handy.

Mr. and Mrs. Staber are also remodeling other parts of their home. When in Valley Farms, you might stop by to see what has been done and look over their plans.

COUNTY AGENT SUGGESTS . . .

Recent field observations have shown that the use of some insecticides directly on the skin of poultry is causing severe skin burning and discoloration, reports B. T. Haws, county agent.

This discoloration may take the form of large reddened areas, and in some cases the skin takes on a "greased paper" look. Such discoloration, from the standpoint of market value, is frequently more harmful than the damage caused by the external parasite the grower is attempting to control, explains the county agent.

It has been noted if sufficient quantities of some of the stronger insecticides get directly on the skin of the bird, the insecticide may impart an off-flavor to the meat.

Haws says the Extension Service entomologists do not recommend spraying any chlorinated hydrocarbon directly on poultry.

Have you ever stopped to think how much undesirable trees and brush in the farm fence rows cost? B. T. Haws, county agent, says a recent study showed a single large mesquite tree was using all the water from one-sixth acre of cropland.

The farmer reported the tree cost him \$9.10 last year. He averaged a half bale of cotton to the acre on his other cropland but got nothing from the area around the tree. He stopped and did a little figuring, and for less than five cents killed the tree!

On another farm, no crops were growing within 90 feet of a brushy fence row. In one mile of fence row the farmer was losing 10 acres of cropland. Surveys have shown that in many counties upwards of 5,000 acres of cropland are not producing because of fence row thieves.

Haws says if fence rows, trees and brush are not controlled, the farmer can at least save his seed, time and labor by not trying to produce crops close to brushy fence rows.

Now is the time of year to apply chemicals to these moisture and soil nutrient robbers. Best control is obtained by spraying the cut-off stump, the trunk base or by applying a solution in fills to the standing trees. Accepted chemical is 2,4,5-T which should be mixed with diesel oil or kerosene and applied with a hand or back-type sprayer. For hard to kill trees, use a pound of chemical in six gallons of oil. For easier to kill trees a pound to 12 gallons of oil is suggested.

December, January and February are good months for carrying out the control program. The chemical is nonpoisonous to man or livestock in the recommended formulas.


